Game & Fish News

It seems that people are totally dedicated to selfdestruction. For at lease four or five years unlicensed fishermen on Lake Ontario and Lake Michigan have been netting salmon and trout contaminated with the toxic chemical PCB, polychlorinated biphenyls, and selling them to people who cannot help but know the fish are dangerous to eat. They are expecially dangerous for children and pregnant women.

The lake trout from Lake Michigan have been declared unfit for human consumption by health officials. At least 800,000 lbs. were caught and sold illegally last year.

PCB is an industrial waste linked to cancer, impaired fertility, birth defects and impaired vision. Lake Ontario is not as contaminated as Lake Michigan, but again, don't eat too much each week and please be careful.

This has been an excellent year for guide Dan Hales of Lake Simcoe. Despite many days of cool, windy weather, Dan managed to keep most of his appointments. The biggest catch and his record day was when a 33 lb. trout, a record for Lake Simcoe, was landed. The Ontario record for Lake Trout is a 41 pounder taken in 1961.

One day he took a party out that included Rick Blinn of Toronto. Rick landed the trophy trout and on the same day took another trout at 23½ pounds.

The following day Dan took another party of four who nabbed six fish, the largest being 24 lbs. and the smallest three pounds. So on Dave's boat, catching fish is neither by luck or accident. Needless to say, his boat is booked solid all summer.

There are as many as 65 deer in herds in Haldimand County this past three months. According to residents the deer are destroying crops and causing accidents on the roads. On the roads of the Niagara Peninsula and Haldimand last year, 200 deer were killed, causing thousands of dollars in damages to vehicles and injuring passengers.

Douglas Townsend of the Ministry says they could set up a three day hunt for this fall, but cannot; the reason being objections from councillors. The three day hunt would only be harvesting a good crop and bringing the deer herds to a safe level.

The Halton Sportsmen's Club has weathered a small, stormy summer caused by a few members who sometimes say things they don't really mean. Our club, and one that I am proud to say that I am a member of, has served and prospered for over 25 years. 
