Oakville municipal elections see 45 candidates running for 25 seats

A total of 45 candidates will be running for 25 positions in Oakville in the municipal elections on Nov. 13.

Mayor Harry Barrett has been acclaimed to another term as mayor, ending speculation that MacLean Anderson would challenge him for that seat.

Anderson, an incumbent regional councillor for Ward Two, is again in the running for that seat along with fellow incumbent Gord Reade. Former Councillor Terry Maanell is returning to run for one of the two regional seats from Ward Two.

Five candidates are seeking the two regional seats from Ward Three, including incumbent Ron Planche and Robert Brewer, a local councillor who is running for a regional seat. Other candidates are Frank Hayden, Bonnie Brown and Ann Mulvale.

A similar situation exists in the race for Ward Four's regional seats. Incumbent Laurie Mannell in being challenged by Carol Gooding, a local councillor, Steve McKellar and Gerry Smith.

Two members are to be elected to non-regional seats on Oakville Council from Ward Two. In the race are incumbent Norm Connolly as well as Terry Heffernan, Peter Arch and Donald Ball.

Two men have been acclaimed to local council seats from Ward Three. Incumbent Paul Farley is being returned to council along with newcomer Angelo Serafini.

Keith Bird is an incumbent in the race for the two local

council seats from Ward Four with five other candidates seeking election including James Watt, Bruce Attenborough, Bill Perras Jr., Hugh Large and David Cecil Morris.

Two are to be elected from Ward Two to the Halton Board of Education, and incumbent Len Crosier is among those seeking a seat on the board. Others are Frederick Baker,

Betty Hansford and Jackie Cudmore.

Only one representative on the Board is to be elected from Ward Three, and two newcomers are challenging incumbent Elsie Hurley for that position. They are Eric Hurley and William Humphreys.

Anne Fairfield, Catherine Jackson and incumbent Bill Herd are running for the two

seats on the Board from Ward Four.

Another representative to the Board, elected at large by separate school supporters has been acclaimed. Len Auger has been returned to the Board.

The only race for seats to Halton Region's Separate School Board is going to take place in Ward Two where incumbents Yolande King and June Noonan are being

challenged by newcomers Michael Boyle and Thomas McCabe.

In Ward Three, the two seats on the Board will be filled by incumbent James Mihm and newcomer Edward Viana.

A similar situation exists in Ward Four where Fred Pagnello has been returned to the board by acclamation along with newcomer Harry Flood.

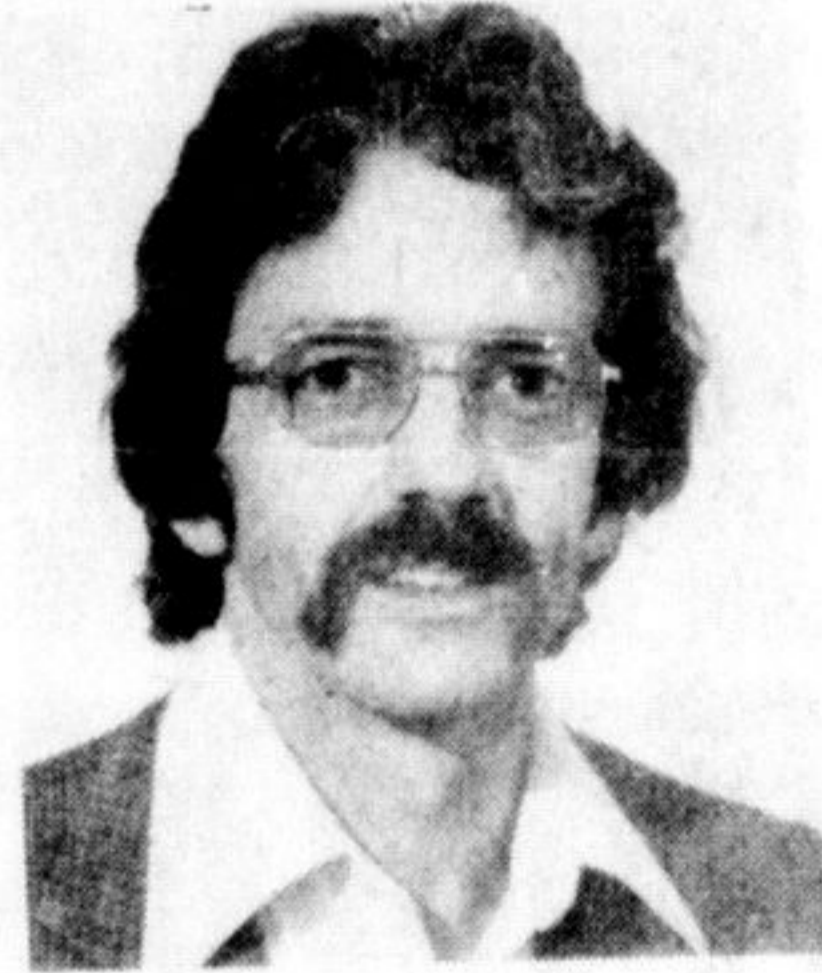

His wife is Marian and they have four daughters: Debra, 6, Karen, 9, Christine, 10, and Sharon, 12.

Johnson's interests are racket sports as well as swimming and softball. He works at Ford of Canada.
