

## Car rally here Sunday expecting 50 entries

Start your engines!  
Over 50 cars will be checked, tuned and equipped with driver and navigator as the Oakville-Trafalgar Light Car Club stages its annual Tiny Tulip Rally in Milton Sunday.

The rally is not a race against time.

There are 50 entries expected to register Sunday morning at 9 a.m. at the starting site at the Canadian Tire Store in Milton's north end. It is the 15th running of the Tiny Tulip and High School Rally and it will be the third year Speedy Muffler King has sponsored part of the event.

The purpose of such a rally is to introduce the sport of auto rallying to the beginner. Maximum speeds are less than 20 per cent of legal posted speeds and no hot hole-laden roads will be used as part of the course, organizers said.

The finish line is also in Milton. The first car will depart the CTC parking lot at 11.01 a.m. following the 10.40 a.m. briefing. The Fifth Wheel Truck Stop is the finish line.

The start at Canadian Tire to the finish at the Fifth Wheel will have drivers complete a 170 kilometre (105 mile) course.

The car rally is a test of a team's ability to read maps, follow directions and to drive safely.

## Hornby horse farm moves to consolidate

One of the area's largest and most prestigious horse farms is for sale. Sam-Son Farms of Hornby, in an economy move to consolidate the family horse business, is selling one of its two properties.

The operation consisting of a 154-acre main farm on Trafalgar Rd. and a 200 acre breeding farm on Fourth Line south of Omagh, has been unofficially for sale for the past year, but the farms were recently listed with Moffat Dunlap Real Estates.

Price for the main farm is set at \$800,000 and the owner asks \$650,000 for the breeding farm, according to sales agent Carl Dennis.

The farm is owned by Ernest Samuel of Oakville. Sale of either property will result in the business moving to the remaining Samuel property.

"Mr. Samuel is certainly going to remain in the area, and it must be emphasized he is not giving up the business," stated Mr. Dennis.

The last year has seen the sale of approximately 150 horses in three separate auctions for a total of \$260,000 at Sam-Son Farms, as the operation moved out of the hunter and jumper field into the racing world.

Mr. Dennis would not elaborate on the costs of operating the two farms. "It is really too spread out an operation, with two sets of taxes and hydro," said a Sam-Son Farm employee.

Although it is a specialized real estate field, Mr. Dennis stated there are buyers interested in the properties.

"That is rather exciting, because you could easily wait for six months before someone comes looking for what you have," he said.

The main farm was built

The breeding farm consists of 35 box stalls, numerous paddocks, and two homes. Possession of either farm would not take place until after the annual Hornby Horse Show, scheduled for July of this year.

The Milton Major Atom Legionaires finished the season in fine style, but could not contain their high flying Acton counterparts who won the OMHA zone finals here on Saturday.

Last Wednesday, the Legionaires went to Acton for the fourth game of the series which stood at 2-1 in Acton's favor. Milton had their backs to the wall and needed a win.

Late in the opening period, Gary Bissonnette notched the first Milton marker when he launched a screen shot from the point. The puck missed all the players but found the unguarded corner of the net.

Two minutes later, Acton tied the score and picked up another in the early minutes of the second period.
