We may again see last year's championship rematch of Sargents and Charles or we could see two teams who played less than 500 ball, battle for the title.

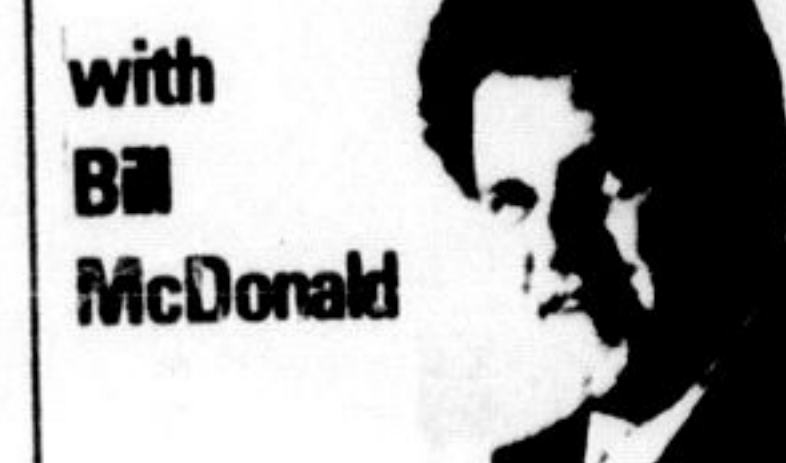

A medium-size, firm-bristle paintbrush does a great dusting job on baseboards, windowsills and carved parts of wood furniture.

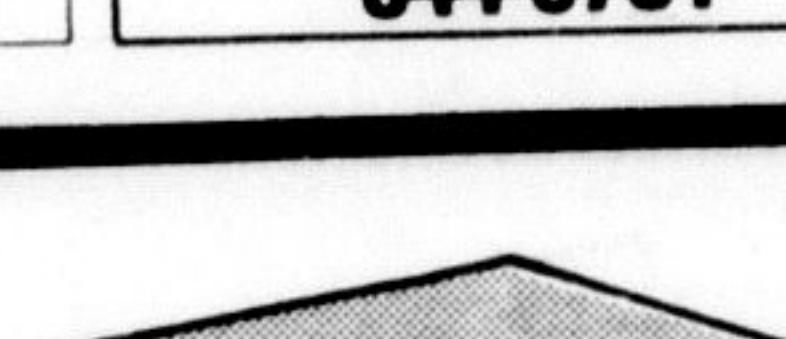
Liver may lose its flavor if stored longer than 24 hours.
