Horticultural Notes

Delightful flower show



A room filled with the beauty and scent of freshly cut flowers was enjoyed by visitors to the U.A.W. Centre on Martin St. Wednesday, June 21 when the Milton and District Horticultural Society held its 1978 annual flower

Entries in the show were arranged in eight senior sections and one junior section, in a total of 93 different classes. All but three classes were open to non-members of the Society. Entries were in place by noon of the day of the show with judging beginning shortly after. Judge this year was H.E. Markle, past president of the Ontario Horticultural Association, and judging was in accordance with O.H.A. standards. The doors opened at 2:30 with show ribbons in place, trophies and prizes were presented during the evening.

In section one, the senior decorative division, the prize for most points in all 10 classes was won by Francis Clements. The prize for best exhibit in this section, donated by Velma Norris, was won by Ada McCann for her entry in class four, Irish Jig. The rules called for an all-green arrangement, and the winning entry interpreted an Irish Jig with the foliage of hosta, periwinkle, and henand-chickens, combined with flowering grasses in a low green ceramic container.

Francis Clements was also prize winner for total points in the horticultural division's section two, roses, and section three, peonies, and for best exhibit in the peony section. Jason May's red grandiflora rose in class 21 took best exhibit in the rose section. Jason, who is five years old modestly claimed no special secrets to growing his prizewinning blooms.

Total-point winner in section four, iris, was Margaret Cox, with Wilma Muselius ner this year was Helen Bobwining best exhibit.

Margaret Wrigglesworth received prizes for the most points in each of the next three sections, perennials, baskets, and potted plants, plus best exhibit in potted plants. Best exhibit in perennials was awarded to Wilma Muselius. Francis Clements won best exhibit in section six, baskets, and in section eight fruits and vegetables, for a luscious pint box of strawberries, plus the totalpoint prize in fruits and vege-

The best exhibit in all seven section of the horticultural division was judged to be Margaret Thompson's entry in class 23 for three stems of the Hybrid Tea rose cultivar Chrysler Imperial demonstrating the stages from bud to full bloom. This prize was donated by Mrs. Clare Ford.

In the junior division 13 to 16 year class, Eartha May won the Total-points prize and best exhibit was her water-viewing arrangement of blue Siberian iris entitled Dancing Waters. Her brother Jason snapped up both prizes in the five to 12 year class.

The award for best exhibit in class seven, open to men only, was donated by Grace May and won by Wilmer Thompson. His arrangement for Devil Dance was a handsome mixture of rosy Sweet William, coral bells, bloodleaf, and red-leaved barberry

The Red Rose Trophy wincock for her section two entry of the Hybrid Tea rose cultivar Crimson Glory.




