Manpower opens office

Milton's Student Manpower placement office was officially opened Friday morning.

The opening marked the eighth year the post office building office has been used to help local high school and postgraduate students find

Manpower officials present at the opening expressed optimism for Milton students. Fifteen local jobs have already been filled during the last month, according to

Wendy Coulson, placement officer with the student office. The office received 32 job orders by the end of April

from local employers, she stated, and added the Manpower office has received 200 student registrations to date. Last year's figures for job

placement showed a 98 per cent efficiency rate, according to Debra Perris, Manpower official, who stated all jobs with the exception of a small percentage were filled.

It took nearly 200 students to fill one cherry picking job order alone, stated Evelyn Hartwell, manager of Oakville and area Canada Employment Office.
