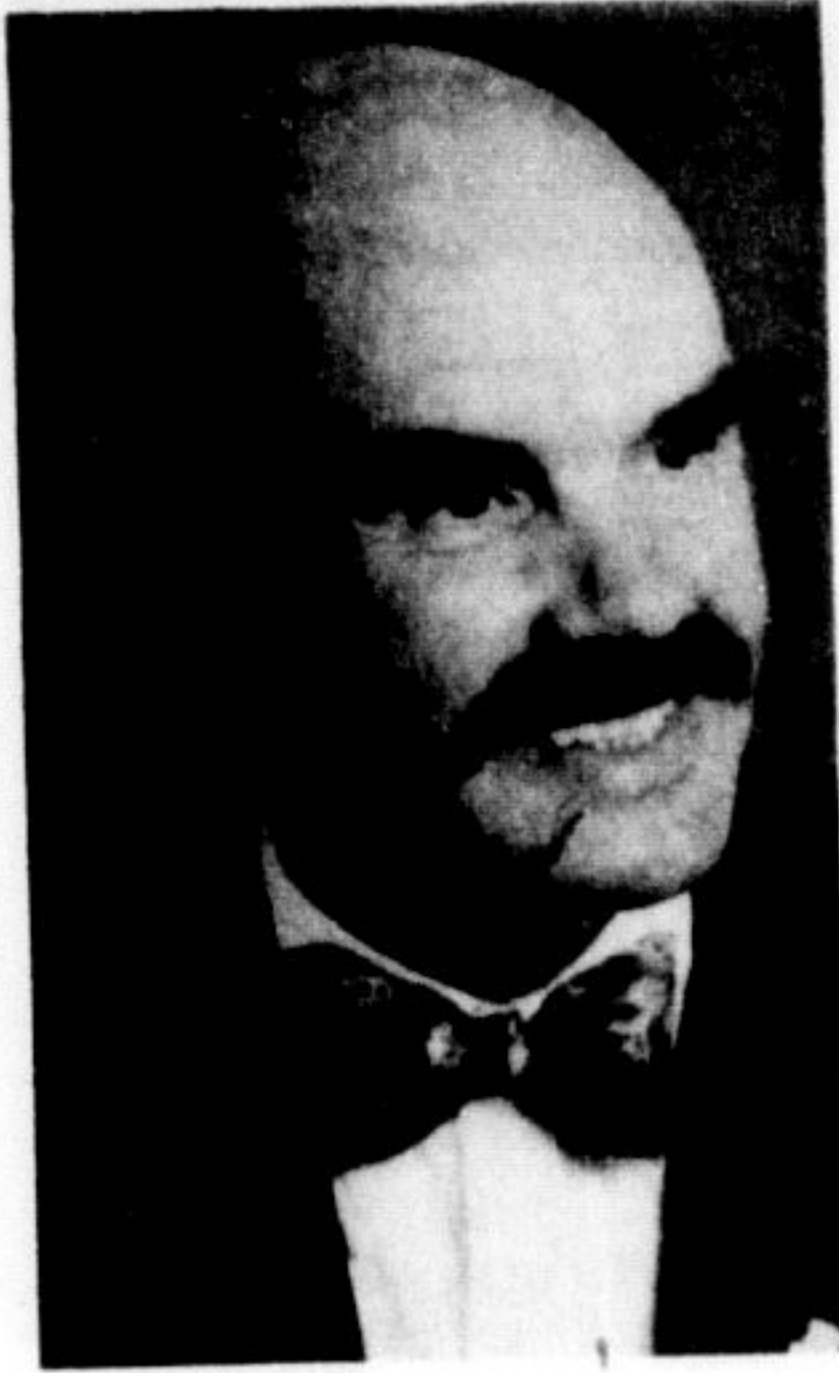
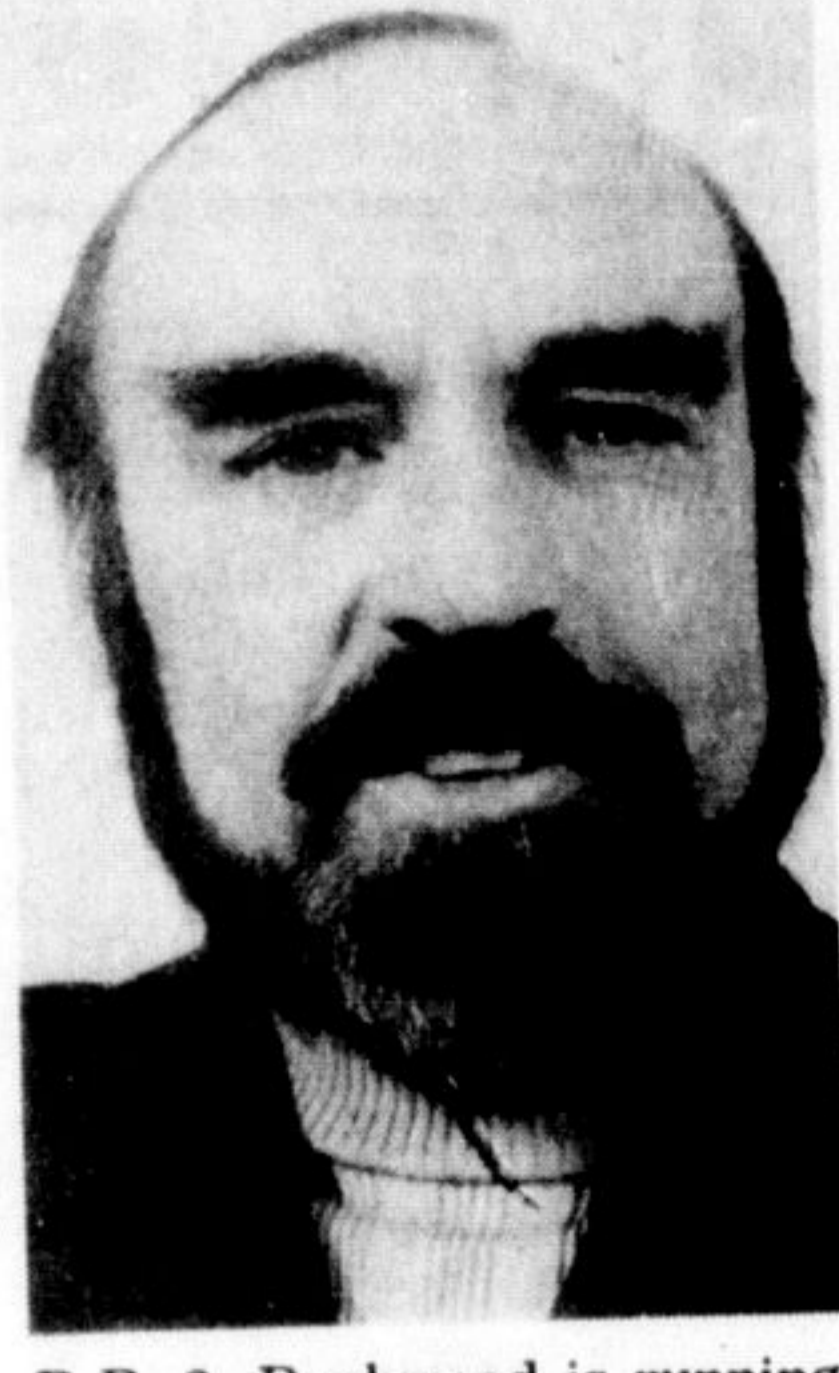


Thumbnail sketches of Milton candidates



DON GORDON
Seeking re-election as Mayor of Milton for a second term is Don Gordon.
A professional politician whose life is his job, Gordon, 51, has few outside interests except for oil painting and his family. He is an accountant at Ford of Canada but obtained a leave of absence when he became mayor.
Married to the former Pauline Caron of St. Jules, Que., they have one daughter Judy, 23, a fourth year student at the University of Guelph.
Gordon had been a councillor in Oakville eight years, then three in Milton after regional government was introduced, and he was elected mayor in 1976.
He lives at 7520 Sixth Line.

He has served as an advisor to the board of directors of the Halton Recovery House and as a director of the Ontario Society for Crippled Children and the Ontario Chamber of Commerce.
An active member of the Royal Canadian Legion, he served over four years with the First Battalion of the Queen's Own Rifles, much of it overseas.
Born in Cabbagetown, Toronto, Goutouski is married to Viny. They have four children: Bryan, Mikki, Gary and Laura.
They have lived in Milton 12 years.



R.R. 2, Rockwood is running for election in Ward Two as regional councillor.
Johnson has run on the NDP platform in the last two provincial elections.
He organized and chaired GUARD, the Group United Against Rural Dumping.
He formed the 854 Committee which was successful in having Bell Telephone extend toll-free dialing to the 854 telephone exchange area the same time as Milton.
President of the Nassagaweya Area Ratepayers Association, he has also been a director on land use with the Ontario Garbage Coalition, an offshoot of Pollution Probe.
He has presented innumerable briefs and presentations to a variety of groups and written scores of articles on landfill sites for garbage disposal, among them Site F.
A stationary engineer with the Ministry of Environment in Burlington, Johnson is married. His wife Mary and he have a daughter Lynn, 28, and a son Malcolm, 30.
His hobbies include wood carving and writing letters to the editors of newspapers.



JIM KERR
A politician who makes politics a way of life is Jim Kerr, 36, of 200 Queen St., Milton.
Kerr is seeking re-election as regional councillor in Ward Two.
He is married to his wife Toni. They have two daughters Kristin, 10, and Paula, 8.
A lifelong resident of Milton, Kerr graduated from Wilfrid Laurier University with a Bachelor of Arts Degree, major-Economics, in 1971.
He spent 14 years in the teaching profession, 10 of them as vice-principal in four schools.
He gave up teaching to devote full time to politics. He is a real estate representative in his spare time.
Kerr said his life in politics leaves little time for hobbies although he does list skiing, tennis, swimming and music as interests.



ANNE MacARTHUR
Anne MacArthur is once again throwing her hat into the ring as a candidate for Milton's mayor.
She was the first woman councillor in Nassagaweya Township and its first woman reeve, serving a total of nine years on the township council.
She was the first woman mayor of Milton, 1974-76. Prior to that, she was the last woman Warden of Halton when the county system of government ended and the regional one began in 1974. Her husband Charles died a few years ago. She has one son.
She has an unlisted telephone number and her address is in care of the Milton post office, Box 71.



GORDON KRANTZ
A veteran of Milton politics is Gordon Krantz.
At 41 years of age, he has spent the last 13 as councillor.
He is married to Olive and has two children, David, 19 and Debra, 17.
He is self-employed as owner of Krantz Fuels.
His involvement in the community includes being a volunteer firefighter, a member of the Masonic Lodge and Grace Anglican Church.
He is vice-president of the Halton Community Credit Union and vice-chairman of Halton Region Conservation Authority.
A lifelong resident of Milton, Krantz lists being a collector of antiques as his main hobby.



DAVE de SYLVA
A new face in the race for Ward Two councillor is Dave de Sylva, 27, of 261 Laurier.
de Sylva was born in Brampton and grew up in Norval, attending high schools in Toronto and Georgetown.
He graduated from the University of Toronto in 1973 with a Bachelor of Applied Science in Civil Engineering.
He spent a year working for George Wimpey Canada Ltd. at Meadowvale and then spent three and a half years with Markborough Properties. Among the projects he headed with the latter firm was the designing of the lake at Meadowvale.
He spent five months with a Kitchener consulting group before moving back to Wimpey where he is involved with land development properties in Oakville, Brampton and Mississauga.
In the process of carrying out projects in municipalities, he became accustomed to dealing with town hall staffs and councils.
For the past two years he frequently attended Milton Council as treasurer and spokesman for The Residents' Eyes on Council, a group concerned about the Laurier Ave. sports centre.
Married to Trish, the couple has a son Tony, 4.
de Sylva's interests are cooking, gardening, pine furniture, photography, basketball and baseball.

Married to his wife Jean, they have three sons: Peter, 33, Jim, 18, and Richard, 15.
Cartwright has worked for the Ford Motor Company in Oakville for 25 years. He is supervisor of maintenance.

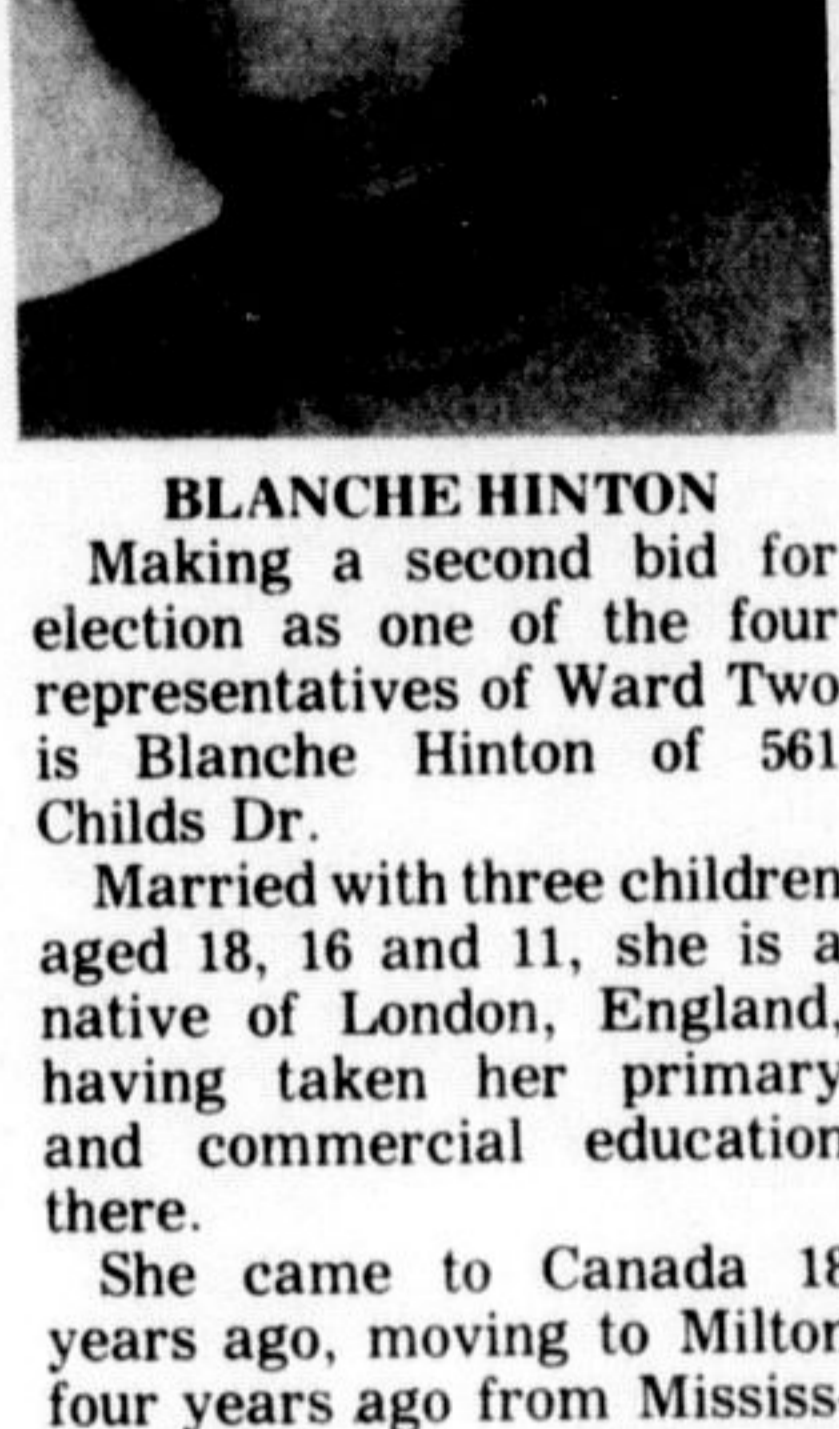


DON MCCOLEMAN

Like other competitors, it is his second bid—having been thwarted in 1976.

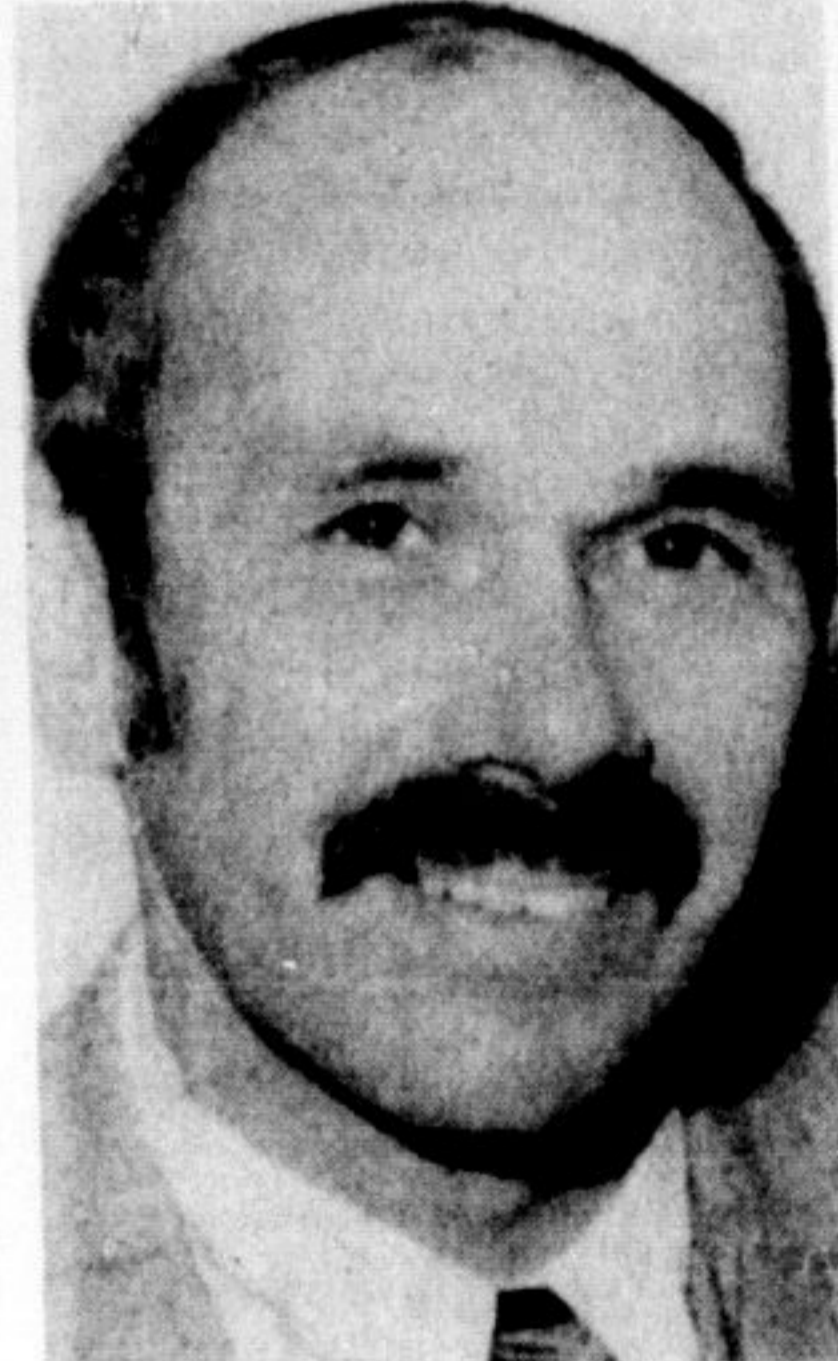
RICK DAY
No stranger to municipal politics is Richard Day. At 34 years of age, he has spent the last eight years on the councils of Oakville and Milton.
Once again he is seeking re-election as councillor in Milton's Ward One.
Day was an Oakville councillor three years before regional government came in and he successfully sought election to Milton's council.
Educated in Timmins, Day secured a hockey scholarship to the University of Michigan.

McColeman is head of the history department at Georgetown District High School.
His hobbies are reading, carpentry and jogging.
The jogging is a carryover from his youth when he was the 1951 Canadian Cross Country Champion. In 1950 he held the two-mile record.

Making a second bid for election as one of the four representatives of Ward Two is Blanche Hinton of 561 Childs Dr.

Howard Carney is a new candidate in Ward One.
The 35-year-old office supervisor from the Ford Motor Company is making his

second bid for election, having failed in 1976.
A last minute candidate, Carney wanted to seek an election in his ward and rounded up 10 signatures in less than an hour in order to file his nomination papers before the deadline.

Married to Lynne, they have three children: Patricia, 8, Gregory 11, and Sandy, 14. They reside at 1215 Derry Road West.
Carney lists sailing, farming, skiing and skating as his interests.

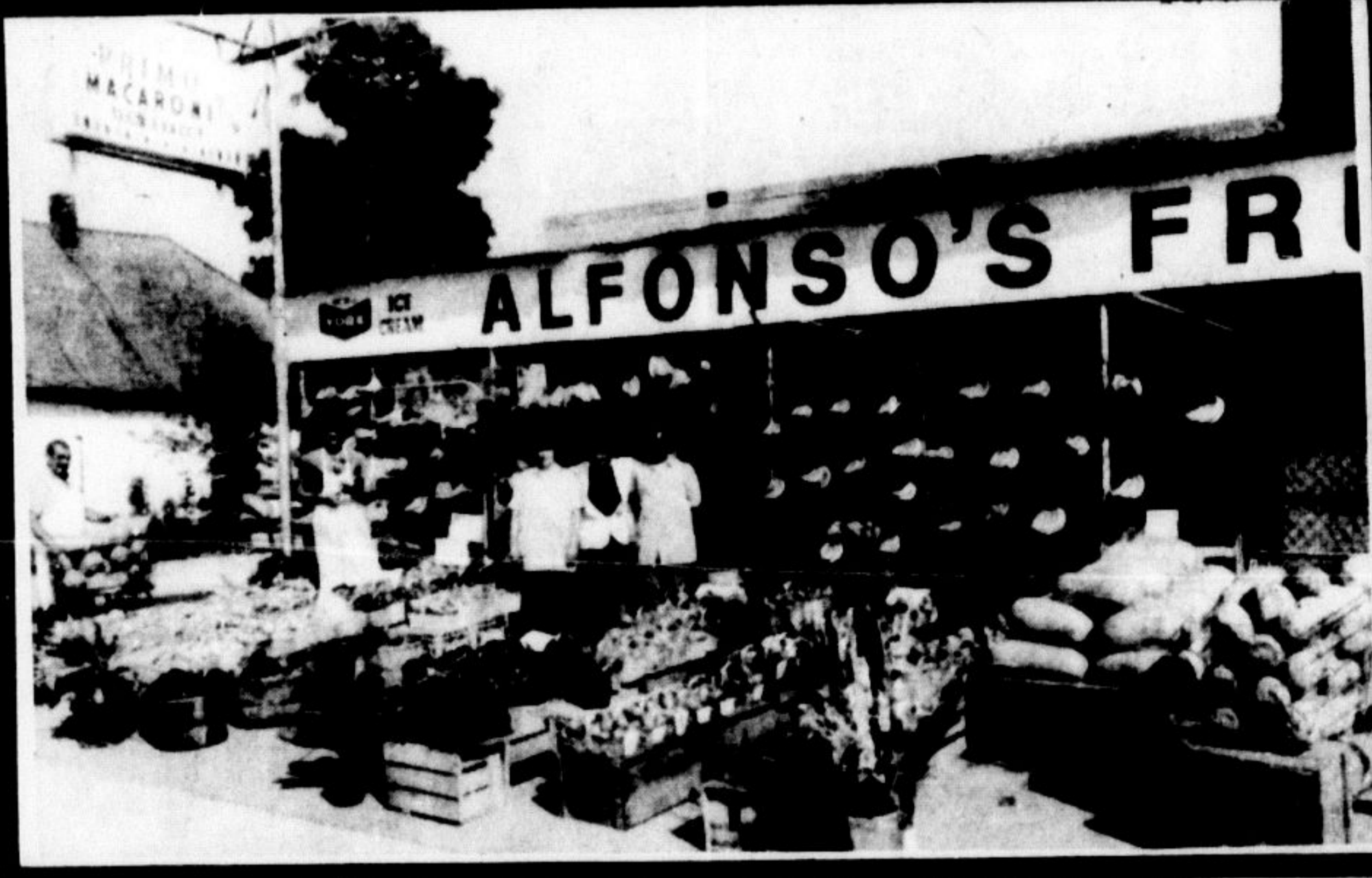
He received his primary education at Morden Road Public School in Oakville and his secondary at the high schools of Trafalgar and Blakelock, also in Oakville.

He was involved in the location of hydro corridors through Halton and Beverly Township as well as the Site F controversy.
He has published articles



and edited work for the publishing houses of McMillan of Canada and Thomas Nelson.
He has done work for Channel 19 of TV Ontario, the educational channel.
Penman is chairman of communications at Oakville Trafalgar High School. It is a position he has held for four years.
For three years prior to that he was the school's English head.
Born in Toronto and raised in the rural section of northern Burlington, he received his primary education in the one-room school house of S.S.
