Current enrolment for the Sheridan College Community Services Division stands at 14,408 students. Community Services en-

Gary Britton, Director of Continuing Education, says that the present enrolment of 9,355 students is an increase of 26 per cent over last year at this time, placing Sheridan second among the 22 com-




