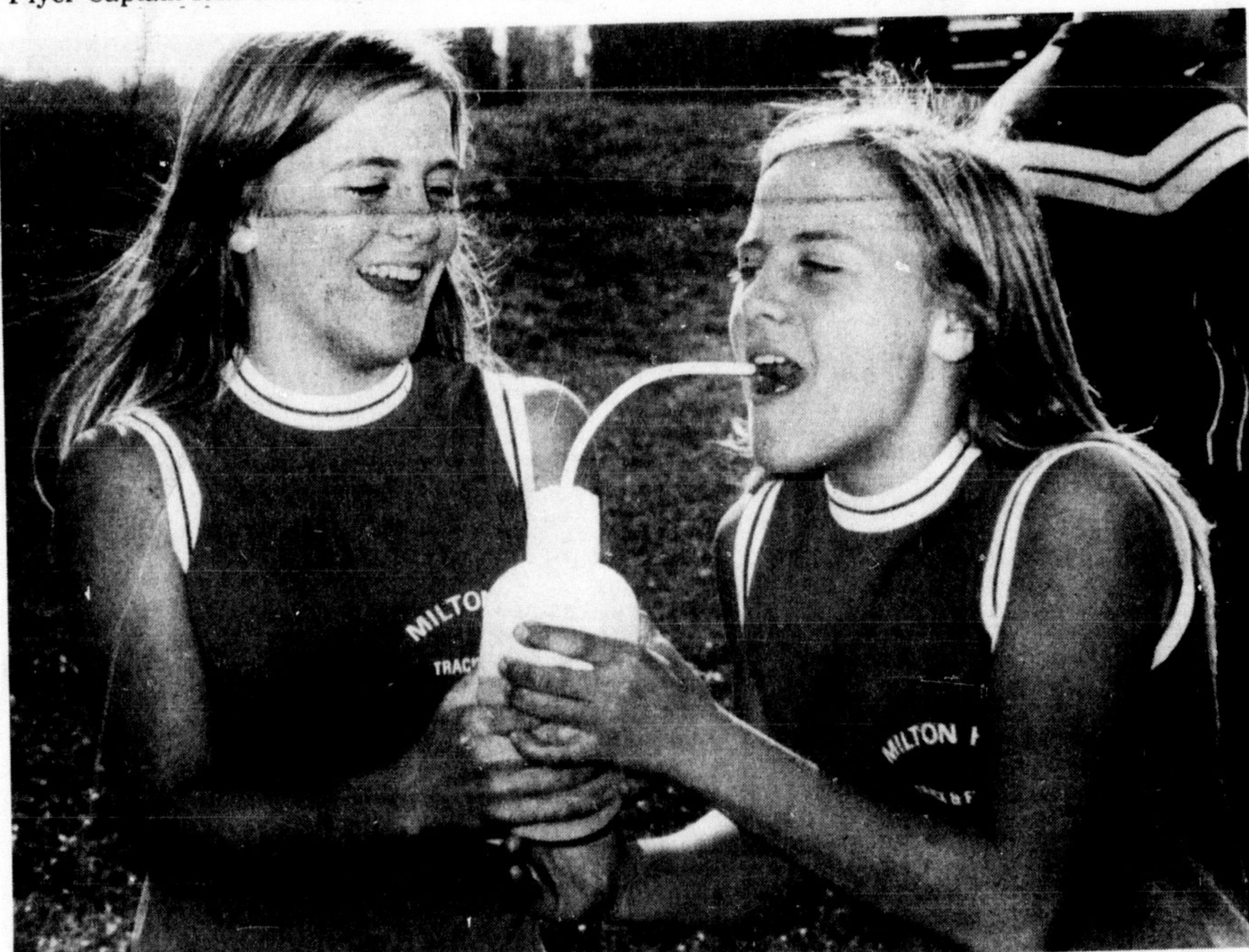


Flyers lose by seconds 8-7 to determined Derbys

MDHS junior boys' team fares best local entries

It was Milton District High School's junior boys who came through for the locals in the Halton High School Cross Country meet held Wednesday at Kelso Conservation Park.
The MDHS junior boys placed second in the team standings, just below Georgetown. Milton finished with 38 points while Georgetown garnered top spot with 12. Milton defeated Acton who had 86 and Lord Elgin with 103.
The excellent finish of the junior boys pulled the overall boys' placings of Milton to third spot from fourth. Milton's midget boys and senior team both placed fourth in the team standings.
Milton placed fourth in midget girls' but didn't fare well in the overall girls' standings.

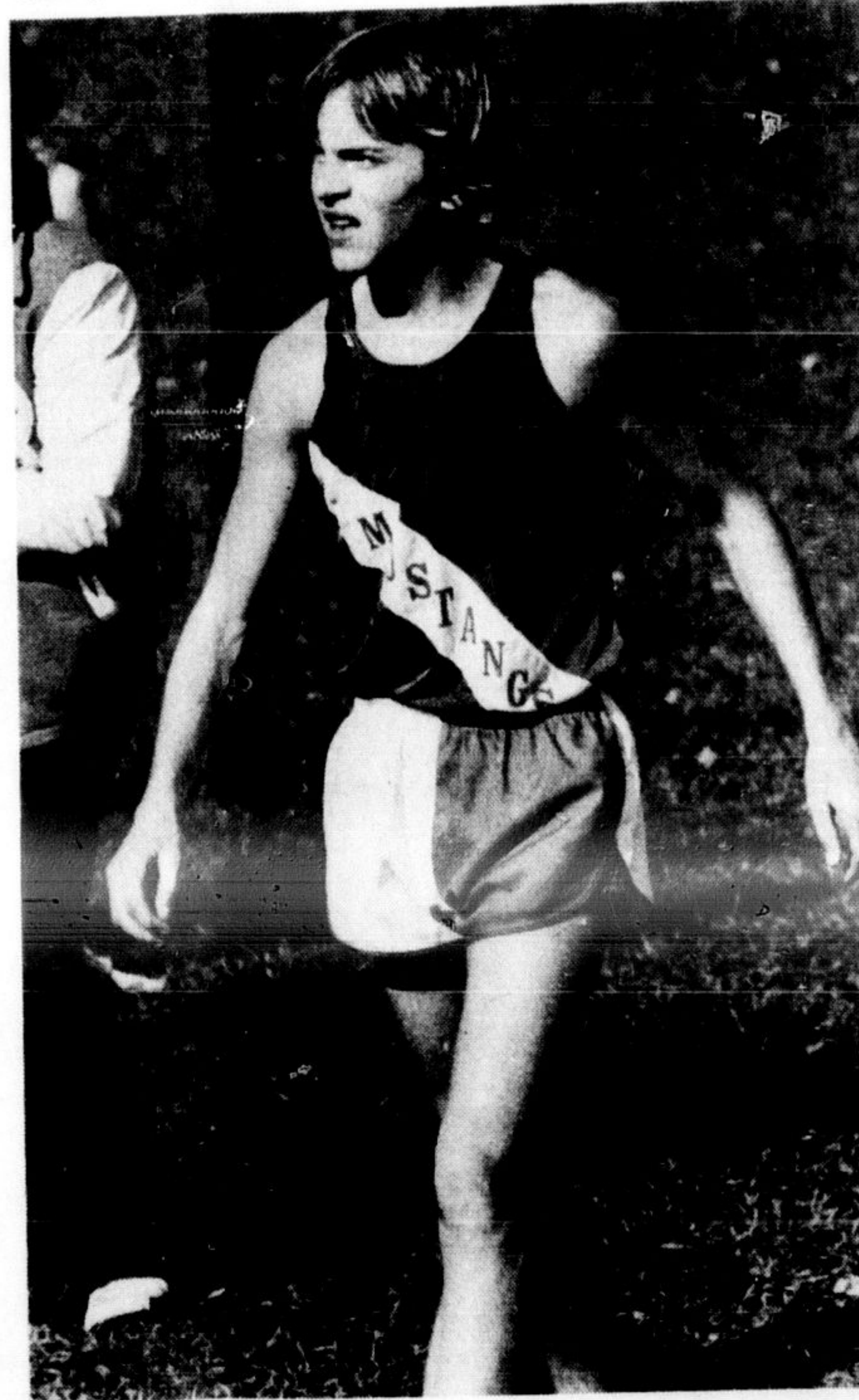

Other Milton boys in junior contention were Rod Kingson who finished 21, Randy Walshe 23, and Mark Tonna 25. Steve Vervacke, Allan Turner and Peter Schmidt also ran for the junior team.
The fourth place Milton Seniors who ran 7200 meters were headed by Dave Whytock who finished 13th in a time of 25:13. Scott Watkins ran 20th in 26:38 and Brad Mitchell finished 26th with Mits Nishimura in 31st place.
The winners in the seniors were Jim Groves of White Oaks with 21:06 time, Jim Lamb of Lord Elgin second and Lyn Chapman and Bruce McIntyre of Georgetown third and fourth.
In the midget boys' Milton's top runner was Reg Galway who finished 14th in a time of 15:54. Paul Copeland was the next Milton runner in 16th and Mike Baumlner ran 26th. Other runners for the local midgets

were Roger Banner 36th, Jim Teggart 38th, Donnie Pickett 39th, Doug McColeman 47th and Alfred Kayer 52nd.
The bright spot of the MDHS girls' midget team was the placing of the Willoughby twins. Hilary Will-

oughby finished fourth, running the 3000 meters in a time of 12:50. Sister Gillian placed sixth with a time of 12:59. Patti Turner place 17th and Sabine Schmidt ran in 32nd spot.
Winner of the midget girls' race was Linda Orr of Aldershot who completed the course in 12:01. Heather Reed and Brenda Brauno of Georgetown placed second and third just ahead of Milton's Hilary Willoughby.
Kim Hobden won the junior girls for Nelson High of Burlington in 11:26. Sandra Brush was second, also from Nelson, in 11:30. Chris McKay from White Oaks ran third.
Top Milton runner in the junior girls was Toni Chambers who finished 11th in 13:12. Karen Asp placed 15th.
There were no Milton runners in the senior girls' class. Cathy Clark of Georgetown walked away with first place, running the 4000 meters in 15:38. Janet Beatty of T.A. Blakelock was second in 15:59 and Janette Wood of Oakville-Trafalgar High was third.
Georgetown placed first overall in the team championships with Acton placing second.

Brampton
Flyers were strong enough to take a 5-4 win from Brampton Logan Chevys Sunday night. Brampton captain Randy Hunt opened scoring, assisted by Dave Lowcock but Flyers bounced back as Brian Gordon scored his first of two at 7:30 assisted by Steve Wilson and Brett Patterson. Gordon's second at 19:36 on a power play was assisted by Twiss and Gooding.

Flyers jumped into a 3-1 lead 32 seconds into the second period as Bruce Ellison made an unassisted effort. Twiss scored Flyers' fourth at 11:46 on a power play and was assisted by Gooding and Gordon.

Brampton had to catch Flyers and started at 16:49. Being down 4-1 had Rob Campbell fired up. Campbell scored two, just over a minute apart with Dave Lowcock assisting on both. With 11 seconds remaining in the period, Ellison scored for Milton. Gordon and Twiss were credited with assists.

The only goal in the third period was fired by Brampton's Cam Stuart at the 16:08 mark.

Streetsville
Last Tuesday Flyers travelled to Streetsville for their first game with the Derbys and came out gunning for Friday. Derbys handed their hometown crowd a 6-3 win over the Flyers after finishing the first period in a 2-2 draw.

Derby Jim Baker opened scoring at 6:04 of the first but 46 seconds later Milton's Rick Jacklin tied it up with Gasper Paul assisting. Flyers went ahead on a power play at 15:11 with Paul McCann scoring from Gooding. Streetsville tied it at 2-2 with Bill Brodie's goal, with Jim Baker leading the puck for the marker.

Derbys broke loose in the second period, marking three unanswered tallies. Steve Blair, Chandler and Baker scored on Ian Roberts.

Flyers added their final goal at 4:55 of the third period as Derek Griffiths from Gooding and Paul bulged the Derby twine behind Rick Laferriere. Derby Strong fired their only third period marker at 17:14.

Flyers will host Georgetown Gemini here Friday at 8 p.m. at Milton Memorial Arena on Thompson Rd.

Georgetown has eight games under their belt but have yet to get all their big guns on the ice in the same game. Two of their top shooters Terry Turner and Doug Barnes haven't been playing much.

Turner has only played one game so far. He sat out the first three on suspension and was injured in the fourth game after scoring the winning goal. His injury has kept him from the lineup. Barnes, who was the second highest scorer in the league last year, has missed four games in suspensions.

Georgetown is the only team which has lost to Acton Sabres and that was in their season opener. Since then they have managed three wins, by two goals over Acton Sabres, and by one goal over Burlington Cougars and Brampton Chevys. But it was Georgetown who handed Streetsville a tie which, with Oakville's win, keeps Derbys in second place.

Martin Street top Srs. in Halton cross country

Martin St. School of Milton broke Georgetown Centennial's chances of making a clean sweep of the team titles at the Halton public school cross country championships held at Kelso Conservation Park Tuesday morning.
Martin St. grabbed the senior team championship with 103 points, just ahead of Centennial with 108 and E. J. James in third with 113.
Centennial topped the boys' teams with 36 points ahead of second place Stewarttown with 39 and Martin St. with 45.
In the girls' group E. J. James was on top, Martin St. had 58 points for second and Rolling Meadows school was third with 64.
But Centennial of Georgetown garnered bantam, junior and intermediate team titles.
The top showing by Martin St. was in Tina Panter and Jackie Llewellyn's performances in the senior girls. Panter ran a time of 6:04 for third place and Llewellyn was right behind in fourth in 6:15. The pair split first and second

places in the North Halton run a week earlier.
Barton Veinott, also of Martin St. placed first in the senior boys' race to add to his first place run in the North Halton. His time of 7:23 was three seconds slower than in the north competition a week before but still was enough to win.
Dave Shaw of Martin St. was sixth in the senior boys' race.
Denise Worth of Martin St. placed eighth in the intermediate girls and Debra Jackman, also of Martin St. was 10th. Heerske of Falgarwood placed first with C. Thompson of Centennial second in intermediate girls.
J. Lennox of Tecumseh was tops in the intermediate boys with Eccles of Maplehurst second and Mark Ezard of Stewarttown third in 5:29, six seconds off the winning time.
In the junior girls, C. Merkall of Tecumseh placed first in 6:23. C. Habbs of John T. Tuck school second and K. Haaf of Fairview third.

Stirton of Fairview School won the junior boys' race in 5:47. R. Barnes of New Central was second and A. Kav of Montclair third. Two Martin St runners in the going were Kevin Hughes who finished fourth in 5:52, five seconds off the top, and Kevin Marino in seventh at six minutes even.
In bantams, J. Purdy of E. J. James School placed first with a time of 6:44. J. Kiburis of Maplehurst was second and T. Groves of Sunningdale third.
Local highs were scored by J. Faulkner and L. Caputo of J. M. Denyes. These two were first and second in North Halton. Scott Taggart of Centennial grabbed the bantam boys' honors with a 6:01 time and P. Ridsdale of Gladys Speers was second. Glenn Blight of Centennial was third with 6:10 and Darren Kemp, also of Centennial was fourth with a time of 6:11.
S. Thomas of J. M. Denyes ran in ninth position in 6:32, 31 seconds off the top.
