Agriculture will be asked to endorse a brief dealing with incentives for agriculture at the group's annual meeting at Hillcrest Church Dec. 4.

The brief has been developed by a committee which represents the Federation, Regional Planning Committee. Halton Soil and Crop association, Ministry of Agriculture and Food and other interested persons.

The brief recommends a number of incentives to keep land in agriculture and suggests freezing of prime agricultural land so that it can be used for no purpose other than agriculture.
