Going on a holiday this year? Of course you are. Why not plan something different this year?

Have you ever taken the Polar Bear Express to James Bay? Taken a boat and fishing trip through the Thousand Islands? Camped out in Algonquin Park? Taken the boat trip up the historic French River from North Bay?

Taken a boat trip down the St. Lawrence to Old Quebec City or hundreds of other beautiful places in Ontario? All of these trips are easily within reach of today's workingman's budget.

Be adventurous, try something different this year. Get out of the old summer cottage, golf course, swimming pool rut. You won't be sorry and the kids will love you for it.

Many people are not aware that for years the Ministry of Natural Resources has been acquiring land and entering into agreements with landowners to manage areas specifically for wildlife.

Most of these areas, although heavily used by hunters on opening day are not used during the remainder of the season.

There are 40 wildlife management areas in Southern Ontario and 15 are privately-owned areas managed for hunting under agreement with the farmer.

Naturally these agreements cannot be put into a workable function in areas where farmers heavily crop and pasture the land, but in most cases there is a good relationship between the farmer and the Ministry.

As in previous years, the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters will be sponsoring a junior conservation and wildlife management school. This group of eager outdoorsmen ranges in age from 14 to 18 years and is selected from sportsmen's clubs from Thunder Bay to Sarnia.

They are selected for work in the different clubs that help to sponsor them. This is a tremendous job for the instructors, cooks, camp supervisors, etc. Did you ever try to feed 50 hungry boys three or four times a day? And try to keep them busy for 16 hours a day?

Like all other organizations that work with young people, we wish more parents would complain less, get off their butts and get involved.

Low water in Southern Ontario is hampering fishermen in the 12 and 16-mile creeks. If you are lucky enough to find a deep hole with nice-sized trout in it, that is your best bet.

The fish have also switched from minnows to dew worms. Some streams on top of the escarpment are still producing some nice speckles, if you can stand the mosquitoes and black flies that seem to be extra hungry this year.

A group of ardent fishermen from Milton travelled to Lake Temagami last week and had fair success on pike and pickerel.

Gord Hadley, Jim Strain, Bob Peddie, Bill Mearon, Gary Corp and Wayne Casson made the trip. Wayne caught a beautiful 18-pound northern pike on a small snelled hook with a live minnow for bait. That is a nice fish.

Thursday night Gallinger Motors seemed to have everything going against them as Canadian Tire beat them soundly 33-6.

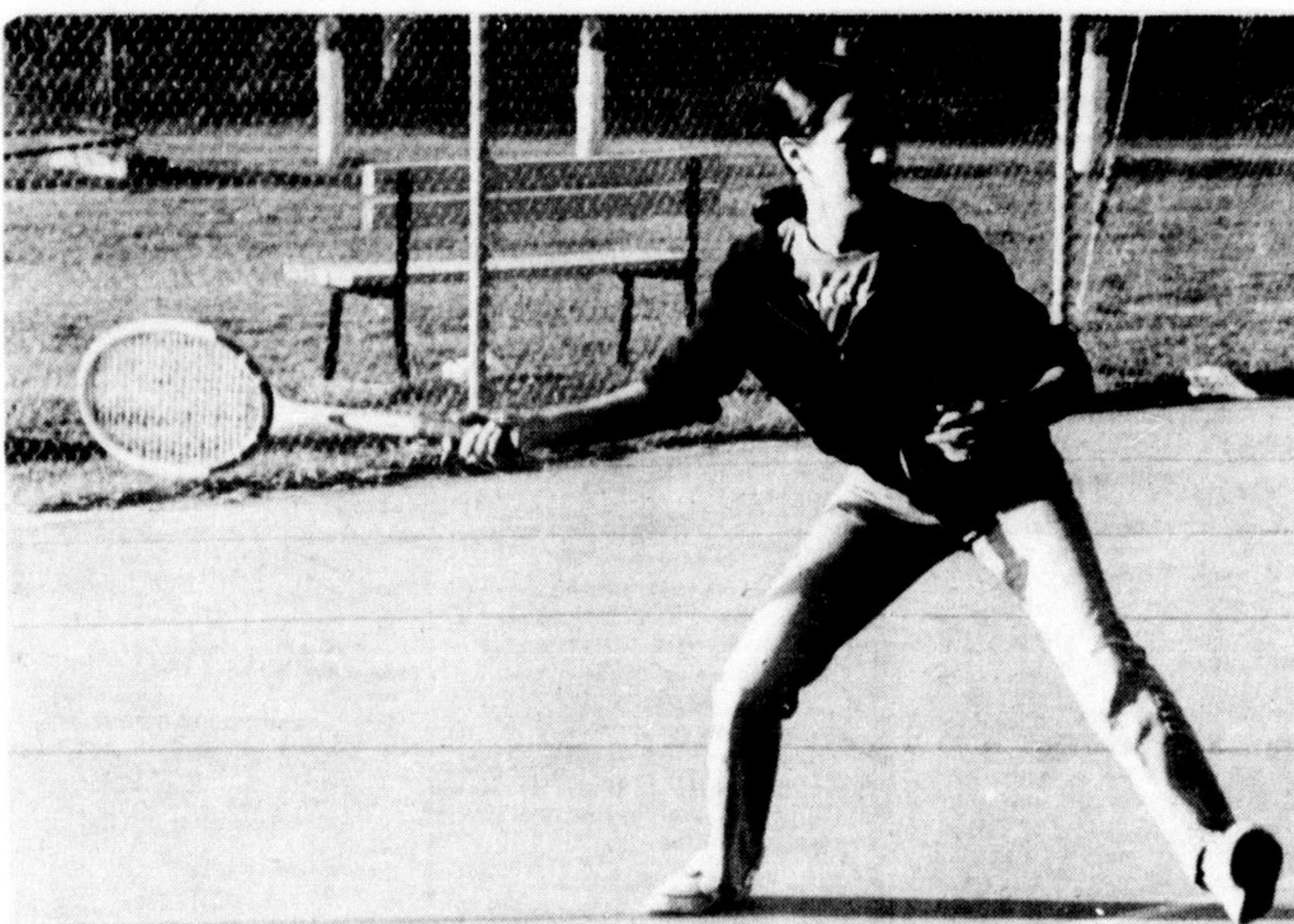

The surging Milton Olympics won their third consecutive game while knocking Hillsburgh junior North Stars from the ranks of the undefeated in a 7-4 victory Wednesday at Rotary Park.

Olympics, record in the Halton Ladies Softball League improved to 3-1 and put them in a four-way tie with the North Stars, Hillsburgh Seniors and Georgetown for first place.
