Doug wants a chance to practise football with Dad. (Doug today runs circles around poor dad but still loves throwing the ball around with an old pro.)

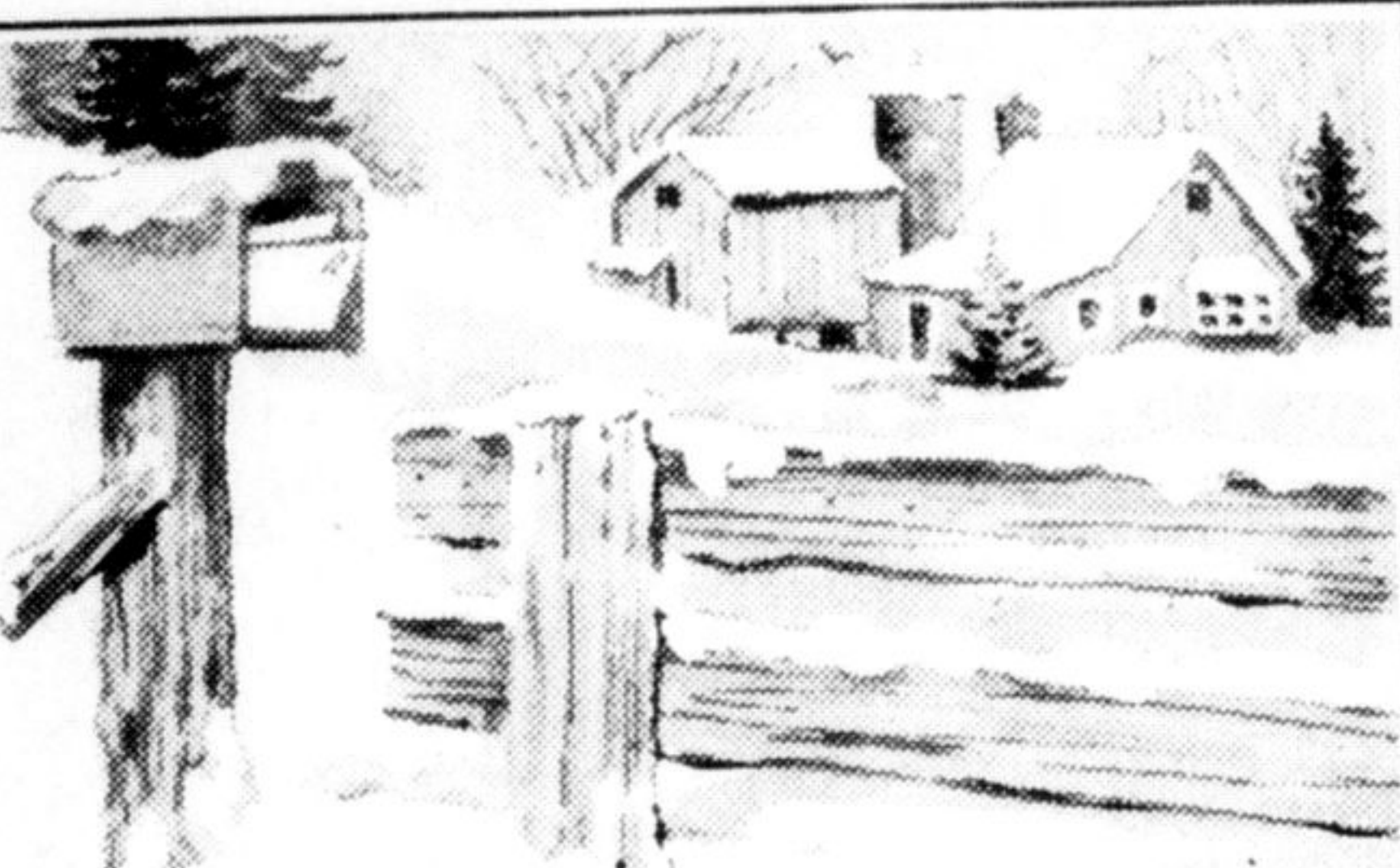


### At Halton Museum Phaeton carriage

## Name publisher Dills OWNA vice-president

Champion publisher Jim Dills was elected vice-president of the Ontario Weekly Newspapers Association at a December meeting of the board in Toronto.

He succeeds Harry Stemp, publisher of the Uxbridge Times-Journal and the Lake Simcoe Advocate, who resigned during his term.

Chairs committee Dills was originally elected to the Ontario association's 11-member board in 1972 and has served as chairman of the administration committee

since that time. The Association represents more than 200 community newspapers throughout the province and also operates an active group-buying program. OWNA celebrates its 25th anniversary in 1975.
