

## Glen gals hope to repeat upset

Hillsburgh seniors, the defending Halton Ladies Softball League champions, will be facing the only team able to beat them during the regular season, when the league's 1976 playoffs open in the 'burg tonight (Wednesday).

Glen Williams, who were annihilated 34-4, 25-1 and 24-12 in their first three regular season games against Hillsburgh, pulled the biggest upset of the year when they knocked off the defending champs 7-5 at the Glen ballpark in July. Hillsburgh won the pennant with a 16-1 record, while the Glen finished fourth with a 6-12 mark.

Georgetown Armstrong Georgettes, who placed third with an 11-6 record, take on the second place Hillsburgh North Stars juniors (15-5) in the other best of three semifinal series. Dates for that series have not yet been arranged. In regular season play, North Stars defeated Georgetown 2-1, 4-2 and 10-9, with the Georgettes finally claiming a 12-2 win in their fourth meeting.

Second game of the Hillsburgh senior-Glen series

is set for the Glen ballpark Monday, August 30. Third game, if necessary, will be played in Hillsburgh, Wednesday, September 1.

The Milton team placed 13th in the competition. They also finished 13th in the swim relay.

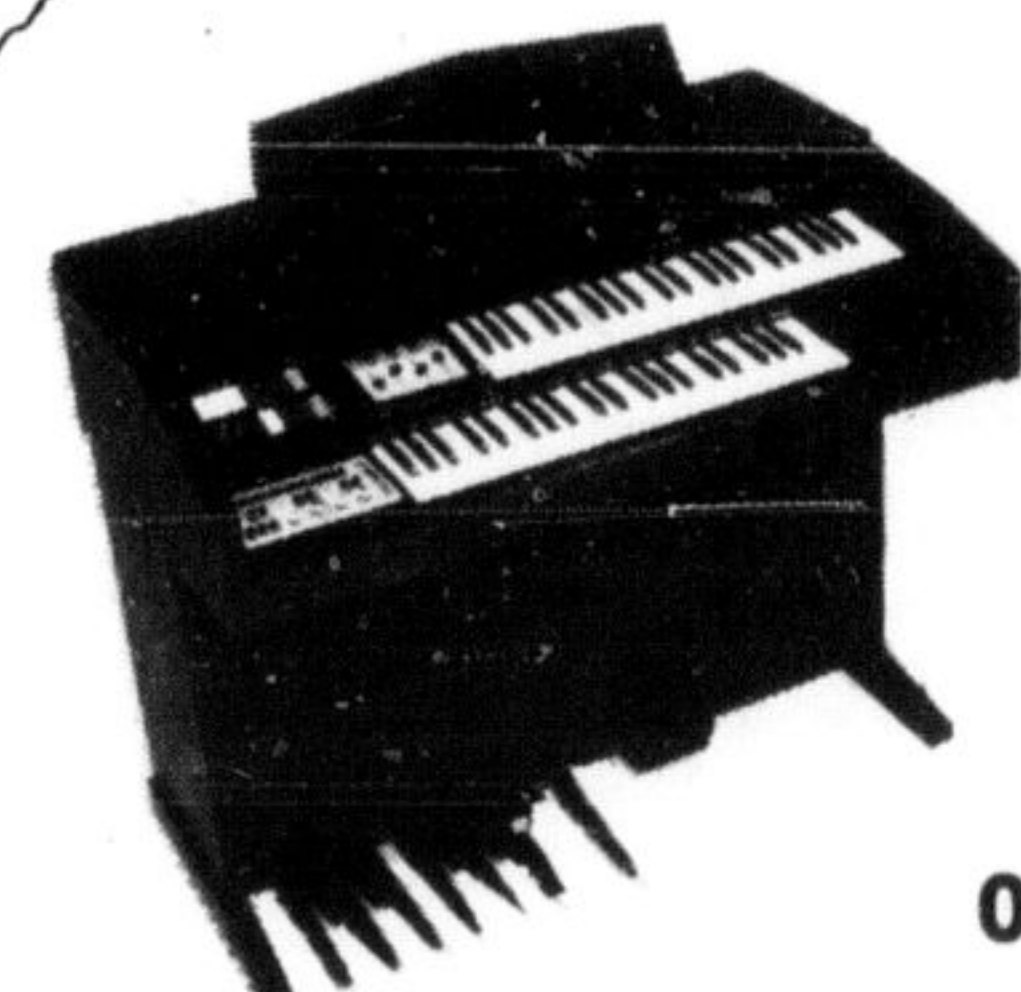
