Scott Morey was the only two-goal man for Dufferin, with single markers potted by Ian Jackson, Greg Morey, Igy King and Jeff Ruigroke.

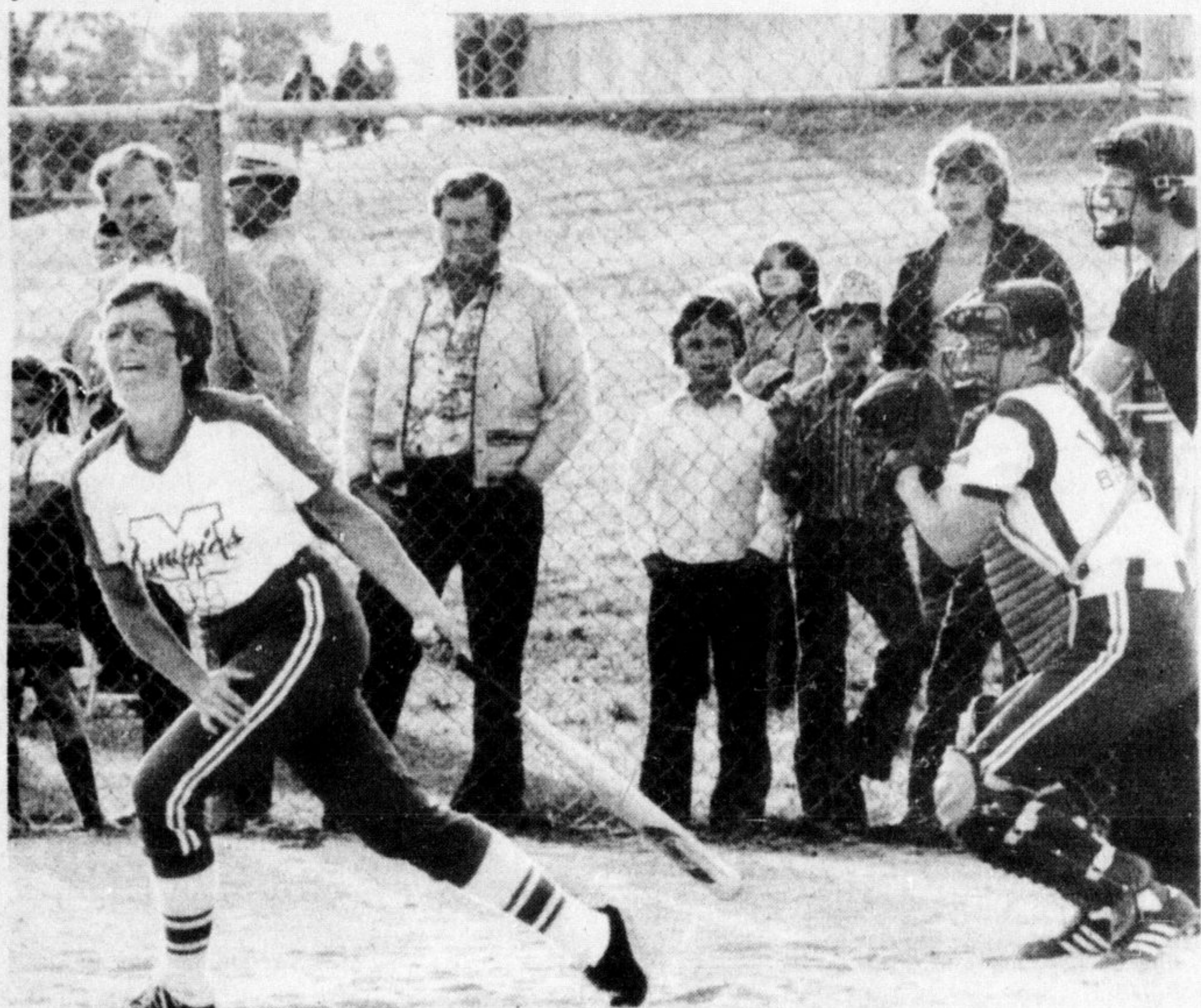
Fred Noseworthy scored all three ICC
