Pigeons, pigeons everywhere



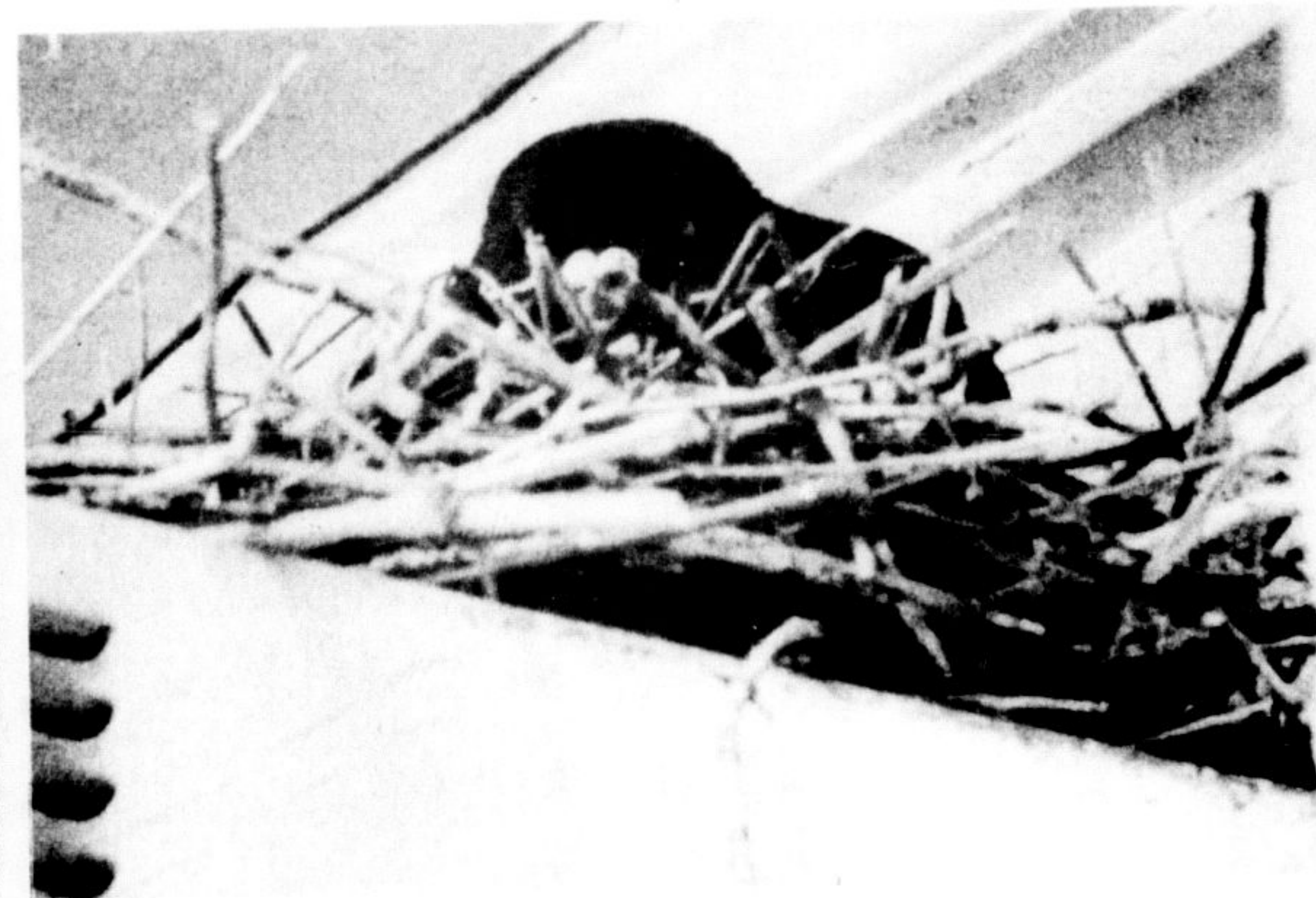

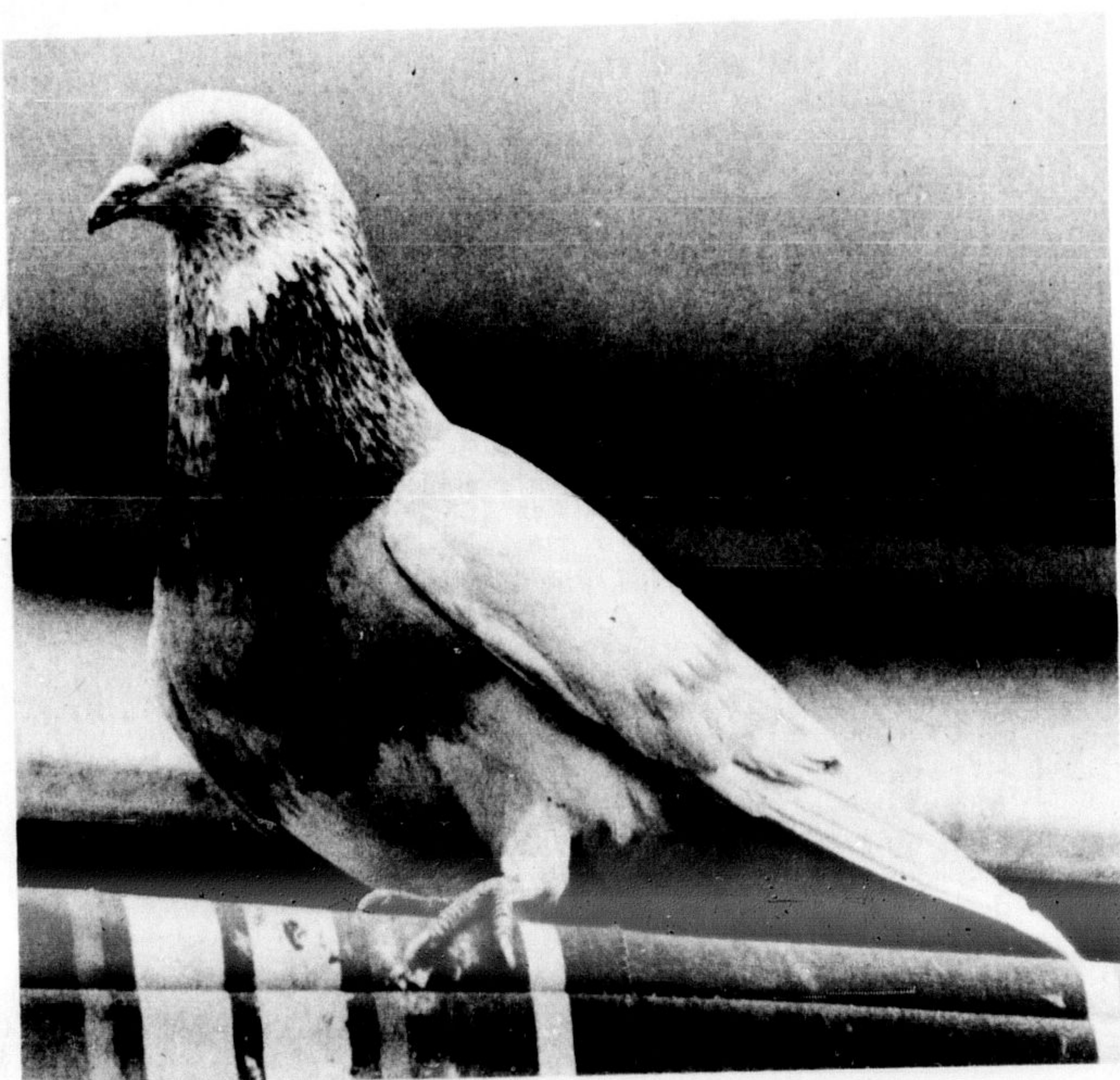
DON'T WALK, FLY! The Milton birds are famous for hanging out at street corners and seem to have a special liking of the traffic signals at Martin and Main Sts.



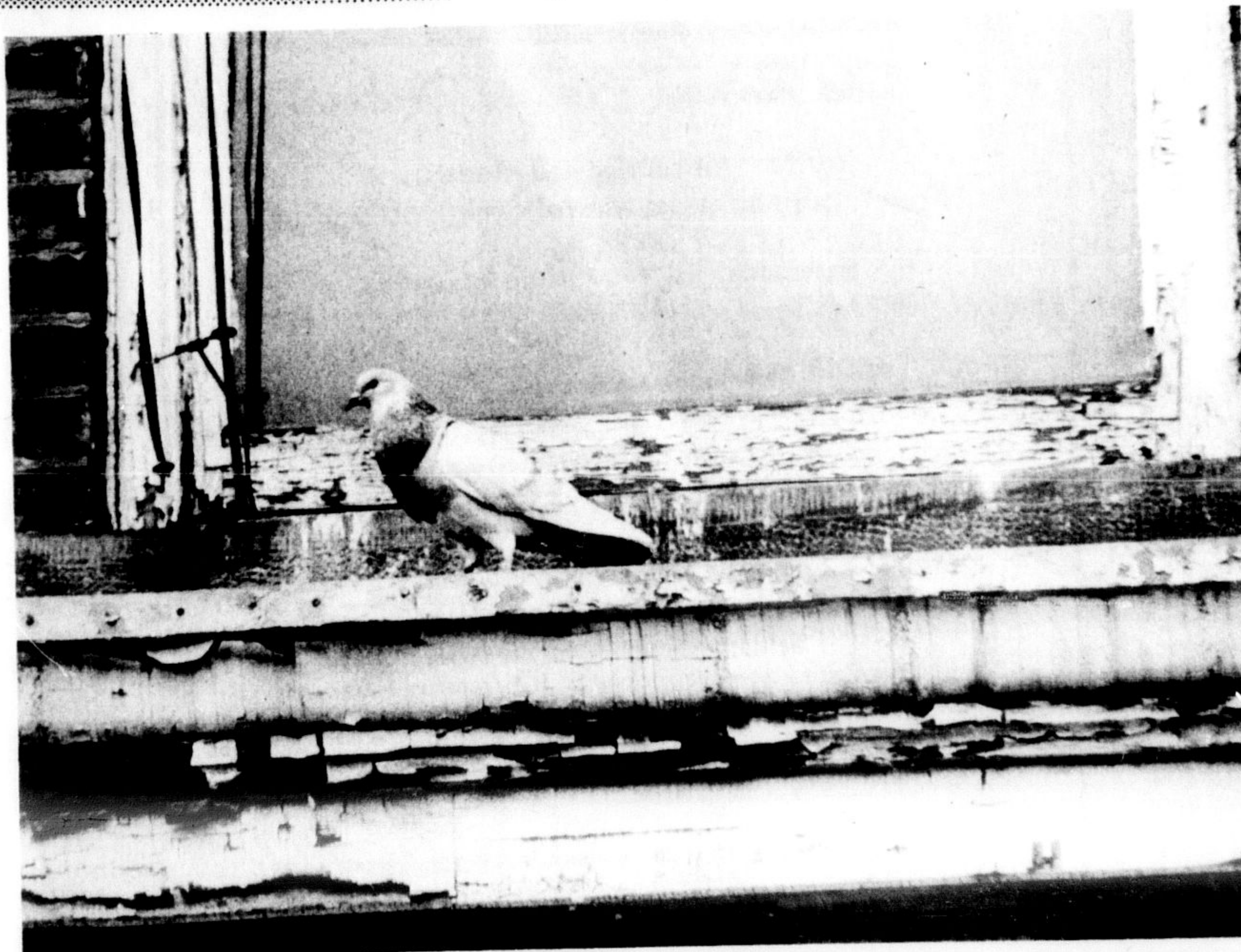
