In your bird feeder a handful of sunflower seeds will be ample to keep the bluejays and cardinals satisfied; most of us put out too much at one time. Do not overfeed, as it takes away the birds' incentive to forage for themselves. and remember, if you start feeding, keep it up.

Remember, it is just as much an offence for a snowmobiler to go on private property without permission as it is for a fisherman or a hunter. 




