

Several new presentations on tap for commencement

"And all our knowledge is ourselves to know," will express the theme of this year's Milton District High School Commencement, this Friday, Oct. 28 at 8 p.m. Taken from Pope's work, Essay on Man, the theme was chosen by Nan Hurst, an English teacher at the school and chairman of this year's commencement committee.

The commencement will be rather special for all involved according to Mrs. Hurst, who says the school will be the recipient for several new presentations. These will include the Milton District High School Literary Club Award, to be awarded to Grade 10 student Paul Van Oorschot, who is also receiving the Wilfred Crozier Shield and the Halton Board of Education Proficiency Prize for grade 10.

Daniel Baynton will receive the new Milton Automotive and Industrial Supplies Ltd. award, which was formerly donated by Oakville Automotive and Industrial Supplies Ltd.

The Halton Board of Secretaries' Association will this year present Tamara Lopez with a \$75 award. This award comes to Milton District High School every third year, following Acton and Georgetown. A similar award, the Oakville-Milton

Professional Engineers' Award will be presented to James Clarridge.

Gerald DeKoeber has been chosen by his fellow students to present the valedictorian speech. He is also the recipient of the Milton Rotary Club Music Award with Stephen Willoughby, a minor student council award, and is also an Ontario Scholar. Olga Tarnawsky, the prime minister of the student council, will present Mr. DeKoeber with his valedictorian medal.

Among the firsts for Milton District High School will be the recognition of the new vice-president of the school, Peter Gnish as Grand Marshal for the event.

Although the Milton Canadian Legion has withdrawn its award of \$2,000 from the program, several other awards have been increased according to Mrs. Hurst.

"I think it is important we have these awards," stated Mrs. Hurst, "because these kids certainly work for them and have a lot more work

ahead of them. These awards are encouraging for them and certainly make me happy."

In addition to the Ray Deumer Memorial Award and Plaque for a top year five geography student, Solex Industrial Handling Equipment Ltd. of Campbellville will also present \$100 to the recipient. This year's winner is Barbara Pearce, also an Ontario scholar.

Dan Dales, a first year student will receive both the Halton Board of Education Proficiency Prize and the first year English award, to be presented by the Campbellville Women's Institute.

For Proficiency in first year typing and accounting, Betty Van Shannon will receive the Harris Stationery prize of \$50.

Rosemary Windmoller, a year four student has captured three awards, including the Halton Board of Education Proficiency prize for year three, the John Milton Chapter I.O.D.E. Trophy and Award and the Peter Larner Memorial Plaque for year four geography.

The annual Milton District High School Technical Staff Award goes to Brett Patterson. Grabbing the Halton Board of Education Proficiency prize for year four, the George Dawson Shield and

the Student Council Honor Roll Plaque is Toni Richards.

The Milton Chansonettes Award for year four music goes to two students, Erin Perry and Daniel Warren.

Deborah McMillan will receive the Milton Rotary Club Award of \$250. The Rockwell International of Canada Ltd. Plaque and Award of \$100 goes to Paul Kubinec, with the Russell Leadership Trophy going to Caroline Chuchmach and the LeRoy Inglis Memorial Plaque going to Alice Appleton.

William Walker, an Ontario Scholar will receive the Halton Board of Education Proficiency Prize, the Pickett Shield and the Evening Star Rebekah Lodge No. 79 Scholarship of \$100.

Capturing two mathematics awards is William Sikora, also an Ontario Scholar. He will receive the P.L. Robertson Scholarship of \$100 and the Canada Trust Scholarship of \$50.

The Milton Oddfellows Lodge No. 92 Scholarship for sociology, goes to Kimberly Kingdon. A \$500 award from the Milton Lions Club will be presented to Brian Whiffin, with the Ted Hood Memorial Award of \$125 going to John Roskam.

Student Council awards for English and History will go to William Walker and Barbara Pearce for English, and Lori Van Byskirk for History. The recipient for this year's Ontario Provincial Police Association Proficiency Scholarship of \$300 is Jacqueline Graham.

Alison Brown is this year's winner of the John Milton Chapter I.O.D.E. Scholarship and the Terry DeLaurier Citizenship Cup.

Finally, the Wilfred Laurier University Award of \$500 will go to Louisa Bakker. As well, there will be presentation of Student Council Awards to year five students.

Crash cost \$2,700

A car accident involving two area people, caused more than \$2,500 in car damages.

The collision occurred on the Guelph Line, north of 15 Sideroad, when one of the two cars involved lost control and skidded into the other vehicle, according to Halton Regional Police.

Kathleen Blacklock, 16, of 412 Highside Dr. in Milton driving a 1973 Mercury collided with a car driven by Edward Hooker, 27, from Concession 3, Campbellville. Damage to the Blacklock car is estimated at \$200 and \$2,500 to the Hooker vehicle.

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Fatal car crash

A fatal crash involving three cars on Highway 401 during the weekend, sent three people to Milton District Hospital with serious injuries.

Dead is Lorne Albert Grieve, 40 years old, from Mississauga. Mr. Grieve, accompanied by his daughter Kelly 14, and son Steven 10, was travelling westbound on Highway 401, when he was struck head on by a car driven by Samuel Charters, 26, of Markham, travelling eastbound on Highway 401.

Also involved in the crash was 17-year-old Claude Arnold Whitford of Kitchener. Travelling eastbound on 401, Mr. Whitford crossed the median and struck the guard rail on the shoulder of the westbound lane. Mr. Whitford

escaped injuries, OPP said. Steven Grieve was discharged from hospital Monday, but his sister Kelly remains in stable condition. Mr. Charters is listed in critical condition.

Damage to the Grieve and Charters vehicles is estimated at \$800 each. Damage to the Whitford car is estimated at \$2,400.

The accident occurred on Highway 401 at the Fifth Line.

More volunteers needed

Christine Armstrong heads CAS volunteer workers

Christine Armstrong's experience with volunteer work goes back to her teenage years and this commitment to the volunteer concept is one of the special talents she brings to her new job as volunteer-coordinator of the Halton Region Children's Aid Society.

Mrs. Armstrong was former director of the Burlington Volunteer Bureau and joined Halton C.A.S. recently as full-time co-ordinator of volunteer activities.

Volunteer's efforts to help the professional staff with troubled families and children not only substantially reduce costs to the agency but ease some of the workload of overburdened professional staff. Mrs. Armstrong states that "The role of the volunteer with this agency is an integral part of its operation. What volunteers contribute is essential - not only because of the variety of talents and expertise they offer but also their warmth and interest provides a personal touch."

In addition there are opportunities for receiving additional training that gives a volunteer the opportunity to broaden their life skills. Conversely this intimate involvement means that conscientious volunteers can be assured of interesting assignments like taking a winsome pre-schooler to play therapy, teenager's to doctors' appointments or families to

court.

Mrs. Armstrong currently works with a group of 80 volunteers but she needs many more people to help with the agency's work throughout the region. At the moment, there is a pressing need for volunteers who are willing to drive - particularly in the Georgetown and Milton areas. These volunteers re-

ceive 20 cents a mile to offset the cost. Other urgent needs include volunteers willing to work with children in a play setting, tutors for students and people interested in participating in activities for adults.

The main thrust of Christine's new job will be setting up new programs using volunteers as resource people.

Volunteers with C.A.S. move from working with

clients on a very casual basis to something more challenging as he or she grows and develops. But throughout each step the volunteer receives guidance and help from Christine and the agency's social workers as well as a well-rounded introduction to the agency's work
