## Tridents fall to Paris 29'ers crushed hopes with 8-3 defeat

Tridents fell 8-3 Monday night in a game they controlled in the early going and were leading 3-1 at one point in the second period.

The coach told The Champion, "We couldn't score goals, that was the turning point." Hymers said the talent was on the Tridents Club, they did everything he as a coach had

requested of them and according to Hymers the players performed well.


