Politics rules Ladies' league says husband

A comment is required in regards to the operation of the Halton Ladies' Amateur Softball League, which should not only interest those people who support it, through sponsoring the club of their choice, but also to parents of future players who will wish to participate.

Susan Britton and Janet Vallier have both been enthusiastic players of softball for more than ten years until this year, where because of a principle, have decided not to play in the regional league.

The problem started back in April of this year when "tryout" practices were being held by all of the clubs. Janet and Susan attended both the Milton and Georgetown practices and decided they liked the Georgetown team and so they were signed.

Realizing this was Milton's first year to support a club for some five years, they felt it polite to tell the Milton coach, Mr. Murray Whistler of their becoming members of the Georgetown team. A protest was submitted by Whistler to the league president as it was his opinion that these two players should not be allowed to play anywhere but in Milton. The constitution by which the league is governed has no ruling stipulating a player must play for the town team of her resi-

Now let me go on to explain Milton has plenty of ball players, in fact Mr. Whistler has stated as of June 2 his team now consists of a whopping twenty-four players (he is allowed to sign twenty-five) which of course fields two teams and

On June 1 a league meeting took place to settle the problem as to whether or not these two players could participate on the Georgetown team, the players were not allowed at the meeting, due to the president's ruling.

At this stage of the "politics" all the girls felt they had done was sign up to play for the team they felt they would enjoy playing with the most, they had not jeopardized Milton's ability to field a team what-so-ever.

At the conclusion of the league meeting a ruling was passed by a majority vote that the towns of Georgetown and Milton were not allowed to sign players residing outside of their town borders, however the remaining teams in the league, Hornby, Glen Williams and Hillsburgh Jr. and Sr. clubs are allowed to sign players regardless of where they live.

At present Hillsburgh Senior team has a Toronto and Brampton player and the Glen Williams team is rumored to have six previous Georgetown team members signed as regular players.

The league as far as the girls are concerned does not appear to have the players' interests at heart and seems to be totally manipulated by the Milton coach. No formal written notice has been delivered to Susan or Janet advising them the new conditions under which they may play in the league.

The league has run for years without a "player import" rule. I would like to know what sector of the league this new ruling is benefitting, the teams, towns or coaches? Certainly not the players.






