1976 statistics

OPP handles fewer accidents

In 1976 the Ontario Provincial Police detachment in Milton handled 70 fewer accidents than in 1975, according to statistics.
During 1975, 954 traffic accidents occurred in the 35 square mile area covered by the Milton OPP while in 1976 this total dropped to 824. This represents a 7.3 reduction.

Staff Sergeant Alex Grainger, head of the Milton OPP, said he was very pleased with this reduction and credited it to the motorist public, the lowering of the speed limit, the new seatbelt legislation plus selective enforcement in traffic patrols.
Selective enforcement is the concentration of patrols in accident prone areas. "In other words," Staff Sgt. Grainger said, "It's useless to concentrate the patrols in relatively accident free areas and neglect the areas where a good percentage of the accidents occur."

Fewer killed
Across the province there was a decrease of 3,036 traffic accidents along the 70,000 miles of highway patrolled by the OPP during 1976 compared to 1975, according to a press release from OPP Commissioner H. H. Graham. This reduction resulted in an estimated 185 fewer persons killed and 4,722 fewer persons injured during the same period.

The Milton force had 13 motor vehicle fatalities in the area last year, which is a decrease of four from 1975. Staff Sgt. Grainger said, however, one tragic accident on Highway 25, south of Acton, took the lives of six teenagers. Because of this, Staff Sgt. Grainger said they tend to look at it as eight fatal accidents with 13 people killed.

During 1976 Milton OPP handled 73 criminal prosecutions, 210 miscellaneous prosecutions, which include violations of provincial statutes and the liquor act, but not impaired driving charges) as well as handing

out 3,553 warnings to motorists.
Breath tests
Last year 142 motorists were given the demand to take the breathalyzer test by the Milton OPP and of these, eight drivers refused the demand. These eight were charged with refusing to take the breathalyzer test, which carries the same penalty as an impaired driving charge upon conviction.
Of the 134 motorists who took the breathalyzer test, 123 were charged with impaired driving when the reading went above .08 per cent.

The general occurrences, which are not traffic occurrences, totalled 5,297 for 1976 and of these 2,800 required police investigation.
In 1976 Milton OPP had 864 processes to serve. Staff Sgt. Grainger explained processes included summonses and warrants from other police services.

Roads patrolled
Currently the Milton OPP is responsible for patrolling 60.2 miles of provincial highways (Highway 401, Highway 25, Highway 7 and Highway 5), 36.5 miles of county roads and 78.1 miles of township roads.

Halton Regional Police are scheduled to take over the patrolling of Nassagaweya Township in March, which Staff Sgt. Grainger said would drastically reduce the number of criminal prosecutions, incoming processes and general occurrences Milton OPP handles.

"It may also reduce our traffic accidents somewhat," he said. "I would estimate by about 10-15 per cent."
The Staff Sgt., however, did not anticipate any reduction in the staff due to the potential loss of Nassagaweya Township. He expected the highway patrol will be strengthened by this move.

Currently the staff of the OPP detachment at Milton consists of one staff sergeant, five corporals, 26 constables and four civilians.

Crime calls up 1.4% in Halton 11.7% crime jump in North

While final statistics aren't in yet it would appear crime went up in Halton again last year. In North Halton it jumped 11.7 per cent.

Across the region in areas covered by the regional police occurrences, or calls for service connected with crimes, went from 48,800 in 1975 to 49,476 in 1976, a 1.4 per cent increase. The occurrence figures do not include accidents.

The number of occurrences also does not represent the number of crimes since following investigation a number are later classified as unfounded, Inspector Southward, Halton Regional Police said. He explained the actual number of crimes hasn't been determined yet since not all investigations have been completed. The clearance rate, or solved case rate stands at 45.9 per cent but that could change as investigations are completed.

He did admit the percentage increase in occurrences could be very close to the percentage increase in

crime, since the number of investigations classified as unfounded doesn't change much from year to year.
In North Halton crime has jumped 11.7 per cent from 1975 to 1976 and solved rate has dipped from 60 per cent to 51 per cent.

At the same time the regional police covered a larger area last year for a longer period of time than it did in 1975.

For the first eight months of 1975, regional police covered only urban Milton and Georgetown. Then in September, 1975, the force took over jurisdiction for Acton and Esquesing.

During 1976 the force covered all of Halton Hills and urban Milton. Later this year the force will take over jurisdiction for Nassagaweya which should mean another crime increase next year.
During 1976 the 61 man District One force, covering north Halton, handled 3,933 occurrences compared to 3,509 the year before. The actual number of crimes went from 3,301 in 1975 to 3,687 in 1976.

There were hefty increases in vandalism, theft and assaults while burglaries and by-law violations also went up.
The number of frauds, car thefts, drug cases and incidents of shoplifting went down.

Crimes classified by police under the heading of Other Criminal Code leaped from 838 in 1975 to 997 last year. Most of these cases are vandalism and mischief although impaired and dangerous driving and trespassing are also included in this category.

Burglaries of homes, shops, churches and schools went up slightly from 272 in 1975 to 287 in 1976. There were 103 house break-ins last year, up six from the year before. Shop burglaries went up 11 from 123 in 1975 and break-ins at

schools, churches and other buildings decreased slightly from 53 in 1975 to 50 last year.
Assaults leaped from 135 in 1975 to 173 last year.

Theft continues to be a problem with the incidence climbing from 710 in 1975 to 847 in 1976. Theft of goods valued at over \$200 went up to 135 in 1976 from 84 in 1975. Theft cases involving goods worth less than \$200 hit 712 last year, up 86 from the year before.

Car thefts dipped to 68 in 1976 down from 77 the year before and there was also a decline in the number of shoplifting cases which went down from 59 in 1975 to 51 in 1976.

The number of people arrested for having stolen goods in their possession went up 18 from 1975 when there were only 10 cases.
Robbery cases went up from three in 1975 to seven in 1976 while frauds dropped from 115 to 102 last year.

There were three cases of rape in North Halton last year, two more than in the year before. Other sex offences also went up from five to seven.

Drug and liquor arrests went down last year. In 1975 110 people were arrested in connection with drug cases while last year only 101 were apprehended. Most of the drug cases involved soft drugs like marijuana and hashish.

In 1975, 735 people were arrested for liquor offences while last year there were only 527 people hauled in for drinking under age and being drunk in public.
Police caught 12 more people last year with offensive weapons in their possession than they did in 1975 when 14 people were arrested for the offence.

By-law violations leaped from 280 in 1975 to 380 last year while arrests for violation of various provincial statutes went down from 141 in 1975 to 103 in 1976.

Gaming and betting violations went down from eight to four between 1975 and 1976.
