Rides a horse

Let neighbors settle dispute

"It seems you can't even ride a horse on five acres in Nassagaweya any more," Mayor Anne MacArthur grumbled as Milton Council reviewed a planning report during Tuesday night's council meeting.

The report prepared by Planning Director Bob Zsadyani reviewed complaints against Mr. and Mrs. G. Restivo. Neighbors complained that the Restivos were illegally keeping a horse in a rural residential zone.

The planner's investigation indicates that while they sometimes ride the horse on the five acre holding, it is only rarely boarded there. The horse is generally boarded in an agricultural zone.

No conflict The planner notes that the fenced off acreage is not in conflict with the official plan and many similar parcels are fenced.

"If it is the neighbors' allegation that the fenced off

area constitutes a corral, then it is the staff's suggestion that a solicitor's interpretation is required regarding this fence."

The planner concludes his report by saying, "It is the staff's opinion that the matter should be resolved between the complaining neighbors and Mr. and Mrs. Restivo as it is very questionable whether these residents have in any way violated the provisions of the Zoning By-Law in this case."

Halton Police Association may not end up taking its case to arbitration for the second time in three years of regional police.

At Thursday's Halton Police Commission meeting, Judge William Warrender asked if a date had been set for the arbitration hearing the Police Association had requested.

The subject was abruptly dropped after Chairman Glenn Magnuson, Georgetown, said the police contract negotiations would be the subject of an in-camera session.

Several police association negotiation representatives were in the audience.

Tuesday commissioner and Halton Hills Mayor Tom Hill said the arbitration the police applied for over a month ago may not be needed.

Noting the commission's negotiators, Magnuson, himself and sometimes Harry Barrett had been talking with the police ever since they applied for arbitration, he said, "It is now up to the

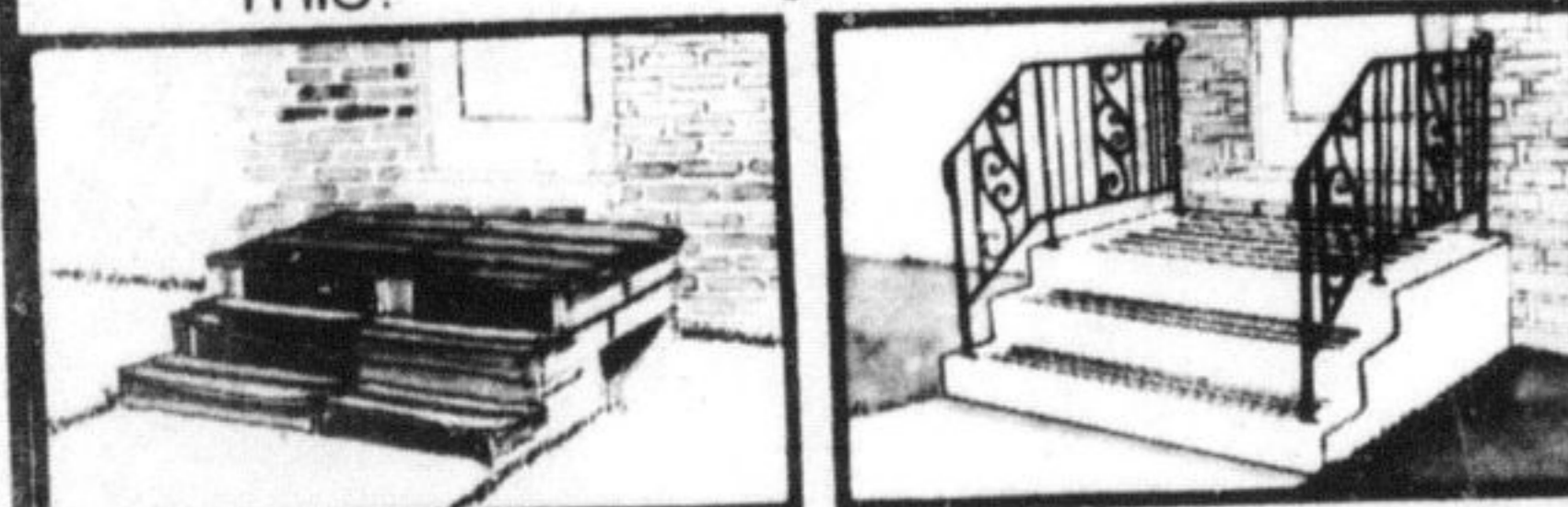

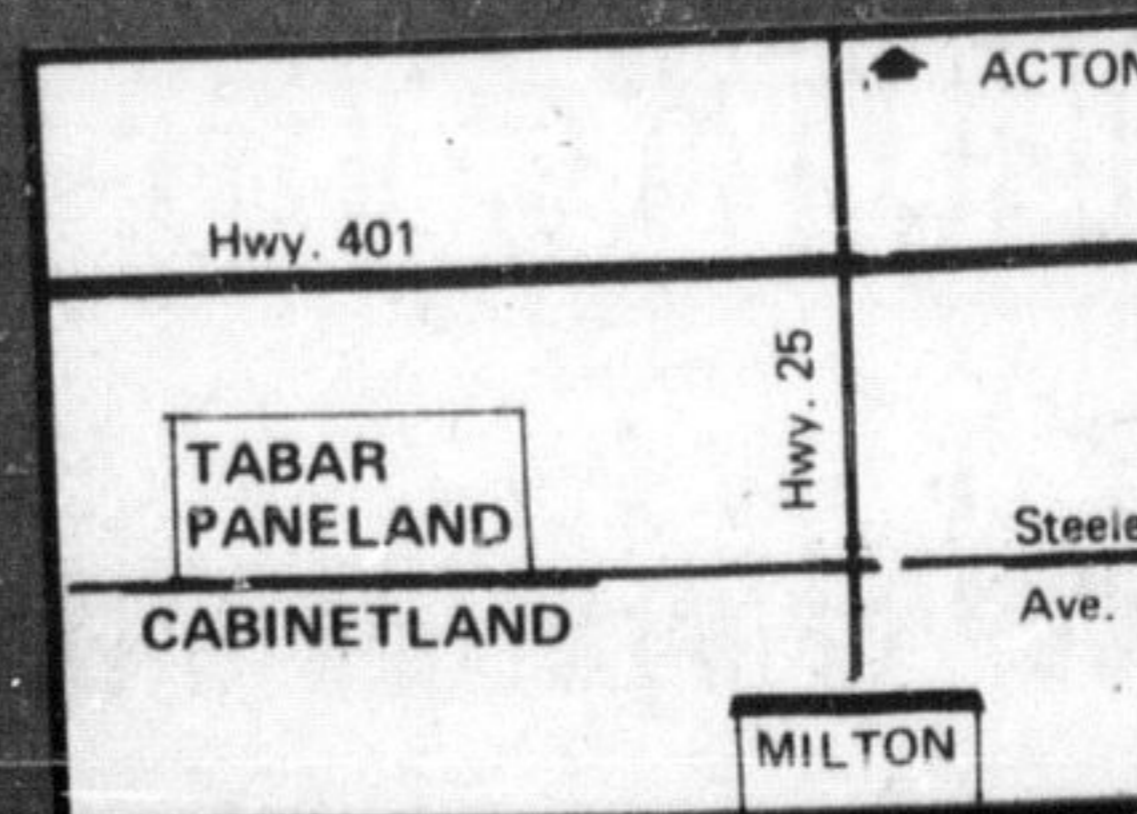
