Last year at this time there were at least 25 fish in the area I inspected.

Word from the Ministry of Natural Resources notes they are having trouble getting eggs from spawning fish for their restocking program.

Again last year at Lowville, the department was catching fish as fast as they wanted them. They milked the fish and fertilized them by the dozen as a result, nearly half a million smelts will soon be ready to be put into the Bronte and Credit Rivers.

Maybe it will be a late run, we hope so.

Hunters coming home from above Parry Sound district report a much smaller crop of Grouse this year. Last year the birds were at their peak and many fine meals were enjoyed, thanks to this tasty bird.

If you shoot a few of these birds this year be sure and let them cool properly before you pack them for home.
