Dark spots on your copper planter? Rub with half a lemon dipped in salt. Rinse with hot water and polish with soft cloth.

Yes, you CAN wash foam rubber pillows or pads: knead suds through gently, but don't twist or wring. Rinse thoroughly to remove all lather. Wrap in towel and squeeze lightly, then dry in air.

Hand-washed sweaters dry neatly if you put paper towel or gift wrap tubes in the sleeves.

Make a scouring pad from the vinyl mesh bag that onions come in: remove stitching, fold into a square, tie in center with string or a rubber band.

Straw or wicker hampers and baskets should be shellacked to prevent mildew.
