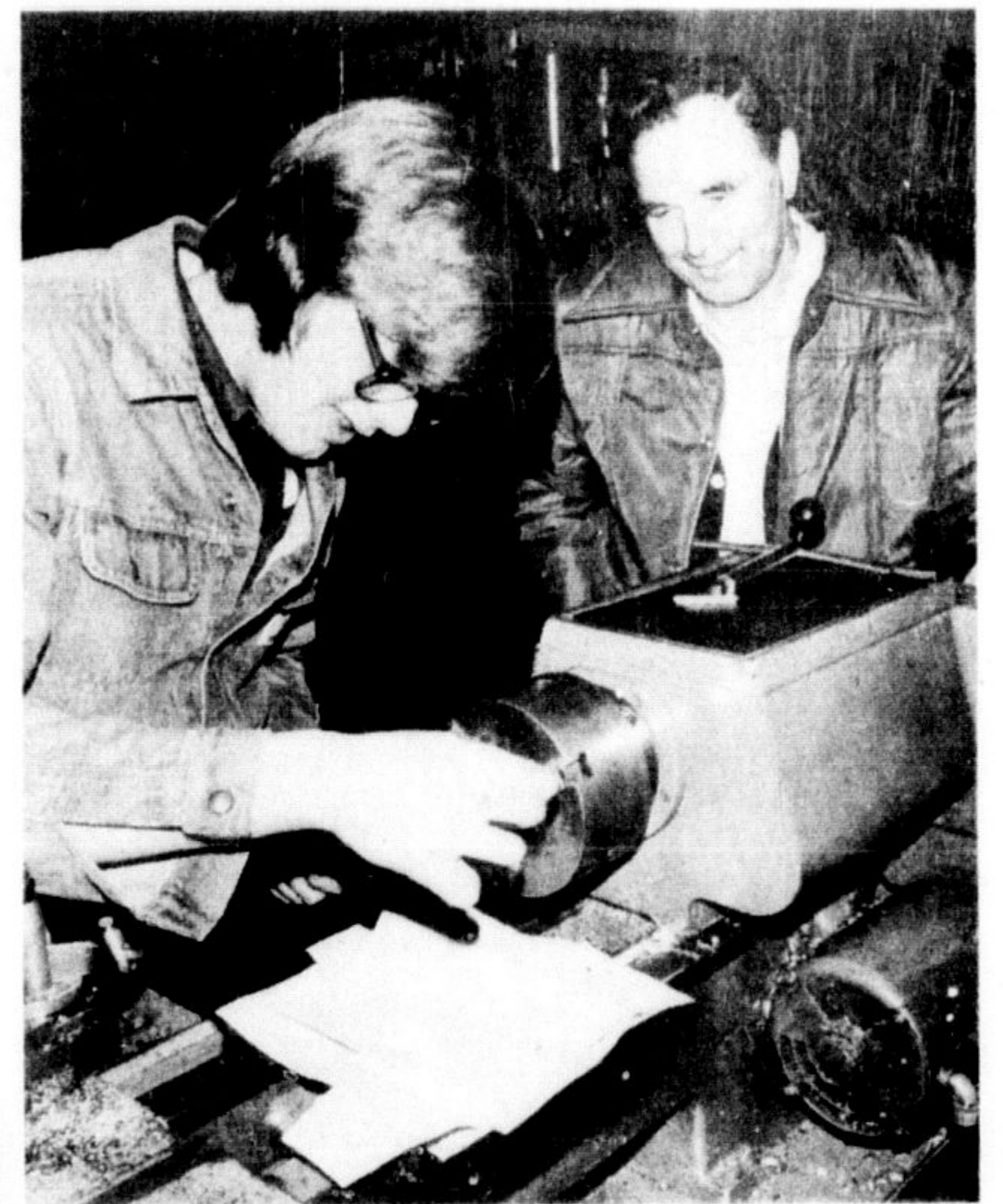
WELCOME, said the sign on this work of art from the metal fabrication shop and visitor Linda Tielemans is shown with the masterpiece.

It was a learning encounter that hundreds of Milton parents enjoyed Wednesday, April 5 when they visited Milton District High School for the annual spring open house.

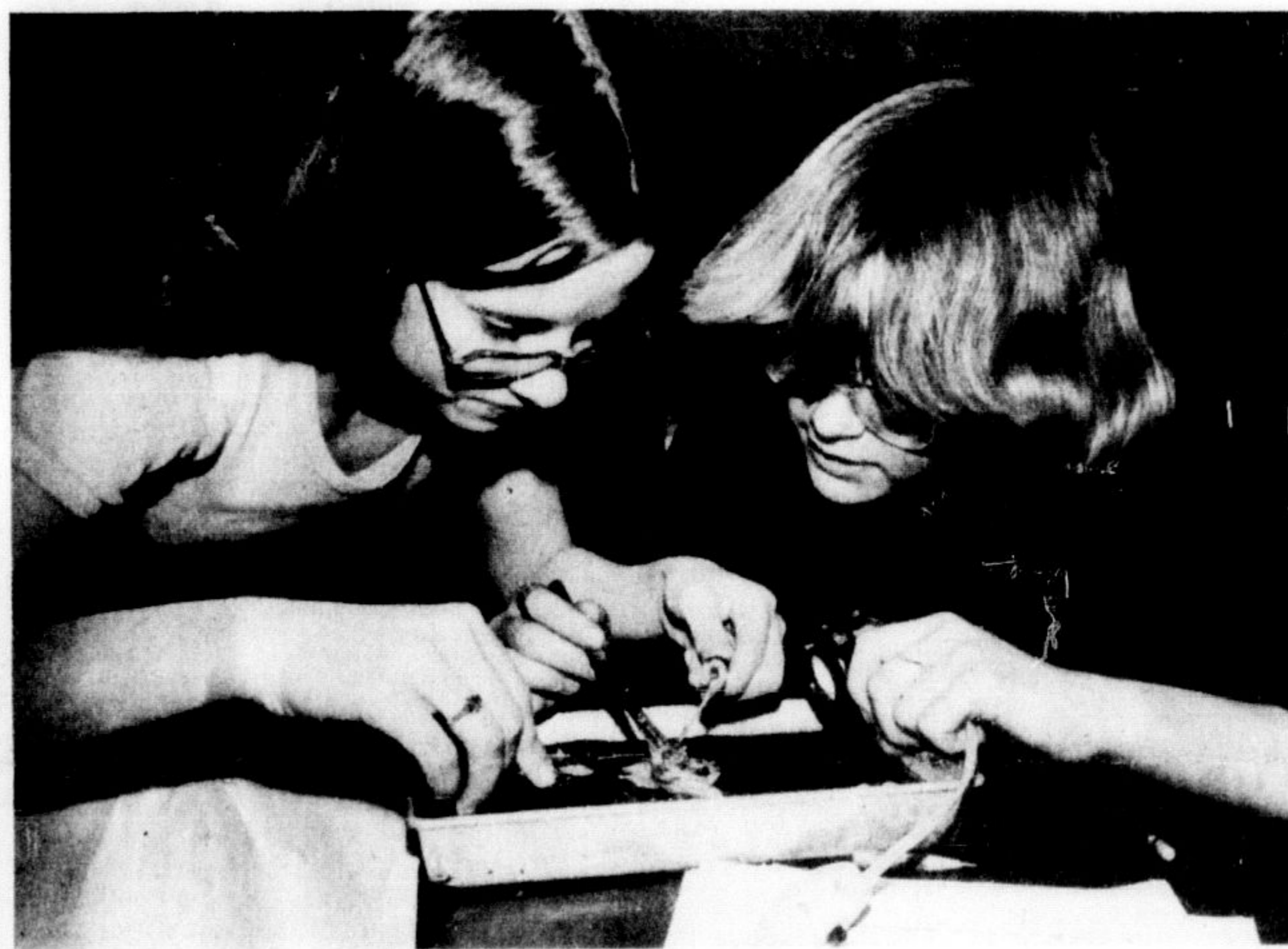

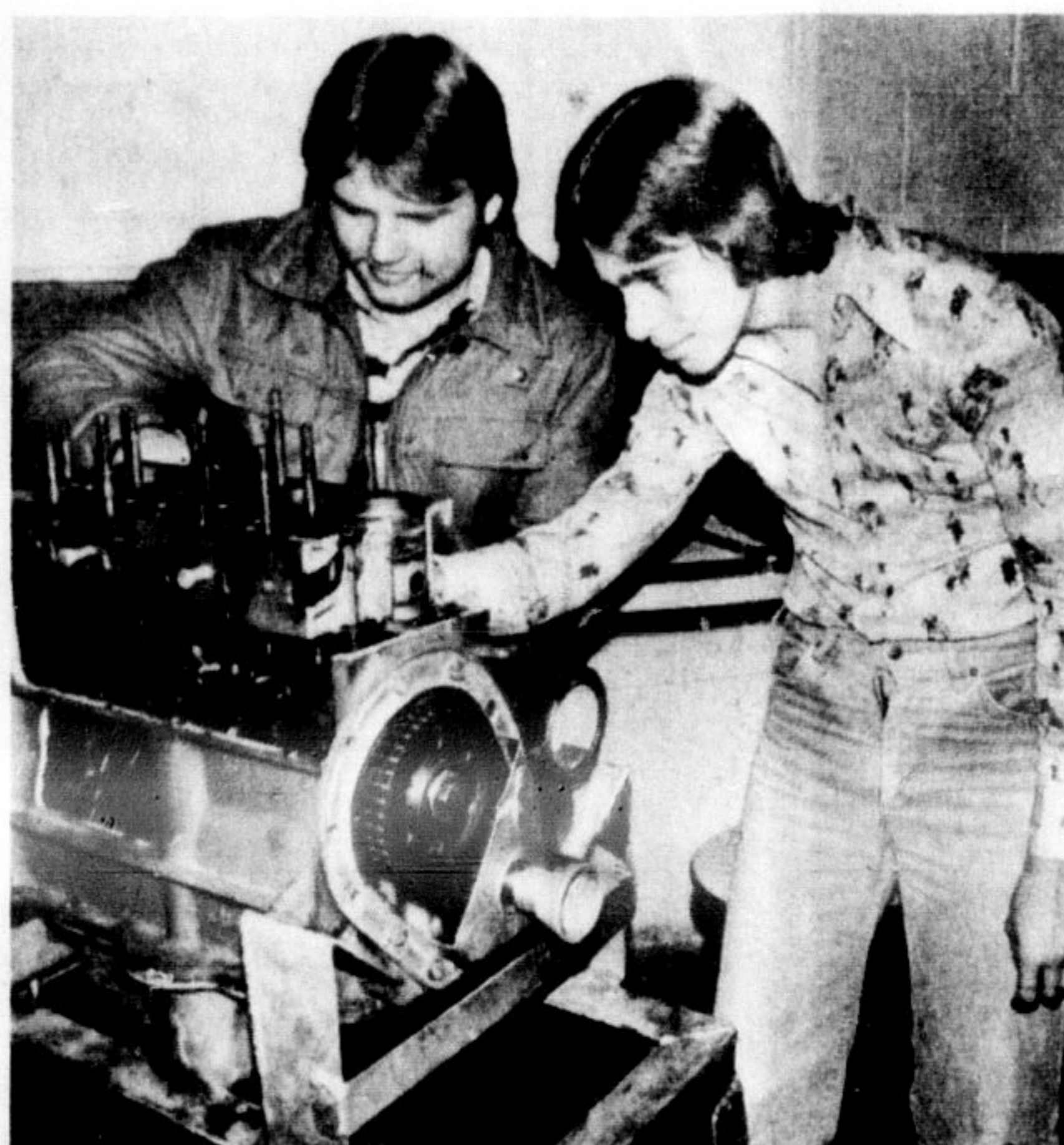
TYPE-A-THON was held during open house to raise money for the local Muscular Dystrophy campaign and the typists addressed the envelopes for the campaign mailer.
