A simple telephone call would have made it clear, in my case, that I had never received the questionnaire.

I do believe there was irresponsibility on the part of your newspaper, since surely no newspaper should permit anyone to advertise a statement or a non-statement which is potentially damaging to that person without making certain of the facts. Of course, this irresponsibility would have been much more serious should I not have been acclaimed to the position of Trustee.

Nevertheless, there is no question that the advertisement has impugned my character. When you have served as long and as diligently on behalf of the Separate School supporters of this County as I have, and that includes 14 years when there was no honorarium of any kind, it is shocking to me that such an incident could occur.

I would expect that some comment from you will appear in this issue of "The Champion", which in some way will correct the erroneous impression given by the advertisement
