

Coach Hymers is confident Tridents to have contender

The Milton Tridents Intermediate B hockey club has slated training camp tryouts to open Sunday, Sept. 18 at the Thompson Rd. Arena and have named Carl Hymers as coach.
Hymers, 35, of 742 Woodward Ave. in Milton was playing coach of the Charles Hotel Industrial team in 1972-73 and scored the final goal in a 4-2 win over Port Dover for the Ontario Championship.
The Milton Industrial team entered the OHA playdowns by first defeating the last place team and fighting up the ladder to the championship.
Hymers said he is hungry again and is looking forward to the coming season. He knows Tridents previous coach Joe Auger well and assisted him at various practices.
Hymers mailed personal letters to Tridents who have played with the team over the past two years inviting them to come to camp but he told The Champion that he would

like to see some new faces as well.
Hymers played his junior hockey with St. Mary's Lincolns while attending teachers college.
He taught in Toronto for five years and in Milton six years. This coming year he will be vice-principal of McKenzie-Smith School in Acton.
Hymers said that Milton has always had a provincially strong contender and came one game from the provincial finals two years in a row, won one title. He's anxious and said he hopes to have a contender and provide entertaining hockey for the local fans.
He said he won't pretend to provide the same ruckus as the juniors but hopes to establish a following for the club.
He is giving overage junior players a chance to continue playing hockey and has personally invited a few to training camp.
As far as senior hockey, Hymers has played Intermediate A in Georgetown and Senior hockey in Orillia.

Last year there was a lot of comment and concern about players who would not make away games but showed at home or during playoffs.
Hymers said that he considered players and rolled these problems through his head well before accepting the coaching position.
He said one has to remember this is intermediate hockey and for the majority if not all the players,

their main priority in life is still making a living.
Hymers said he respects the job commitment players may have, shift work.
"All I can hope for and ask is that a person is able to let me know," he said.
If the situation exists like last year where the team rolls out of town with 11 or 12 players it will be frustrating for Hymers. He understands that some players will miss a

few games and he hopes he can predict those times and be able to arrange that the team does leave for an away game with a full compliment of players.
"I'll have the same commitments to my work and I can't guarantee that I'll make all the games," Hymers told The Champion. He knows it is a delicate situation but is optimistic things can be worked out.
The team is allowed to sign between 20-25 players only dressing 17, including two goaltenders which will leave players for scheduling. He said he hopes to blend the team membership so minor conflicts can be avoided.
"I'm putting my faith in players who make the team that they will take some responsibility," he said. In short, Hymers would like to do what he did four years ago which led to an Ontario Championship.

After much discussion and deliberation by our Members of Parliament, the federal government has finally put some teeth into new boating regulations.
These were passed in October 1976 but will now be administered by the Ministry of Natural Resources and enforced in this province by the Ontario Provincial Police.
The bulk of the new legislation applies to Southern Ontario waterways such as the Rideau Canal, the Muskoka Lakes region and the Trent-Severn Waterways.
Speed limits have been cut from 10 miles per hour to six on these waterways and one of the best regulations (not dealing with speed) we think is that no boats are allowed on the Niagara River within three miles of the falls.
After many deaths resulting from people being washed over our scenic falls from power boat failures, sheared pins and just plain human stupidity of getting too close, it is ironic that the government has to pass laws protecting people from themselves.

After a few frustrating years experienced by anglers fishing Lake Nipissing, the angling in the lake has improved 50 per cent over the past couple of months. After a poor producing start in the spring, fishermen are now pulling out lovely two-to-four pound pickerel around Gull Rock, Musky Bay and Cross Point areas of the Lake.
Fishing in Lake St. Clair is very good again this year, but you must be reminded of the restrictions on eating fish from this controversial lake.
The salmon run in Lake Ontario is expected to start around the first of September and this is the best time to catch these silver beauties. They start to school about two miles off shore, coming out from the Bronte and Credit Rivers. At this point they hit your lure hard and fight like a tiger.
It's thrilling to hook one of these 15 to 25 lb. fish and at this time of year they are a bright silver and the meat a whitish pink and firm. When they get up river they turn dark and the meat gets soft.
It is not too early to start your planning early morning trips to Lake Ontario. Remember, it is a large body of water and you have to respect its power, especially when you are out in a small boat.

It is interesting to note that the Ministry of Natural Resources has released four Alberta Peregrine Falcons in Algonquin Provincial Park. These birds are on the endangered species list. These birds were trained over 100 years ago by European falconists and it is a highly intelligent bird which can dive at fantastic speeds. Let's hope they multiply in Ontario.

As our holiday season reaches its peak, more and more needless drownings are resulting from boating accidents. Please, put life jackets on your children. A sudden storm or passing thoughtlessness could put you in trouble.

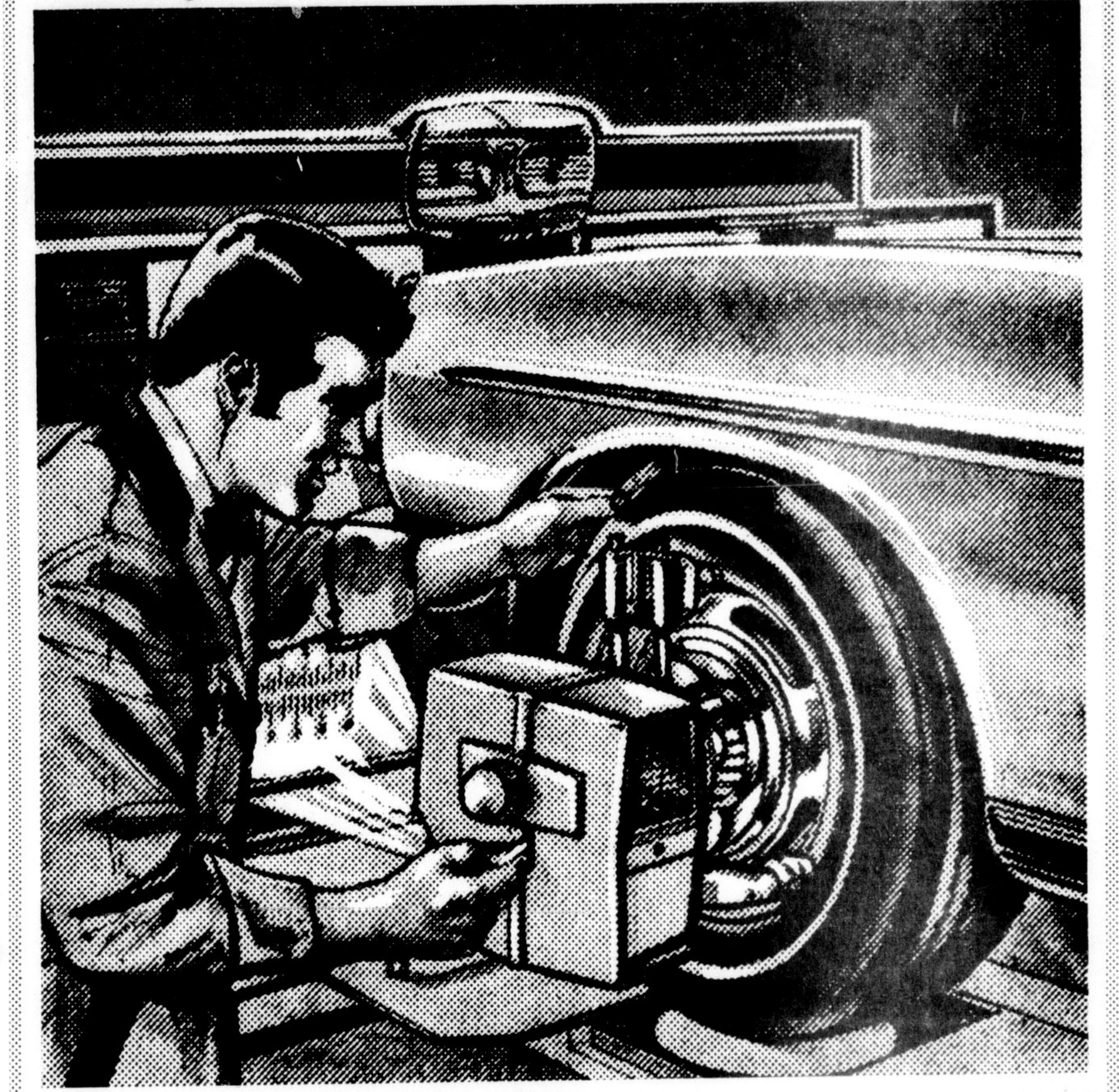

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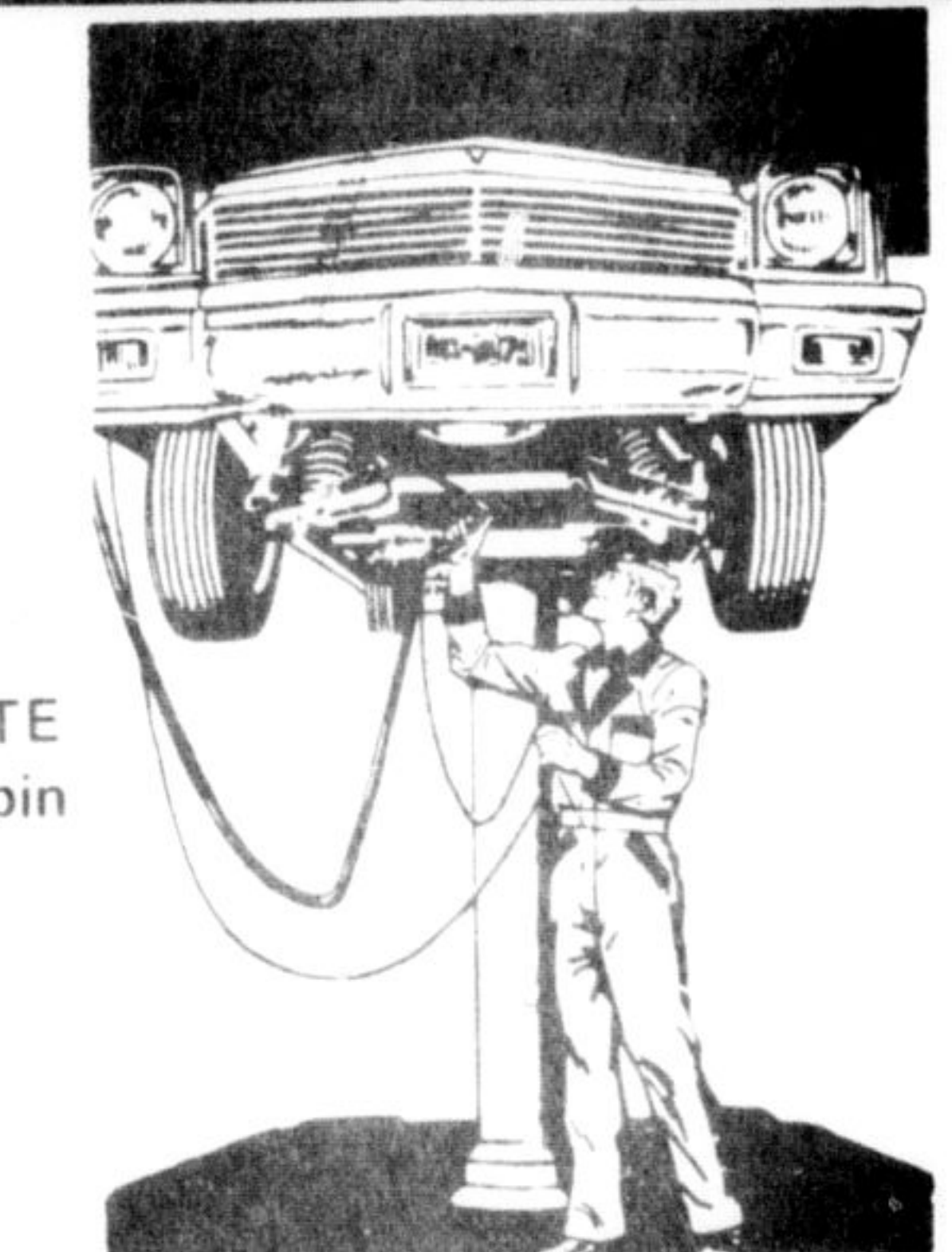
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
