Mohawk

Purses are made up of 471/2 per cent of the OJC's share of the betting dollar, and 25 per cent of the 'breakage' which is the change left over from each race, when odds payouts are not even dimes. The OJC pays to the nearest dime on winning bets, and keeps the change, known as breakage. Lampman estimated

purses are up by 20-30 per cent this year over last.

Other changes include the admission fee to Sports, up from \$3 last year to \$4 (includes general admission), and to the Terrace dining room, up to \$2 from \$1 last


