Blood donations short of goal

Turnout for the Red Cross-sponsored Blood Donor Clinic held at the Legion Hall on Charles St. Thursday was relatively good—considering the outbreaks of flu in the Milton area in recent weeks. "We were just a little under our quota," said Margo Kent, organizer for the clinic. "We received 233 pints of blood. Our goal is 300 pints but we usually come up with about 250 pints. It's not very

good when you consider the population, but the poor health of the people would account for the poor attendance," she said. The clinic was sponsored by volunteers from the Red Cross and was assisted by other groups which volunteered their services. Help was received from the Legion Ladies who assisted in the kitchen, the Catholic Women's League provided the clinic help, the Kinettes

baked fruit bread for the donors and the Bousfields donated apple cider. North End Datsun supplied the ice. The Martin St. Senior Public School boys loaded and unloaded the Red Cross trucks, while W.I. Dick senior students publicized the event by placing posters on Main St. and in the plazas around Milton. Students from the high school had the tedious task of telephoning for help and in-

forming former donors of the clinic. The Red Cross holds four blood donor clinics every year, falling on the third Thursday of the month. The next clinic will be held on May 18, Aug. 17 and Nov. 16. All clinics are held at the Legion Hall. The May 8 clinic is the Mayor's Clinic which will be promoted by the town and Mayor Donald Gordon.

'Monstrous'

Refuse to approve CP tower

"Such visual clutter is undesirable in the heart of the community," Councillor Brian Penman said as Milton Council Monday night rejected a 150-foot high CP microwave tower at the Court St. CPR station site. "Tell CP we find the notion of a tower in the core of the town is repugnant to the best interests of the citizens—and the good life," Penman added.

"We don't want it." Councillor Emmerson McCready charged CP Tel made no effort to consider alternative sites. He called it "a monstrous tower" in a residential area. The people worrying about an apartment building proposed for that area would have a worse view when the tower goes up, he said.

McCready asked council to drag its feet on the approval, until more alternate sites can be studied. "We ought to fight them, or persuade them to look some more," he urged. The company's mind was made up before it asked council's opinion, chimed in Councillor Jim Kerr. But he said if the tower does go ahead, he'd like to see the

town get permission to use it, to improve the town's radio communications. Councillor Penman said he wanted to hear a statement from CP assuring council the tower will not interfere with local radio or TV reception. He called for a staff report on that point, plus the size, shape, color and aesthetic considerations. When he put it in the form of a motion, councillors approved, almost unanimously.

Optimists get project started

Building permits for the first month of the year totalled \$145,856 including a new industrial storage building at Frankel Steel at an estimated cost of \$50,000. The Optimist Club of Milton has also received an initial building permit for their new \$600,000 youth centre. The permit, valued at \$30,000 is for the foundation only. Construction of the foundation will not get underway until spring however. Permits for January also included a new 50 foot by 30 foot garage storage building at the home of Joe Heystek, R.R. 2, Campbellville. The \$30,000 project is under construction and half-way to completion, according to Mrs. Heystek. The building will be used to store farm equipment. Housing permits for January 1978 indicated a sharp decline compared to last year's figures. Work estimated at \$25,000 was authorized last month, compared with \$100,000 for the same time period last year. All housing permits for this past January were issued for new single family houses. The total value of last month's building permits is

almost half of the previous year. January of 1977 saw permits issued for more than \$300,000 work. **Medals for educators** Two Halton Educators have been honored with Queen's Silver Jubilee medals. Halton Board of Education has had only two directors of education and both were honored with medals. It was announced Thursday by board chairman Garry Morton that Em Lavender and Jim Singleton both were medal recipients.
