

Banvil crowd McDuffe in fastball standings

Banvil moved to within a half-game of league leading McDuffe equipment with their 6-4 victory over McDuffe and an 10-0 rout of Rockwell.

McDuffe equipment edged Thornborrow BP Muffles 4-3 in their other game.

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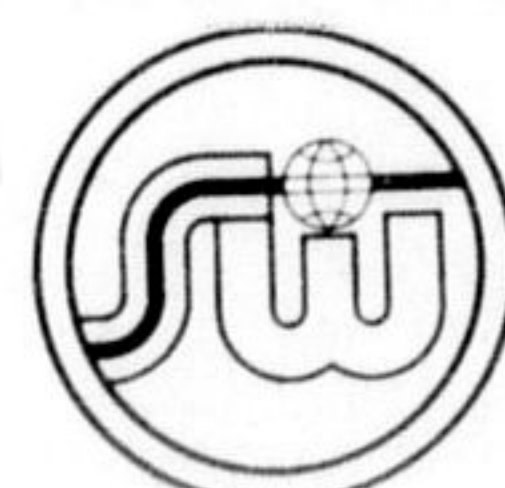


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
