





Flyers proved they had a fair amount of muscle and scoring power and at a few points in the game it looked as f Milton would be the giant killers this year. The Derbys took Bruce Ellison off in the last minute with a fight and that gave them what they required to muscle their way in front of the net to score their eighth for the 8-7 win.

Flyers scored six of their seven on power plays which proved effective against the Derbys. Rob Brooks and Gary Vennor were handed game misconducts by referee Bob Morley in the second period and aside from going to a second game sheet for their infractions, the penalty box carpenters were almost ready to go to work to increase the capacity of Derbys' sin bin.

Following the game Milton Flyers' coach Gerry Inglis told The Champion his team handed Streetsville a couple of goals in the first period. Mike Murray was injured.

On Murray, Inglis said, "It's hard for a midget to play with these guys. They bugged him on the bench and really gave it to him in the corner.

"They've got three lines, we only had two after Murray was hurt and had to put Ron Twiss back on defence. That took away a lot of scoring punch," he said.

"If that's the way they're going to win, that's the way they're going to play," a red eyed Inglis spoke outside the Flyers' dressing room.
