Banvil on top

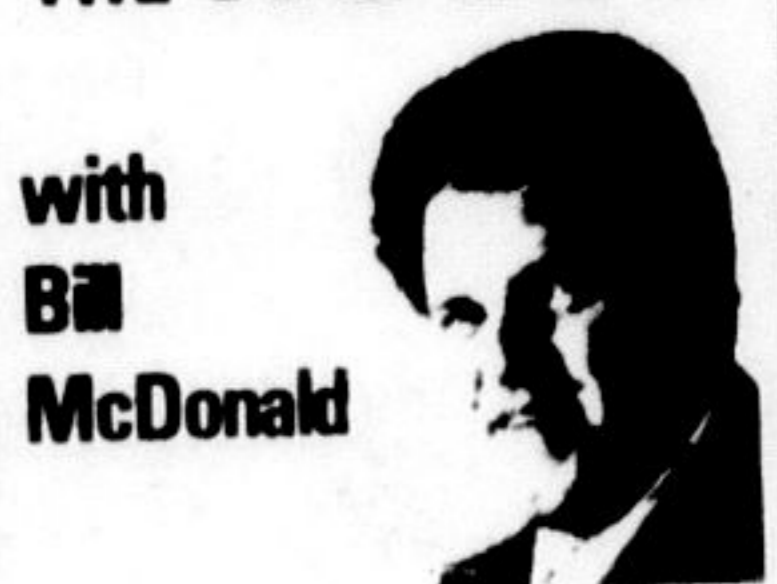

Dave DelPapa won his own ball game against McDuffe's as he allowed just three hits while striking out two and hit a home run in the second inning for the only run he needed. Banvil scored an unearned run in the seventh as Ray Tonelli reached first on an error, stole second and scored on Ray Grisold's single. DelPapa's record is now 13-2. The Stags scored 12 runs on just eight hits en route to their 12-1 rout over C&P. Ron Neath had two singles, a home run and five RBI's to lead the Stags at the plate. Other hits came from Leon Stickle two singles, Loris Faggon two singles, Roger Johnson a home run, and Glen Turner a double. Try a small, soft paintbrush for dusting little fragile things.

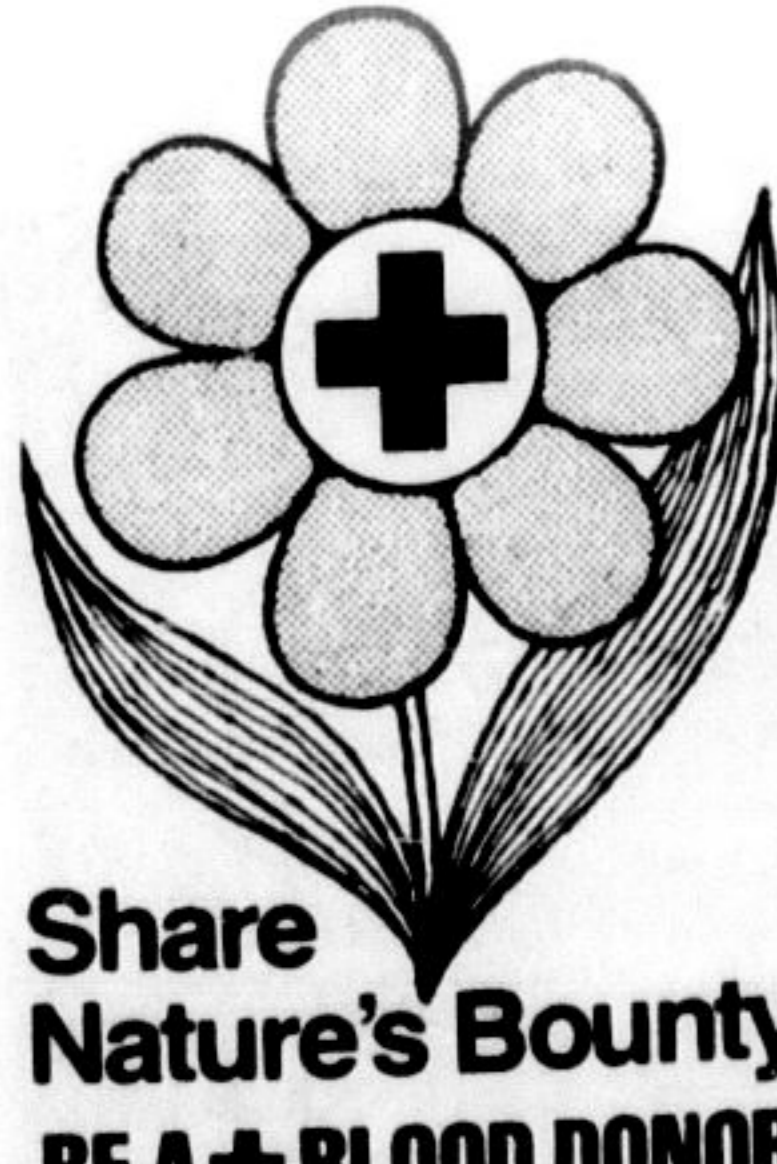
The gallon size cans with snap-on lids that instant potatoes come in are great for keeping large bags of potato chips fresh.

Trafalgar's jr. program produces a champion

It has been a few years since the Trafalgar Golf and Country Club in Milton has produced any provincial champions, but TGCC junior Stan Fay from Milton recently put a big feather in the local course's cap when he claimed the Ontario Junior and Juvenile championships. The exciting part of it is, Stan has just turned 15 and still has three years left in Junior competition. He has been playing golf just four years.

Trafalgar has always had a fine junior program, points out head pro John Ellison. It produced Sandra Post (now a pro) who won the Canadian and Ontario Junior championships in 1964. Wayne MacDonald the Ontario Junior Champion that same year, and Kelly Roberts who took the Ontario Junior crown in 1969.

Instruction for Trafalgar's juniors is handled by head pro Ellison, teaching pro Bob Kennedy and assistant pros Mark Evershed and Paul Lacroix. It is under the direction of Jack Ritchie, Inez Pullam and Jim Dimitriw, who organized an 11-week program of instruction and competition within the large junior section.

The program involves all phases of the golf game, from putting to trouble shots, Ellison said. A normal Tuesday clinic would see about 65 juniors being put through their exercises by the pros. "A major reason for our junior program's success," says Ellison, "is the extremely liberal approach to junior play by the club and the members. The club has probably the least restrictive rules governing junior play of any major club in Ontario, and the members have no reservations about playing

with the juniors. "The experience of playing with senior members leads to an early development of the junior's potential, and also contributes to the overall attitude of the junior section."
