Friends and relatives of retired farmer Axel Peterson and his wife Annie gathered at St. Stephen's Church in Hornby Sunday afternoon to honor the couple on the oc-

casation of their golden wedding anniversary. The Petersons, who now reside in Oakville, were married on April 12, 1927 at the home of a friend on Second Line West near Brampton.

At the time, both were recent immigrants to this country. Mrs. Peterson (nee Quinn) came to Canada in the early 1900s with an aunt from Ireland while Mr. Peterson (nee Pedersen) arrived from Denmark by himself in 1923. The couple met while working on neighboring farms in the area.

One dish casserole cooking is certainly the best time saver for the working woman. Generally they can be prepared the night before and most definitely the following recipes lend themselves very well to early preparation. Besides saving time and money, with a casserole there is only the one dish to wash up.

BEV'S SHEPHERDS PIE

1 lb. hamburger
1 tin vegetable soup
4 mashed potatoes
Brown hamburger in a fry pan, then add the vegetable soup. Mix well and be sure to scrape up all the brown off the bottom of the pan. Transfer to a greased casserole dish and top with mashed potatoes. (A good way to use your leftover mashed potatoes. Bake for 30 min. at 350 degrees.

If you are cooking for two, try dividing the recipe into two small loaf tins and freeze one. If you have added the mashed potatoes this should be used in three or four weeks. When cooking the casserole before freezing, be sure to cool it completely before you freeze it.

JO'S VEAL CUTLET DINNER

1 lb. veal cutlets
4 potatoes (thinly sliced)
4 carrots (thinly sliced)
1 large onion (thinly sliced)
salt and pepper
oil
1/2 cup fine bread crumbs

Pound veal cutlets until very thin. If you don't have a mallet for this purpose, use an old rolling pin, a potato masher, a wine bottle (be careful not to break it), or I have seen someone use the blunt side of a butcher knife. I use the wine bottle; it does a great job. Dip the veal cutlets in the bread crumbs, pressing to make sure they stick. Pour a little oil in the bottom of your casserole, enough to cover the bottom. Place a layer of veal cutlet on the bottom, then layer the vegetables alternately. Sprinkle each layer of veal with oil, salt and pepper. Cover and bake for two hours at 350 degrees.

PORK CHOPS AND RICE

4 thick pork chops
4 thick slices of onion
4 thick rings of green pepper
1/2 cup rice
1 1/4 oz. tin tomato sauce
1 cup dry red wine
salt and pepper

Brown pork chops in a little fat (if you prefer your chops with the fat left on, there will be enough fat to brown them without adding more). Transfer to a shallow greased casserole and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place a slice of onion and green pepper on the top of each chop. Pour rice around the chops.

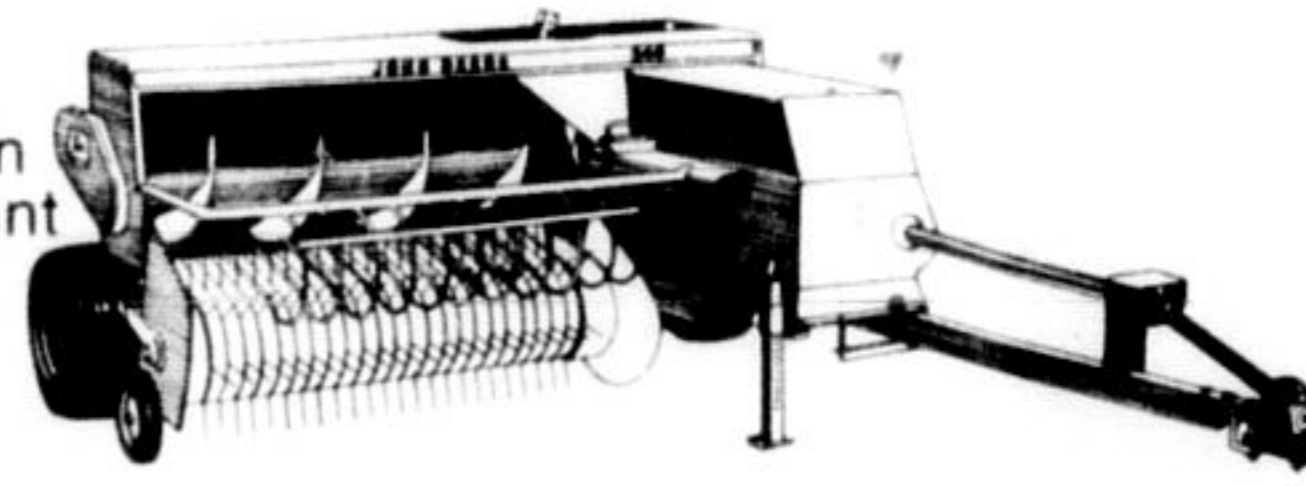
Add tomato sauce and wine to the skillet that you browned the chops in, bring to a boil and scrape all the brown up from the bottom of the pan. Pour over the pork chops and rice and bake for 2 hours at 325 covered.

This recipe is easily increased or decreased.

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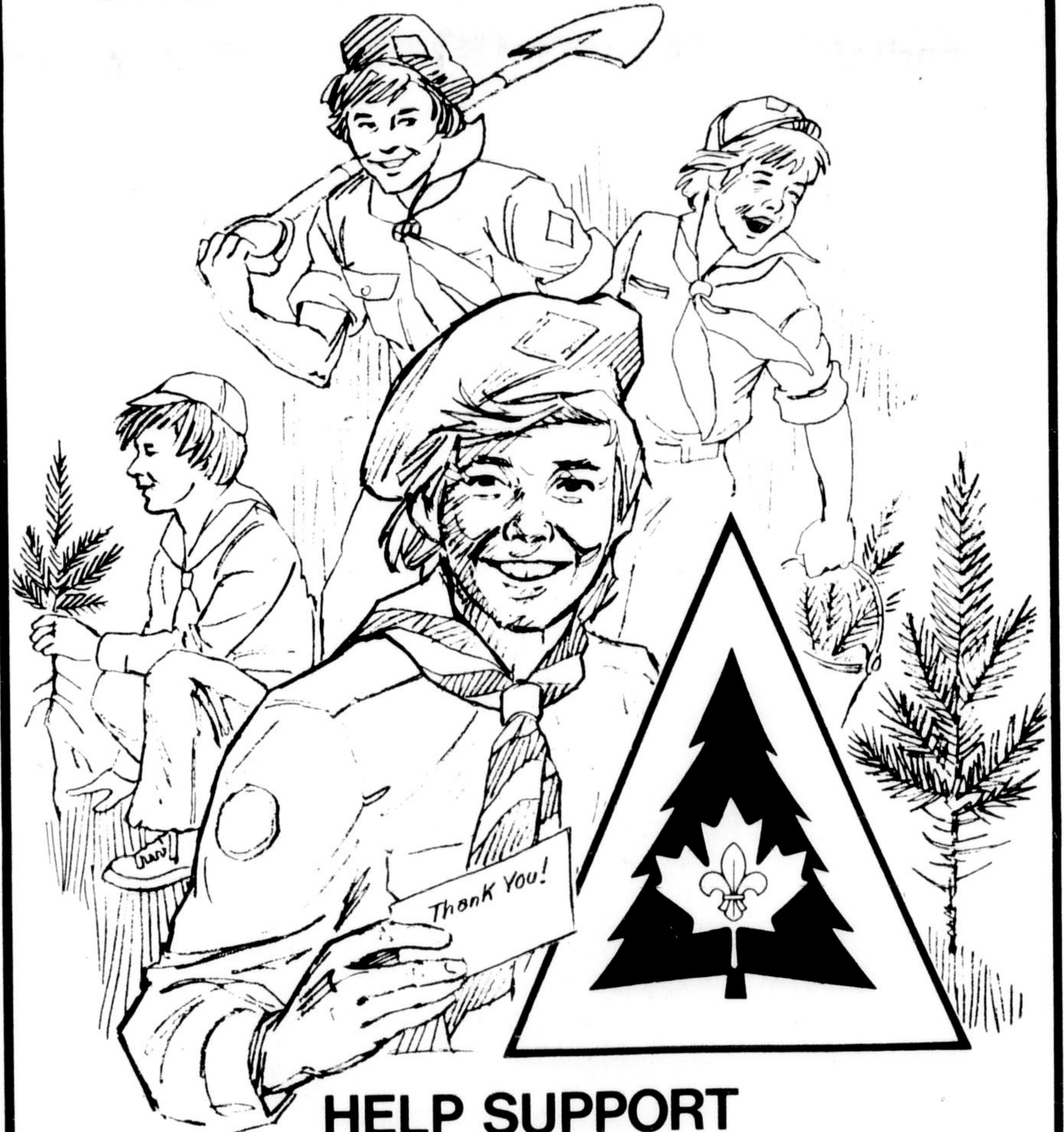
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
