The garage was constructed in various sections and it was difficult for firefighters to put out all the although they ran several hose lines and attacked the building from three sides and the roof. At one point they used a chain saw to cut through the walls. It took about an hour to

bring the fire under control. Meanwhile a ball of fire leapt 30 feet from the roof, reported one witness.

The building and contents were partially insured.




