Conservation Authority

Student salaries slashed - only 30 will get jobs

As a result of reduced provincial funding for Experience '78 programs, half as many students as would ordinarily be hired at Kelso Conservation area will have jobs. Those who do get jobs will work for less than the same positions paid last year.

Halton Region Conservation Authority normally hires approximately 60 students for Kelso, but will likely hire only 30 students unless the provincial government makes changes in its allocation of funds, according to Bill Warwick, spokesman for the Conservation Authority.

"The wages set out for this year (minimum wage) are not sufficient to recruit top, qualified people for the job," he stated in an interview with The Champion.

Minimum wages of \$2.85 an hour for third and fourth year university students will adversely affect the quality of Kelso's summer student employment, he continued.

"There are really two options; either the wages are adjusted to attract qualified people or we cut the program."

At this time, Mr. Warwick stated he anticipated cutting the program by 50 per cent. Students who have worked with the Authority for a number of years and wish to return this summer will have to take a wage cut in order to do so, he said.

Last year's rates varied, stated Mr. Warwick, "but this year the top rate will be \$2.85, from 20 per cent to 11 per cent. It is now 16 per cent for 1978."

Despite specific needs, Kelso is now told how many students it will receive and in what positions they will serve, said Mr. Warwick.

"They really have no idea of our requirements and the program is becoming an exercise in futility," he complained.

Students are hired for engineering and landscape projects, resource inventory and a variety of positions ranging from labor to clerical, professional and supervisory levels.

Fifty per cent of students hired must be of university level, 12 per cent community college and the remaining number from high school, according to ministry terms, he said.

"It does not matter whether we need more university level students—we have to live in

the terms of reference."

Although wages were higher last year for students employed at Kelso, Mr. Warwick complained of a high turnover of students.

"Students always have an eye open for a better job, with the rates they are paid here," he stated.

"There were a lot of problems last year, with many a time, half a crew disappearing one morning without saying a word. Many had to be replaced during the summer when they quit."

"At least this year, we will have only 30 students complaining about the pay, instead of 60."

In an effort to effect some changes in the funding scheme, Halton Conservation Authority is in the process of preparing a brief to express dissatisfaction with the reduced budget and wage scale, said Mr. Warwick.

The brief is to be directly submitted to the Ministry of Natural Resources, the Ontario Youth Secretariat and local members of provincial parliament, he continued.

Conservation Authority parks such as Hilton Falls, Crawford Lake and Rattlesnake Point are usually maintained by students during the summer months, he explained, but students would not be hired for the work this summer.

"As well, we won't be doing work on displays and exhibits that is normally done by the summer students."

adding there would not be a resource inventory conducted this summer.

"Six jobs would also be automatically cut from the patrol section," he continued.

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
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
