## Inspect furnaces?

Councillor Jim Watson disagreed. Soon the town would have to inspect sump pumps, air conditioners, central vacuum systems, even doorknobs, he charged. The inspector's job is to make sure the home is safe under the building by-law, period, he said.

"It keeps him going just making sure the house is built safely," he added.

## Sign warns buyers that school is full

People purchasing any of 38 single family homes at the corner of Wilson Dr. and Woodward St. in Milton will find an unusual sign the neighborhood, following a Milton Council discussion Monday evening.

Town-owned signs will warn prospective purchasers their children may not be going to the Robert Baldwin School, which sits across the

road from the site, but may be bussed or directed elsewhere.

Councillor Russ Powadiuk proposed (and won council approval for) the signs, as council passed a by-law authorizing a subdivision agreement with Halton Land Group and Dayline Investments Ltd. The firms plan 38 single family homes.

Because of overcrowding in

the schools, children from the eastern part of the Dorset Park subdivision have been bussed to the rural Pineview School. Construction of a new separate school in the neighborhood plus additions to W.I. Dick and Baldwin Public Schools will help alleviate the crowding situation, but few additional classrooms are expected before late in 1978 or early 1979.

## Industrial job boom

Industrial growth in Milton took a giant leap in June, when four industrial permits worth a total of \$873,160 were issued by Milton's building department.

Largest was a \$288,000 permit issued for a new industrial rental building on Main St. E., to Morobel Ltd. A Bronte St. plastic manufacturing industry, Prothane Ltd., took out a permit for \$267,300.

Leaver Mushrooms, Guelph Line, secured a \$272,860 permit for an addition to the mushroom plant. An industrial warehouse permit worth \$45,000 was issued to Howard Speck for a building on Harrop Dr.

The industrial permits brought the month's total to \$1,753,393 and the total to date in 1977 to \$6,548,824.

Permits included two to Ontario Hydro at \$39,000 and

\$32,000 plus a commercial renovation at Benny's Arcade, Main St., at \$50,000. Drury School got a permit for a \$6,000 greenhouse.

June permits included eight new homes, ranging in value from \$35,000 to \$170,000.

To date this year 49.46 per cent of the town's new construction has been residential, while 24.02 per cent was industrial. The commercial construction represents 24.63 per cent of the total.

## Rash of rear-enders on weekend

Three minor traffic accidents occurred Friday in Milton, with damage estimates ranging from \$20 to \$250, Halton Regional Police report.

A 1969 Ford driven by Anne Simms of Hamilton received \$50 damage when it was in collision with a 1976 Chevrolet driven by Lee Vickery of Acton. The accident occurred on the corner of Highway 25 and Steeles Ave. The Vickery car received \$250 damage.

A 1976 Oldsmobile driven by Tom Grainger of Milton received \$20 damage when it was in collision with a motorcycle driven by Steven Caputo, also of Milton. Caputo's motorcycle received \$50 damage at the scene of the mishap at Bell and Robert St.

A 1968 Chrysler driven by Gerald Zanatta of Milton escaped with no damage when it and a 1972 Ford driven by Bob Clarke, also of Milton, collided. The Clarke car received \$250 damage in the collision at the intersection of Martin St. and Steeles Ave.

Frank Berchman of Georgetown received \$800 damage to his 1970 Camaro when his car and one driven by Robert Kirk of Halton Hills collided Sunday. Kirk's 1977 Honda received \$250 damage in the mishap on Trafalgar Rd., near the 401 interchange.

## Town photographers at NAPA

Mike Primok and Scott Brennan, both members of the Milton Camera Club, recently travelled to Ottawa for an extended weekend to attend the annual conference of the National Association of Photographic Arts-Camera Canada College.

NAPA is a non-profit organization for photographers — amateurs and professionals — and its aims are to promote good Canadian photography and provide useful information for photographers.

Camera Canada College is also an annual event, held in a different Canadian city each year. This year it was on the beautiful campus at the University of Ottawa. It offered lectures, demonstrations and field trips by local, national and internationally famous photographers such as Larry Frank, Dean of the Nikon School of Photography; Andre Cabuche with a live model workshop on natural lighting for portraiture; and Harry Whitten of Braun Canada giving demonstrations on unique and various flash techniques.

Color workshops, people photography, travelogs, black and white darkrooms, photography by Ilford Canada, a journalism workshop by Bill Brennan of the Ottawa Citizen, a lecture on holography and much more were offered.

Tours were arranged through the National Film Board and the National Gallery, also the beautiful parks of Ottawa.

A wine and cheese party gave them a chance to meet photographers from across Canada and a banquet was sponsored by Kodak. A one hour multi-media presen-

tation "A Walk Through Paris", shown for the first time in Canada, gave a first look at this city of lights as seen through the eyes of six photographers.
