

That is what I would support.

In a more optimistic vein Barry Elliot, ex Milton Trident and physical fitness instructor at Ernest C. Drury School is having great success with his juvenile rep team.

Elliott is enthusiastic with the response his players return and with their attendance record. Elliott took the team when it was in danger of

being canned by the Milton Minor Hockey Association and since then had found all previous warnings about coaching juvenile clubs to be

Plus the talent on the present Trident squad and the wide open import carding the Intermediate "A's" have, would be enough to staff a formidable club here.

The rivalry between Georgetown and Milton would then be great. Both sides would surely benefit at the box office and there would be feathers flying as the teams squabbled over players' territorial rights and the like. Which also makes good copy.

But there are roadblocks in the way. One is the Milton Club does not presently have the desired sponsorship situation. Basically we don't have the bucks, and secondly a spokesman from the Tridents' Club told me that they want to win the Intermediate "B" championship before they would consider icing an "A" club. But it would be something to consider over the
