Community services courses are popular

Current enrolment for the Sheridan College Community Services Division stands at 14,408 students.

Community Services encompasses three sections: Continuing Education, Management Development and Training, and Re-training.

Gary Britton, Director of Continuing Education, says that the present enrolment of 9,355 students is an increase of 26 per cent over last year at this time, placing Sheridan second among the 22 community colleges in Ontario.

"The current economic situation has had some influence on this increase," he says, "particularly in the business courses."

He went on to explain that more and more businesses are taking the time to invest in employee education, instead of going outside the company for more skilled workers.

"You have to look at the trend in education," states Britton, "enrolment in public schools is down. Once this trend hits the higher educational institutions, one way to offset it would be to provide the opportunity for people to advance themselves from where they are now."

The most popular courses are the career-oriented courses such as secretarial and business, credit courses, and those in the special interest area.
