Dog hunt pays off

Milton Council's door to door compaign to sell dog tags to owners who hadn't bothered to by a tag has paid off, according to Milton Treasurer Don Lougheed.

Lougheed said that John Thomson had managed to canvass about half of the urban section of Milton in the first three weeks of his six week summer stint. In the first three weeks he sold 108 tags. He sold 85 on a door to door basis and an additional 23 tags were picked up at town hall as a result of his

Lougheed said he was pleased with the results of the canvass, and said Thomson would continue for another three weeks.

He has collected in excess of \$540 in tag fees in his first three weeks. He is paid \$110 a week and has been able to cover his own salary and turn a profit each week.

Lougheed said he expected Thomson to complete the urban area of town and probably hit on some urban fringe areas.

The canvass was started when council became concerned about who voluntarily purchased tags.






