

# Optimists count win over Ancaster 7-3

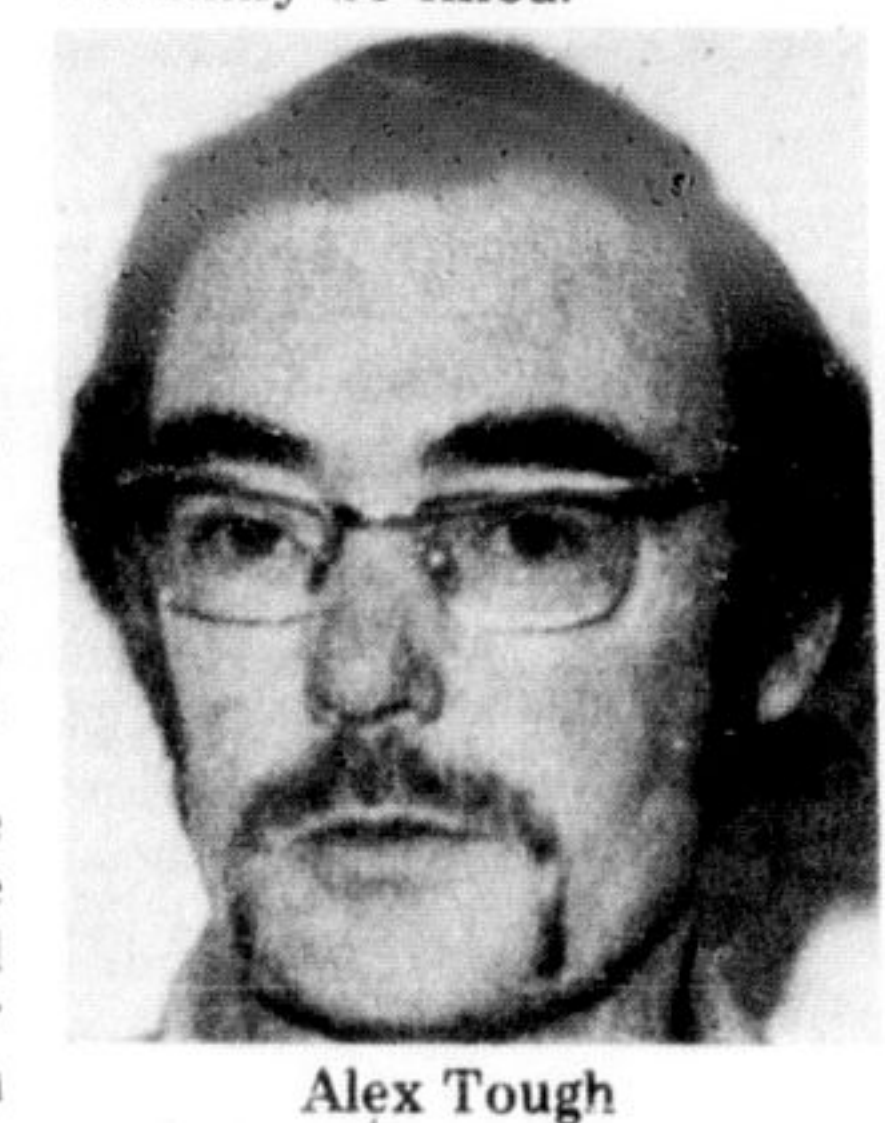

# Waples may hit million season

A little more than \$25,000 separates horseman Ron Waples from becoming the first driver on the Ontario Jockey Club circuit to hit the \$1 million mark in single season's purse earnings. With four wins and two second place finishes in seven drives at Mohawk Raceway in Campbellville Sunday night, the Rockwood reinsman picked up \$10,324 in purse money (he finished fourth in the other drive) to lift the season's earnings for horses he's driven this year to \$974,471, leaving him just \$25,529 short of the plateau that's never been reached in the history of the Circuit. And he's got 41 nights of racing left to make it.

The four wins brought his season's win total on the Circuit to 232, providing him with a solid cushion over second placed Mel Corbett, who was winless on Sunday and has 193 wins. In the standings for the fall meeting Waples and Corbett tied with 44 wins apiece coming into Sunday night's action. Ron Feagan is in third place with 28 victories. Waples last year became the first driver in racing history to drive the winners of over \$1 million in purses in a single season competing solely at Canadian tracks. He was also the first teamster to surpass the 300-win mark in a single campaign.

After finishing fourth in the second race and second in the fifth with Valiant Ides, the 34-year-old Waples connected with Rockway Fats, a three-year-old pacer owned by Ron Haemel of St. Catharines (\$6.80); Good Better Best, a four-year-old he owns with the Grants Direct Stable of Toronto (\$11.00) for D.
