

Equal opportunity

Board will study treatment of women

Halton Board of Education will launch a study aimed at bringing in recommendations that would ensure the same opportunities for women in the system as exist for men if those opportunities don't already exist. Even though the study was authorized almost unanimously most trustees indicated that they felt there was no problem in Halton.

The terms of reference provide for an investigation of relative opportunities for men and women at all levels in the system and to make recommendations to ensure equality of opportunity and encouragement for advancement and leadership if necessary.

Then direct action is needed at the board level. If we can identify and develop only four women to the level of principal in our regular schools from a staff which includes 1,300 women, then the loss of leadership potential can only be a loss to our system and ultimately to our students."

While many trustees felt there was no problem and indicated that a study would only serve to support that viewpoint, Ada Hill, Director of the Federated Women Teachers Association of Ontario indicates that is not so.

She told this reporter that it wasn't an iffy question "There is a problem." She noted that results of random surveys of some of Halton's female teachers indicate over 60 per cent would accept positions of responsibility if those positions were offered but only 50 per cent would apply for those positions.

She implied that the system provided encouragement for men but only rarely for women. She said men are approached via the grapevine and advised that so and so's position is coming open. That doesn't happen with women she indicated.

permitted a female appointment as principal of a secondary school. She was the first woman to be a principal of a secondary school in Ontario. That was several years ago and it was only last week that the second woman was appointed to a similar post.

The Halton Board has been applauded by FWTAO for promoting as many women as it has. Some members of both FWTAO and the board feel the board hasn't gone far enough in that direction yet.

Committee

The 15 person committee is expected to report back by Dec. 31, 1975. The committee is made up of trustees, senior administration, elementary and secondary teachers and principals and three members of the public.

In presenting the motion Mrs. Alexander said most administrators and trustees have assumed that there existed a fair and equal opportunity for all, yet in 1974 we do not have even one woman at the senior level of administration. There are three women principals at schools for the retarded but only four women principals out of 81 in other schools."

She said the Halton Board compares favorably with other areas with regard to the inclusion of women in leadership groups, vice principal appointments and even principal appointments.

Tap resources

"However, if we are to tap the human resources that we have to the fullest extent,

Trustee Tony Goodyear summed up the concern of several trustees when he identified what he felt was a danger of such a study. He said the danger of people feeling a certain number of appointments had to be female did exist. Trustee Fred Armitage amended the motion to delete the reference to opportunities in leadership for women and the motion now refers to a study into leadership and opportunity in education.

Mrs. Alexander said the amendment did not affect the terms of reference and would not weaken the committee efforts.

First principal

Trustee Edna Robinson, a former administrator with the board, recalled how Jim Singleton had encouraged her and actually convinced the Ministry of Education to
