As far as Halton Region's Public Works Committee is concerned, any development in the region that is depending on communal wells for water supply will have to wait for another six months.

The committee developed that opinion earlier but the Planning Committee felt the report should be ready by the end of January. Council at its last meeting referred the matter back to the works committee for reconsidera-


