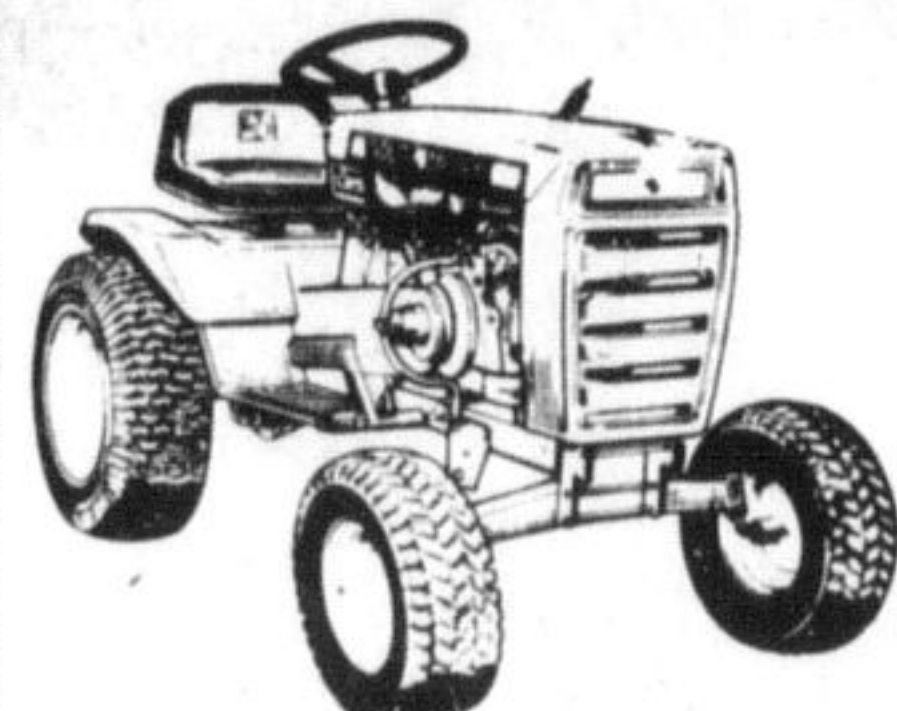
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Halton Fastball League

Hornby, Lowville in dog fight

The Halton Fastball League heads into its final week of play with first place still up for grabs.

Hornby Farmer Jacks moved into a tie for first with Lowville Sam Roy Enterprises, on the strength of a 4-1 win in their game Tuesday, then both teams added two wins and one loss to their records in other games.

However, the league has ruled that all games played involving the Georgetown Chryslers this year, who dropped out of the league three weeks ago, be removed from the standings. After this was done, Lowville stayed one loss ahead of Hornby in first.

Hornby split a double-header with Palermo Sunday,

losing 5-3 then winning 4-0 in seven-inning games. They also won a game by default when Burlington couldn't field a team.

Lowville topped Glen Williams 7-3 Friday then split two games with Hamilton Sunday, winning 4-1 and losing 4-0.

Stuart the star Hornby pitching ace Rod Stuart was the star Tuesday, allowing two hits and striking out 19 Lowville batters, including eight of the last nine men he faced. In the eighth inning he struck out the side on the minimum nine pitches.

All five runs in the game were unearned. Dave Yemm took the loss for Lowville, giving up four hits while striking out six batters.

In Friday's Glen-Lowville encounter, the Glen took a 2-0 lead in the first, but Lowville came back with three-run homers by Matt McAnally and Stu King in the second inning to put the game out of reach.

Yemm the winner Yemm was the winning pitcher, Bob McGowan took the loss.

Jacques Paquette pitched a four-hitter in Sunday's opener against Hamilton, striking out 12. Burke Harrison and Bruce Carver had two hits each for Lowville. In the second game Lee Coulson started, but was relieved by Paquette in the fifth inning with Hamilton leading 4-0.

Brad Scott, the winning pitcher allowed only four hits,

two of those by Murray Dawson.

In Hornby's first game loss to Palermo Sunday, Mike Leslie hit a solo homer in the fourth inning after Palermo had scored unearned runs in the second and third for a 2-0 lead.

Hornby tied the game in the fifth 3-3, on two hits, a walk, an error, a hit batter and a wild pitch by John Inglehart. Charlie McFeeters scored the winning run on a disputed play.

He was walked to first then took third on a sharp hit to second to third was on time, but the umpire ruled McFeeters avoided the tag by Hornby's Andy Trencs.

Trencs claims that McFeeters agreed, after the

game, that he was out on the play.

Third-inning lead

Hits by Ken Arnold, Leslie, Stuart and Wayne Ellis paced Hornby to a 3-0 lead in the third inning of the second game, and they added one

more in the sixth. Stuart was the winning pitcher, allowing two hits in six innings. Leslie relieved in the seventh. Ron Richards took the loss, allowing 11 hits. Hornby plays a double-header in Burlington Friday, then plays Palermo Tuesday.

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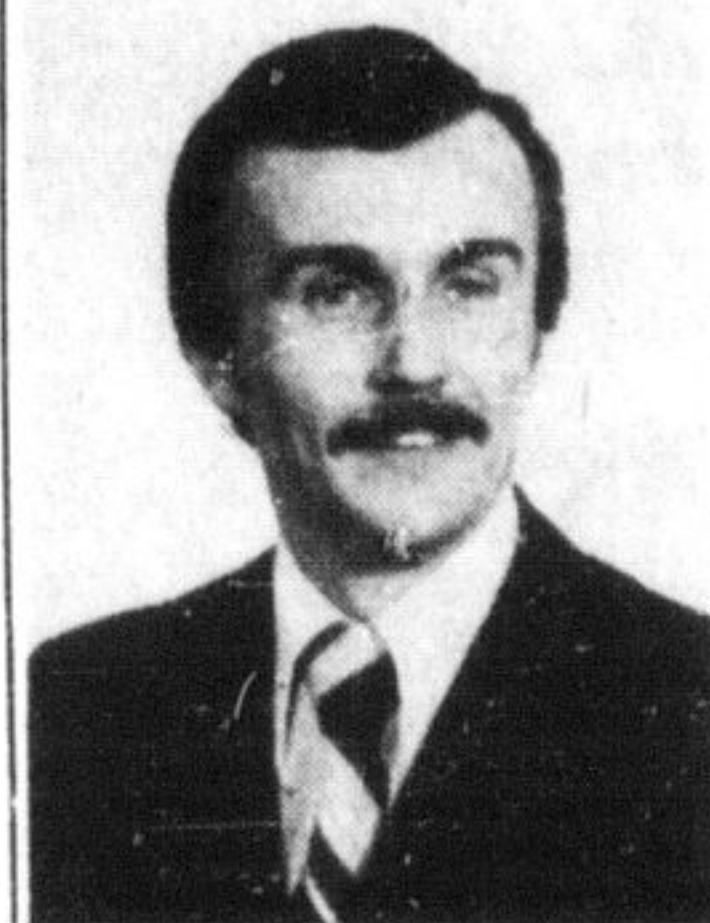
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
