Office copier price list helps police save face

A price list for an office copier helped senior Halton Regional Police officers save face in front of the regional police commission during Thursday's meeting at Oakville.

The list for an IBM copier was used to compare costs with a Xerox machine which police rented without first getting permission from the governing board.

The board decided to back up its officers and keep the Xerox machine because it was cheaper than the IBM model.

The police commission wanted to return the new copier to Xerox, but decided in October to see how the machine operated, and also to

find out what comparable machines cost.

Officers came under fire from the commission when it discovered the unauthorized account in October.

"The problem was it was a fait accompli before it came to the commission," commissioner Harry Barrett said.

The Xerox machine was a \$7,500 item, he said.

The Xerox machine would cost about \$10,000 for one month, Barrett said.

Inspector William Southward said the IBM machine would cost about \$2,000 more.

In addition to renting the Xerox 4500 copier without getting permission, the police put the budget into the red

with the deal for renting it.

According to Southward, at an earlier meeting Xerox let it be known the price of the new machine would jump \$3,000 last July. Southward was on vacation when deputy chief F. W. Oliver, who was aware of Southward's research on the subject, recommended the rental to chief Ken Skerrett.
