THE ONTARIO MUNICIPAL BOARD may approve of the said by-law but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the by-law will be considered. Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection or notice of support and who have left with or delivered to the Clerk undersigned, the address to which notice of hearing is to be sent.

### THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF FLAMBOROUGH BY-LAW No. 77-53-EF-Z TO AMEND THE ZONING BY-LAW No. 75-65-EF-Z

WHEREAS, the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Flamborough deems it desirable and expedient that the Zoning By-Law No. 75-65-EF-Z of the area formerly comprised of the Township of East Flamborough, now being part of the Township of Flamborough be amended as hereinafter set forth.

NOW THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of The Township of Flamborough enacts as follows:

1. Clause c) of subsection 8.2.3, Regulations for Uses permitted in paragraph (iii) in clause a) of subsection 8.1 of Section B: Agricultural A Zone of By-Law No. 75-65-EF-Z is hereby amended by deleting said Clause c) and substituting therefore the following:

(c) All buildings and structures shall have to comply with the requirements and regulations of competent jurisdictions.

Animal wastes shall be disposed of in accordance with normal farming practices subject to the provisions of The Environmental Protection Act 1971, and regulations made thereunder and subject to the approval of the Medical Officer of Health, if required.

2. If this By-Law is approved by the Ontario Municipal Board it comes into force and effect as of the date of enactment and passing thereof.

### EXPLANATORY NOTE TO BY-LAW 77-53-EF-Z TOWNSHIP OF FLAMBOROUGH

The purpose of this by-law is to amend the zoning by-law 75-65-EF-Z of the former Township of East Flamborough, now in the Township of Flamborough.

In an Agricultural zone it is now required under section 8.2.3 that no building or structure used for any agricultural use which may be objectionable by emission of odour such as poultry farms, fur farms, mushroom farms, piggeries, hatcheries, and similar uses, buildings and structures accessory thereto, shall be located:

- (i) Closer than 200 feet to any lot line.
- (ii) Closer than 500 feet to any lot line abutting a street.
- (iii) Closer than 1,000 feet to any residential and institutional zone or to any residential or institutional use, except the dwelling of the owner or operator of the use or uses permitted.

BY-LAW 77-53-EF-Z will amend the zoning regulations to delete the present set back requirements and disposal of animal waste requirements and require that any such agricultural use shall comply with the regulations of competent jurisdiction such as the Agricultural Code of practice set by the Ministry of Agriculture and Food and the Ministry of the Environment and the Ministry of Housing.

### EXPLANATORY NOTES RE RESTRICTED AREA BY-LAW AMENDMENT APPEAL AND OFFICIAL PLAN AMENDMENT REFERRAL

The existing restricted area by-law permits Agriculture and Open Space uses on the subject lands. The purpose and effect of the proposed amendment is to permit the construction, operation and maintenance by Ontario Hydro of high voltage transmission lines and uses incidental thereto as shown on the draft schedule attached to the proposed by-law.

The existing official plan designation of the subject lands is Rural, Recreational-Conservation, Hazard Lands and Special Policy Area. The purpose and effect of the proposed amendment is to permit the construction, operation and maintenance by Ontario Hydro of high voltage transmission lines and uses incidental thereto within the corridors shown on the map attached to the draft official plan amendment.

The proposed official plan amendment corresponds with amendments contained in the restricted area by-law amendment appeal.

## Woman looks for 'hot' tomatoes

The mysterious disappearance of five tomatoes from the Milton Fall Fair this year, has caused one annoyed entrant to call for tighter security.

Mrs. Alfred Woolridge entered a selection of five tomatoes in the vegetable class on Friday, Sept. 23. When her son, Ray, returned to the fair to pick up the entry on Sunday afternoon, the tomatoes were no longer there.

"I don't know what happened," said Mrs. Woolridge, "but it is the principle of the thing, to think that anyone could be so low as to walk off with them."

Mrs. H. Hall, secretary-treasurer of the Fair Board stated that Mrs. Woolridge's entry was definitely entered and judged, but her tomatoes were not on the winners' list.

"I really cannot understand how anybody could have walked off with them. The entries are placed behind three feet of wire mesh caging and nobody can get their fingers behind that wire," explained Mrs. Hall. She also said guards were kept on the grounds to prevent such incidents.

Entrants were allowed to pick up their produce Sunday afternoon, but each entrant was checked at the door for a pass, before being allowed in, according to Mrs. Hall.

Mrs. Bruce Bird, caretaker of the building said there were a few leftover fruits and vegetables, but no tomatoes.

Mrs. Woolridge said she heard of this type of problem occurring before. If it does happen she stated, there should be more guards and better security.

1978 budget include enough money to hire a student for four months, to cover the town knocking on doors to sell dog tags. Councillors are worried there are hundreds of untagged dogs.

The cost of dog control service is rising, but the sale of tags doesn't cover the cost, Councillor Jim Watson pointed out. Last year, dog tag sales brought in \$6,772 but dog control cost the town \$16,503 and the town had to pay out \$2,548 in stock claims, part of which is attributable to loose dogs.

This year the budget predicts a cost of \$20,800 while dog tag sales will only bring in one-third of that figure, or \$7,000.

Councillor Watson felt a tag salesman would pay his own wages if he found untagged dogs and forced the owners to shell out for a tag.

Treasurer Don Lougheed told council he recently found one home had eight dogs - none of them tagged - and pressure was brought to bear on the owner. The move brought in \$40.
