

Wine grapes ripen soon

Home wine makers will be interested to know that one of Ontario's excellent wine grapes will be available in good quantity from about Sept. 25 to mid-October. The variety is the De Chaunac (Seibel 9549), a French hybrid grape which has been grown in Ontario for the past few years. The De Chaunac is the most widely planted of the French hybrids. In Ontario, there are over one million vines in the ground.

The De Chaunac variety is grown specifically for wine making. It has a higher sugar content than some of the other wine varieties. This is particularly important for wine making. De Chaunac is also the most available of the varietal grapes for home wine makers and is generally to be found throughout the Niagara Peninsula.

The fall meeting of the Halton Safety Council was held in the board room of the Department of Agriculture and Food, Main St. on Tuesday evening Sept. 5. The meeting was chaired by the president Mrs. C. Patterson assisted by Norman Biggar, (sec.-treas.). Safety equipment (ear protectors) are to be given to the young men who represented Halton on the tractor radio, held at Caledon on Saturday, Sept. 9. Five counties were sending delegates to compete, top winners will go on to compete at the International Plowing Match.

Roll call, did you wear your seat belt tonight?, was well answered by those attending. Burke McNeill showed four films on safety, these were by Walt Disney and dealt with fire, pedestrians, bicycles and water safety.

The Halton council has purchased 100 steel signs to be put on silos to warn of the danger of silage gases. Each director received a sign and the balance will be delivered by the Halton Junior Farmers to all farmers who put corn silage in for winter feed. Several lost their lives last year when overcome with the deadly fumes.

Safety tips were given on use of chain saws, faulty wiring, welding, and a warning for amateurs to never try to cut the top off barrels which

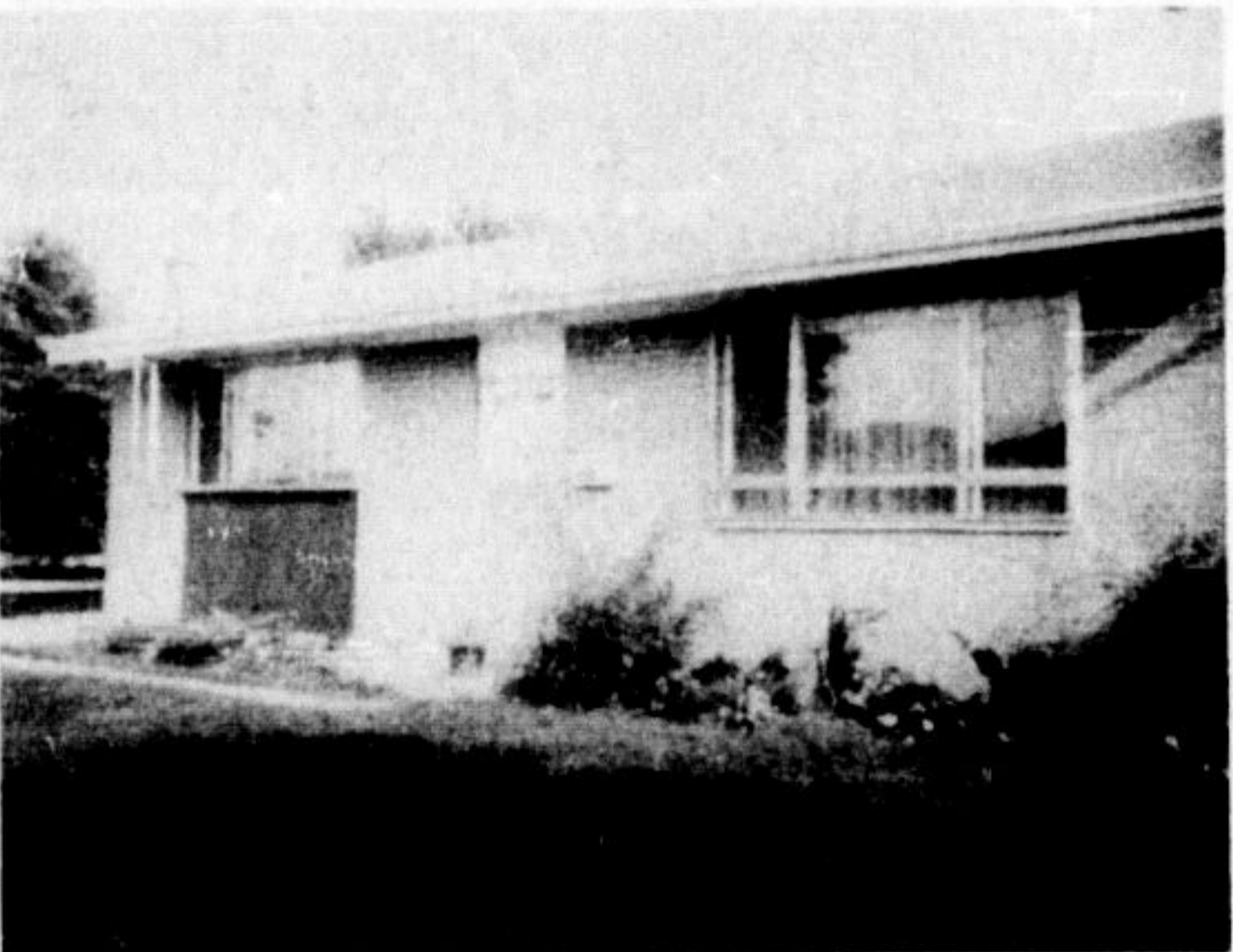
—Milton Library launched its fall film festival this week. More good movies are on tap through the winter months.

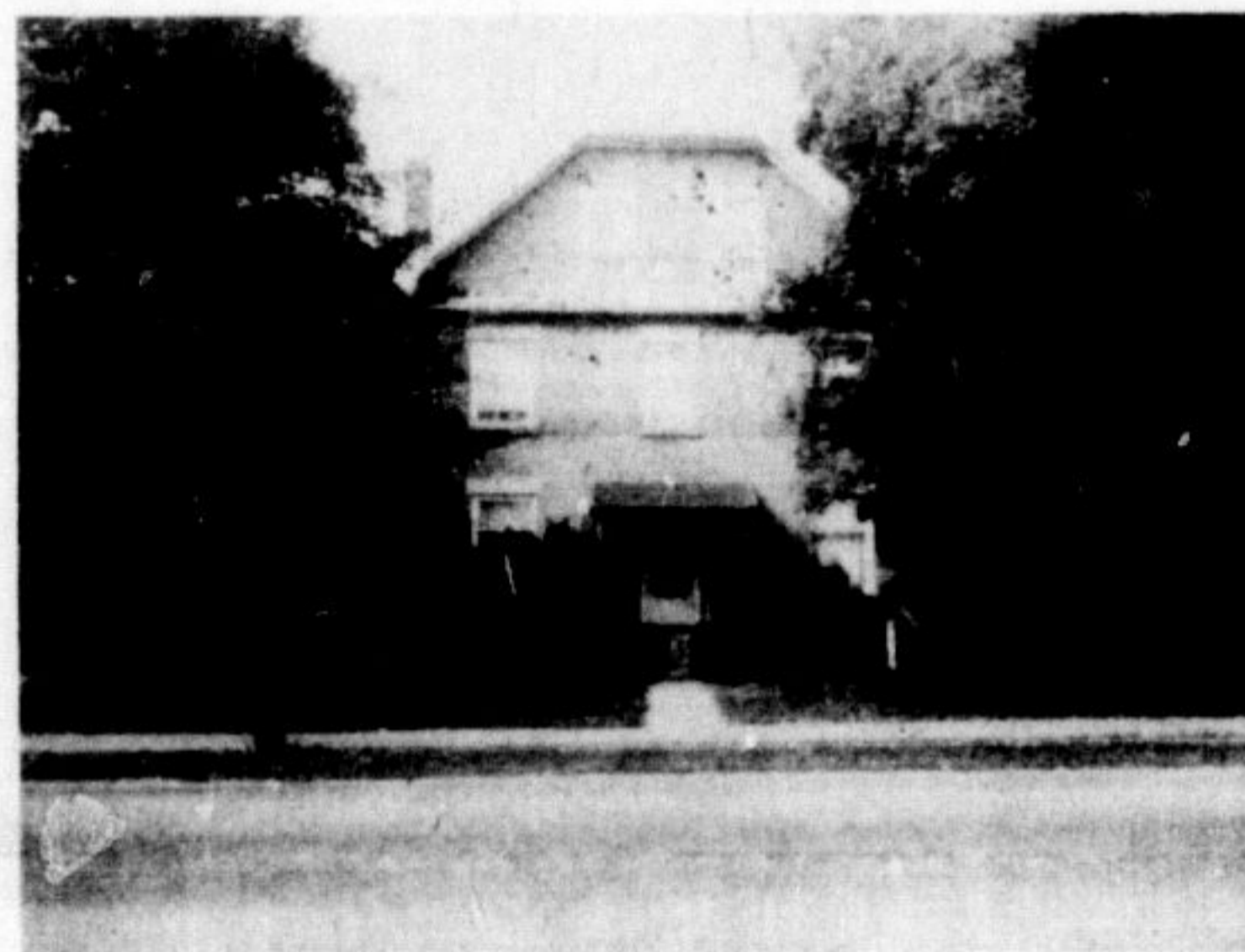
