Resident fights police tower

There are better locations in the Speyside area for a police communications tower than the selected site behind the school, resident Lloyd Sankey told a Niagara Escarpment Commission hearing Monday. Sankey, a five year resident who is a successful architect, appealed the Commission's decision to allow Halton Regional Police to put up the 200 foot tower on land to be leased from Halton Board of Education. Hearing officer Dave Jamieson said his report will be submitted to Minister of Housing John Rhodes in about three weeks. Sankey said other sites for the tower would be more suitable since using the 3.2 acres behind the school would take up much needed recreation land. He also thought the tower would present a safety hazard to children and damage the aesthetics of the area. Sankey charged the only reason police chose the school site over others they inspected was because of it was cheap—only \$2,000 rent a year. He said he fully supports the police and their need for better communications but thought the tower should go elsewhere. Sankey presented 16 signed copies of a petition he sent to approximately 100 Speyside residents. Halton Board of Education representative for Esquesing Bert Hinton also objected to

the tower going on school property but admitted his opinion wasn't that of the majority of board members. Inspector Walter Southward of the Halton Regional Police said numerous sites in Speyside were inspected and the school site was the only one available to the force which would work. He explained the tower is desperately needed for communications to officers in Georgetown, Milton, Esquesing, Nassagaweya and Acton. Southward emphasized 55,000 residents and 68 officers are depending on the tower so police can do a better job in the north. He noted since the force was formed in 1974 there have been continual communication problems, especially in Acton. He said officers in Acton are afraid to take calls since communications are bad and some have been assaulted when communications problem prevented them from calling for help. Sankey agreed communications need to be improved and he supports a Speyside site, just not at the school. He added he shares Southward's view of policing in Acton stating per capita Acton is one of the "worst" communities in Canada. He said he won't let his children on the streets of Acton at night. Southward said if the Speyside tower is turned down the

police will have real problems. He explained three transmitters would then be needed and the force can't get three more frequencies. "This is the only site we have found that will get a signal into Milton, Georgetown and Acton on one frequency," Southward declared.

Group seeks name

The board of directors of a proposed residence for physically handicapped people is asking the public to help find a name for the home. The residence, which will be located in a renovated house at 1401 Ontario St. in downtown Burlington, is intended as a permanent home for six to eight handicapped adults who don't need full institutional care. The existing house will be modified architecturally to accommodate the needs of the disabled. The Burlington residence, slated to open Oct. 29, will be one of a network of approximately 145 group homes established throughout the world by Cheshire Homes. The foundation's first home was started in London shortly after W.W. II by Victoria Cross recipient Leonard Cheshire. The initiative for the Halton home came from members of Oakville's Maycourt Club. Some Cheshire homes are named after the founder while others are named after streets and towns. A committee headed by Earl Fenton of Oakville has been set up to receive name suggestions. Mrs. Anne Allison of Burlington is assisting Mr. Fenton. Deadline for submissions is Aug. 15. Submissions can be mailed to Mr. Fenton, Halton Cheshire Homes Inc., Box 985, Oakville, L6J 5E8. Further information can be obtained from Mrs. Allison at 639-4212. According to Jean Eldon, who is in charge of publicity, Halton Cheshire Homes Inc. is now accepting applications for residence. Solve hold-up

Milton Optimist Club's plans for a youth centre at Brian Best Park ran into problems when it was discovered a clear title to the land was not immediately available. But Milton Council has solved the legal entanglement — council is allowing the project to proceed, pending the sale of the land from the town to the club. A staff report at last week's council meeting reported only the northern half of the town-owned parcel is registered under land titles. To have the entire site registered takes about two months, and this would delay the club's building project until the winter weather. A resolution passed by council allows the construction, "pending the eventual sale of the site to the club" and also allows the Optimists to obtain the necessary bank financing. The youth centre is a \$335,000 project. A second difficulty arose when it was discovered an existing watermain and hydro service had to be moved. The Optimists agreed to pay for the relocation, at a cost of \$12,500.
