Speed Queens win 34-8 over Machine

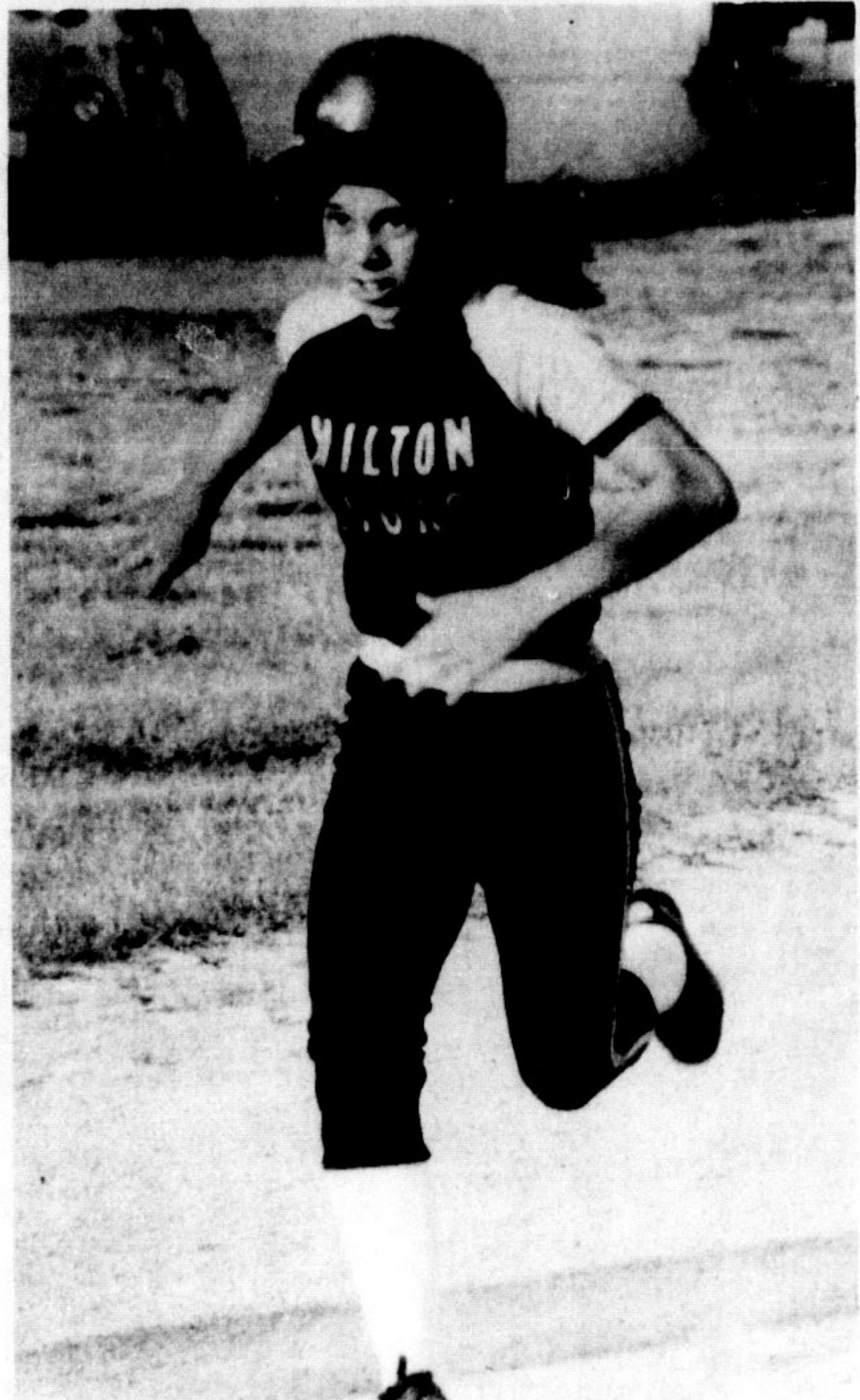

Waples leads

Ron Waples, 1977 Horseman of the Year and the first driver to earn \$1 million and record 300 victories in one year, solely in Canada, has passed Keith Linton in their on-going battle for national dash-winning honors. Waples also leads all drivers in money won.

The Rockwood native leads Canada's 3,563 drivers with 126 victories, six more than Linton, the early season dash leader, now campaigning at Sandown Park near Victoria.

B.C., according to figures compiled by Canadian Trotting Association's data processing department through May 31.

In the money-won department, Waples, with winnings of \$407,331, continues to be the runaway leader. He campaigns his large public stable on the OJC's Greenwood-Mohawk circuit.

Canada's top 10-money winners have amassed \$2,616,981 in purse earnings in 1978.

Pineview seniors, sponsored by Georgetown British Cars this year, have two teams entered in the Halton InterCounty Soccer League.

But with the number of players signing up, perhaps we should have entered three teams. It certainly shows that the interest in senior soccer is very high, in fact, the league has doubled in size this year to accommodate the number of teams wishing to enter.

The club got off to a slow start, but they seem to be picking up the pace. Last Wednesday night the "A" team had a very satisfying 4-2 win over the Silver's Falcons. This is the second meeting and, after they lost a narrow one the first time, it was a

well-earned win with some good soccer being played by both teams. Pineview goals were scored by Colin Dickinson (2), Bill Brazz (1), and Ken Zolak (1).

The game was well-handled by referee Pat Taylor and, while it got a little chippy at times, he kept it well under control.

Not so good for the "B" team. They played the same night against the Meteors and lost by the same score. Here was a game where the youthful Pineview team were taught a few tricks by the old masters. It was a very interesting game to watch and, while the referee took some bantering from the spectators, I feel he handled the game very well.

Guelph entry unlikely in 'A'

The OHA Intermediate "A" League will likely operate again next season with the same five teams, Georgetown, Dundas, Port Colborne, Thorold and Port Erie.

Convener Jim King said this week he had received feelers from a group in Guelph, which was interested in entering a team. However, Monday night, Joe Drentner, contact man for the group, called King to say he would likely wait another year before entering the league.

King said he believes lack of suitable ice time in the Royal City is the main reason for the Guelph entry's change of heart.

"They're waiting for another arena to be built in Guelph," King said. "The way it is now they'd have to share Guelph Memorial Gardens with the Junior "A" Platers."

King said the Guelph entry, which has grown out of a city league, has plenty of money behind it. Deadline for Intermediate "A" applications is July 1.

King also reported that the Port Elgin Sunocos, last year's OHA Intermediate "C" finalists, are interested

in jumping up to Intermediate "A". Port Elgin applied to enter the Continental Senior League, but had their application rejected.

King said it's unlikely the OHA would accept Port Elgin by itself into the Intermediate "A" League because it's miles away from the present towns. However, he said a new Intermediate "A" group could be formed in the Western Ontario-Georgian Bay area if Port Elgin can convince towns like Collingwood, Midland etc. to enter teams.

Meanwhile, a Southern Ontario daily reported last week that the OHA Senior "A" champion Brantford Alexanders will play in Welland this year. The OHA office, however, refuses to confirm that the move has been approved.

Welland, once a member of the OHA Intermediate "A" League, was mentioned as a possibility to return, when team reps met at this year's OHA annual meeting in April.

King also said it's almost certain that Timmins will host a tournament, which will decide a true intermediate hockey champion for Ontario.

Larks cut Noble before B.C. game

Georgetown's Phil Noble has accepted a position with International Paper in the Kitchener-Waterloo area after being cut from the training camp roster of the Montreal Alouettes, June 11, two days before the Larks' first exhibition game against the B.C. Lions.

Noble, a Georgetown District High grad who played college football with the College Bowl champion University of Western Ontario Mustangs, was selected by the Alouettes in the first round of this year's Canadian college draft.

Risks for fishermen

Fishing from a boat may seem a quiet and perfectly safe sport, but some of the risks it involves are dramatically illustrated by the number of drownings due to capsizing and falls overboard.

Landing a fish is an exciting moment and fishermen often forget the most basic safety rules. They lean over

the gunwale or stand on one side of the boat, causing it to capsize or them to fall overboard. A fish can usually be landed while sitting. If one fisherman must stand, his companion should remain seated and balance the boat.

The Canada Safety Council recommends not changing places while in deep water.
