Now is the time to act. Not next week or a month from now.

I have personally asked people who seem quite concerned about our vanishing species, if they have done anything to help. Unfortunately about 99 per cent of the answers I have received have been in the negative. You don't have to be a millionaire to help. The Ontario Wildlife Federation has existed for years and we at the Sportsmen's Association can say with pride that for years we were the largest donors to the fund of any club in Ontario and we are certainly not the most affluent.

Ice-fishing in most areas is over for another year and certainly it went out on a good note at Lake Simcoe, on March 14-15, the two last closing days. Catches of up to 70 fish were not uncommon.

They came in schools of thousands and the action was terrific. The fish would bite on any lure or live bait you presented to them and in many cases they even took a bare hook.

Ice fishing at Lake Nipissing finished early this year. All winter there was a great quantity of water on the ice, then the mild spell cut the ice-fishing season by 10 days.

Fishing was at its best this year in mid-February. Large catches of whitefish, and jumbo perch were something new this year. Pickerel and pike were about normal. Lake Temagami also produced some above normal catches of whitefish. Lake Erie at Port Rowan started out with large catches of perch then tapered off after the new year to nearly nothing.

It has been a real bad winter for deer and already talks are in progress at the Ministry of reduced seasons in the future. One of the mottos of a good sportsman is "A good crop needs to be harvested and if a poor crop, reduce the harvest."

Wolves have also taken a large toll this year. The Department of Natural Resources has been lenient on wolves as has any good outdoorsman. Wolves usually kill what they can eat but this year conservation officers are finding dozens of deer killed by wolves and only a small portion has been eaten.

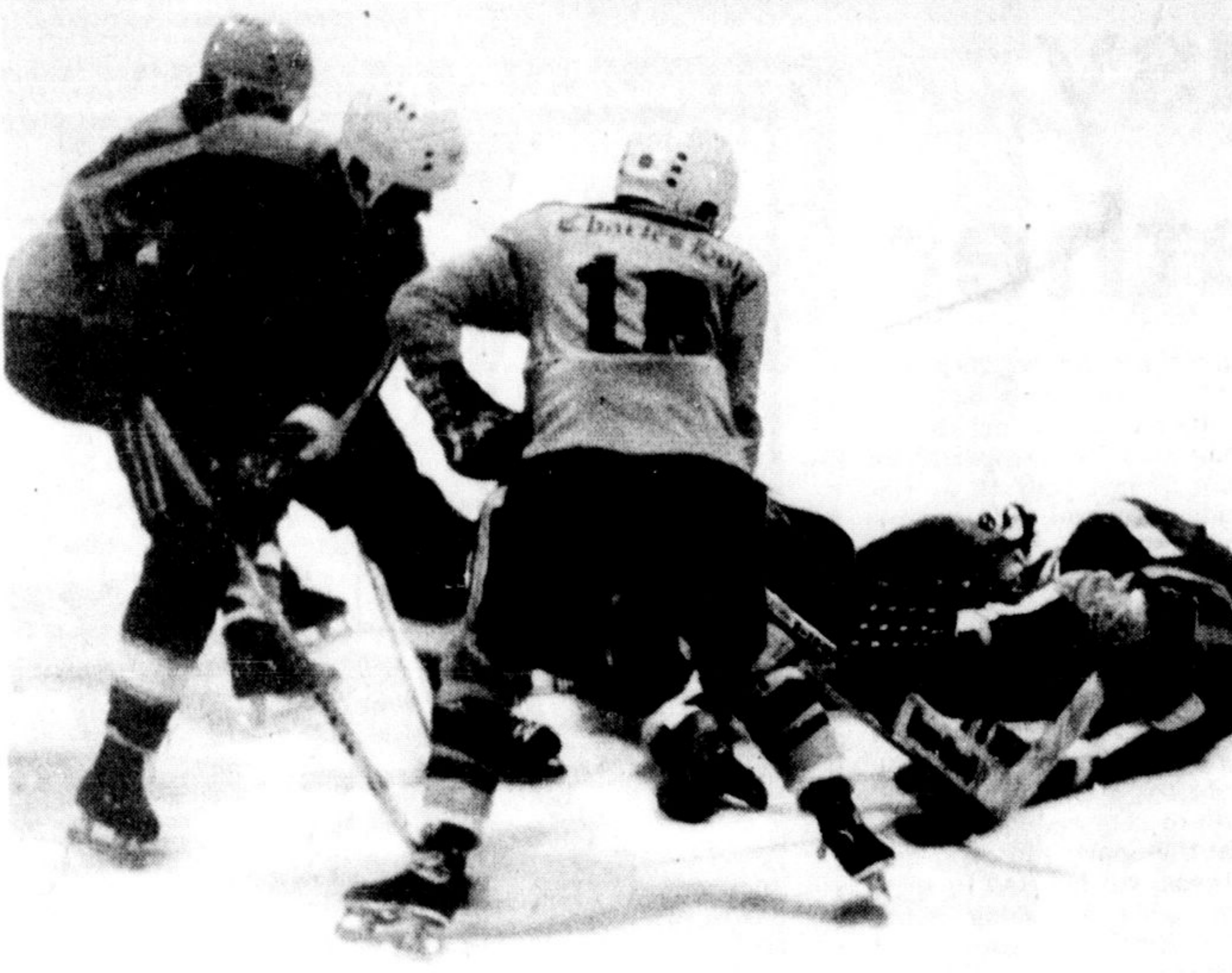

Derbys lead series 3-1

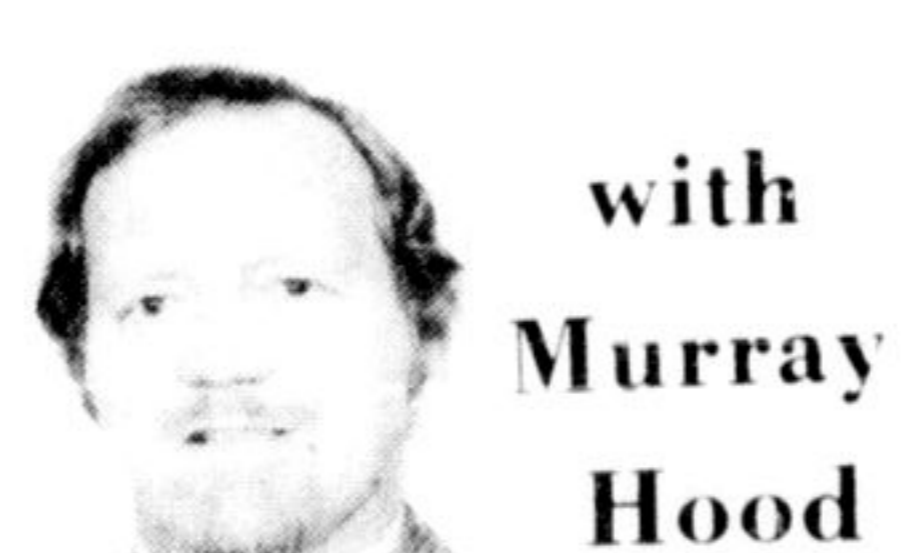
The Streetsville Derbys are only one game away from winning their best-of-seven OHA Junior B quarter-final series against the Niagara Canucks.
