

Local VON reps at annual mtg.

Severe financial constraints will require careful prioritization of programs requesting funding, Allen E. Dyer from the Ministry of Health told 144 members of the Victorian Order of Nurses at the 24th annual meeting.

The meeting was held Saturday, April 8 and included six board and staff members from the VON Halton Branch.

Representing Halton were Margaret MacLeod, district commissioner, Mrs. J. Milne, Mrs. Al Blum, Mrs. R. Mezzabotta, Mrs. S. Gosling and H. Hansuld.

Mr. Dyer stated the Ministry of Health is committed to decentralization, and added that careful prioritization of programs can "best be done at the local level" and District Health Councils are seen as fulfilling this role, acting in an advisory capacity to the Ministry.

According to the VON, 415 nurses and 14 registered

nursing assistants employed by VON make the visiting nursing service available to 96 per cent of the population of the province.

In 1977, 925,625 nursing visits were made to 54,748 individual patients. Eighty-one per cent of these visits were paid for by government through the Home Care Program and the Home-makers and Nurses Services Act under provincial auspices and through Workmen's Compensation and the Department of Veteran Affairs.

United Way and other bodies helped to pay for the remainder of the services, as well as some patients who paid for the visits.

Elected as officers to the board of management for 1978 were William P. Martin from St. Catharines as president, first vice-president; Sylvia Mercer from Ottawa, second vice-president David C. Smith from Guelph; treasurer Robert Grunow from Hamilton and Frank Morassutti as secretary.

Horticultural Notes

New ideas for your garden

"New ideas for planning and improving your 1978 garden" was the topic for the April meeting of the Milton and District Horticultural Society featuring a panel of gardening experts from the Civic Garden Centre in Toronto. Moderator E. R. Pope directed questions from the audience to his four panel members, Mrs. A. L. Cooper, Bob Scott, John Newell, and G. Earl.

Among the subjects discussed were the advantages of soaker hoses, synthetic auxin rooting compounds, gypsum and other soil amendments, as well as recommendations for eliminating the weed Creeping Charlie in lawns and the fungus disease blackspot on roses. Vice-president Burke McNeill expressed the appreciation of the society to the panel for an informative evening.

Past president George Clements was host for the evening, welcoming visitors or new members as they arrived. The president, Leonard McNeill, reported that packages of flower and vegetable seed had been delivered that week to 175 Beavers, Cubs, and Scouts requesting seed for their gardening projects.

The report of the program committee for 1978 outlining upcoming events and meetings was read by the secretary, Mrs. W. E. Ford. Alan Odenbach will again be auctioneer for the popular May auction sale of plants, horticultural items, and home baking. This is always an enjoyable evening, and everyone is invited to attend. All contributions of plants or baked goods will be gladly accepted from 2 p.m. the day of the auction, Monday, May 15.

Scheduled for June 21 is the 1978 Annual Flower Show of the Milton and District Horticultural Society. The theme will be "Dancing Flowers", and the show chairman is Grace May. Programs for the flower show were distributed at the meeting.

Tentatively scheduled for June also are the visits to local gardens. Len McNeill asked for invitations from all who would enjoy having in-

terested members come by to admire their gardening efforts one day that month.

In August certificates will be awarded to urban and rural property owners who are judged to have made outstanding contributions to the



beautification of this community. In addition it is hoped that owners of major and minor industrial properties and service stations will be advised of the upcoming judging for Landscaping Certificates of Merit to be presented in co-operation with town council in these three industrial categories. You can watch the birdies at Mountsberg this May

The May weekend program at Mountsberg Wildlife Centre will focus on birds. The program, Birds of a Feather, is designed to provide an introduction to the value and importance of many of the birds found in the region.

The Halton Region Conservation Authority's wildlife propagation and nest box projects will be described. Bird watching workshops to acquaint visitors with this fast growing hobby will be featured in the program as well.

Other activities will include bird banding and trapping demonstrations set up in co-operation with local bird banders, young bird exhibit

and incubation demonstration, live bird-of-prey exhibit, bird house and feeding station display, films and slides. Horse-drawn wagons will take visitors to banding demonstration sites.

During this period Mountsberg is offering birdhouses for sale. The style which will be sold is one that is suitable for bluebirds, swallows and wrens, and is priced at \$2.25.

Birds are looking for nesting areas now. Swallows tend to favor areas near ponds, lakes or rivers but bluebirds and wrens are common to urban backyards. However, there's no way of knowing which birds will be attracted to your birdhouse.

But the fun of having a birdhouse is the surprise of discovering which bird has taken up occupancy, Mountsberg staff say.

If you want to build your own birdhouse, Mountsberg will be giving away xeroxed plans for you to follow.

Birds of a Feather will take place every weekend in May, starting May 6 and including the long weekend of May 20, 21 and 22. Hours are 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Cost is three dollars per car or \$17 per bus.

The wildlife centre is located west of Campbellville. Take Five Sideroad west from Guelph Line to Town Line. Turn right on Town Line.
