George Gray, Halton-Burlington's Tory candidate in the next provincial election and former MP Terry O'Connor were out mingling with the party faithful Friday during a PC corn roast and dance at Oakville MPP Jim Snow's home at Hornby.

Philbrook's call for input treated lightly by trustees

Halton MP Dr. Frank Philbrook's call for input from Halton Board of Education concerning possible guidelines to regulate the amount of sex and violence in television programs didn't fall on deaf ears, Thursday, but ears weren't receptive either.
Dr. Philbrook wanted a response from the board on a private member's bill which, if passed, would amend the Broadcasting Act. The bill is being sponsored by MPs James McGrath and James Fleming.
"I would appreciate any comments from the Halton Board of Education. I will try to reflect your views to the greatest extent possible," Dr. Philbrook's letter said.
Trustee Rick Goodin said the board shouldn't take Dr. Philbrook's letter too seriously.
"I have known this man to send out questionnaires asking voters' views before and then he just goes back to Ottawa and votes opposite way. Anything he asks for is useless," Goodin declared.
"Mr. Goodin your politics are showing," Chairman Judy Alexander replied.
Trustee Bill Priestner wondered if the guidelines would reduce the amount of sex and violence in television but couldn't get an answer.
Goodin's hand shot up again as soon as Mrs. Alexander said the board should reply to the Halton MP's letter but dropped just as abruptly when she added "politely".
Trustee Ernie Bodnar wondered how the board should answer the letter politely and asked "would it read any differently in French."
"Just write to him and say it's nice to hear from you again," vice-chairman Bill Herd offered.
Trustee Bill Lawson's sug-

gestion that the board send a copy of the report it presented last winter to the Lamarsh Royal Commission on Violence in the Media to Dr. Philbrook was accepted.
